- *A place where people meet.*
- *A meeting planned at a certain time and place.*
- *A meeting at an agreed time and place.*
- *A date; usually with a member of the opposite sex.*
- *A meeting place.*
- *A bar, restaurant, or similar establishment that is used as a popular meeting place.*



Synonyms of "Rendezvous" as a noun (8 Words)

- appointment** Law the act of disposing of property by virtue of the power of appointment.
*Government ministers and other political **appointments** are frequently replaced.*
- assignation** The act of distributing by allotting or apportioning; distribution according to a plan.
*His **assignation** with an older woman.*
- engagement** A hostile meeting of opposing military forces in the course of a war.
*The teacher tried to increase his students **engagement** in class activities.*

meeting	An organized event at which a number of races or other sporting contests are held. <i>His meeting with the salesmen was the high point of his day.</i>
meeting place	A place where things merge or flow together (especially rivers).
place of assignation	The particular portion of space occupied by something.
tryst	A private romantic rendezvous between lovers. <i>A moonlight tryst.</i>
venue	In law: the jurisdiction where a trial will be held. <i>The club is the city's main venue for live music.</i>



Usage Examples of "Rendezvous" as a noun

- *He was waiting for them at the rendezvous.*
- *Edward turned up late for their rendezvous.*
- *A lively West End restaurant rendezvous.*

- *You'd be welcome to use this place as a rendezvous.*



Rendezvous as a Verb

- *Meet at an agreed time and place.*
- *Meet at a rendezvous.*



Synonyms of "Rendezvous" as a verb (5 Words)

- assemble** Cause (people or things) to gather together for a common purpose.
*We **assembled** in the church basement.*
- come together** Reach a destination; arrive by movement or progress.
- gather** Collect or gather.
*Our ancestors **gathered** nuts in the Fall.*
- get together** Go or come after and bring or take back.
- meet** Meet by design be present at the arrival of.
***Meet** a violent death.*



Usage Examples of "Rendezvous" as a verb

- *I rendezvoused with Bea as planned.*



Associations of "Rendezvous" (30 Words)

affair	An event or sequence of events of a specified kind or that has previously been referred to. <i>It is none of your affair.</i>
amatory	Expressive of or exciting sexual love or romance. <i>Her amatory affairs.</i>
amorous	Expressive of or exciting sexual love or romance. <i>Amorous glances.</i>
amour	A love affair or lover, especially one that is secret. <i>He is enraged at this revelation of his past amours.</i>
bigamist	Someone who marries one person while already legally married to another.
<u>closeness</u>	Close or warm friendship. <i>The geographical closeness of our two countries.</i>

conjugal	Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband. <i>Conjugal loyalty.</i>
connected	Associated or related in some respect. <i>A series of connected stories.</i>
connubial	Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband. <i>Connubial bliss.</i>
contact	A junction where things as two electrical conductors touch or are in physical contact. <i>Equipment in contact with water can benefit from rubber lining.</i>
diplomacy	Negotiation between nations. <i>With perfect diplomacy he divided his attention between Meryl and Anthea.</i>
enchantingly	In a bewitching manner.
intimacy	A feeling of being intimate and belonging together. <i>The room had a peaceful sense of intimacy about it.</i>
<u>involvement</u>	The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc). <i>US officials produced evidence of his involvement in drug trafficking.</i>
inward	Directed or moving inward or toward a center. <i>A concern with inward reflections.</i>
<u>liaison</u>	A person who acts as a link to assist communication or cooperation between people. <i>He s our liaison with a number of interested parties.</i>
love	A person or thing that one loves. <i>I love this job.</i>
loving	Feeling or showing love or great care. <i>A loving father.</i>
mawkish	Sentimental in an exaggerated or false way. <i>The mawkish smell of warm beer.</i>
meddle	Interfere in something that is not one's concern. <i>Don t meddle in my affairs.</i>
melodrama	Behaviour or events that resemble melodrama. <i>What little is known of his early life is cloaked in melodrama.</i>
philanderer	A man who likes many women and has short sexual relationships with them. <i>He was known as a philanderer.</i>

relationship	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>The landlord tenant relationship.</i>
<u>romantic</u>	A writer or artist of the romantic movement. <i>Romantic poetry.</i>
scandal	Rumour or malicious gossip about scandalous events or actions. <i>A bribery scandal involving one of his key supporters.</i>
secret	Of information given in confidence or in secret. <i>A secret marriage.</i>
<u>secular</u>	A secular priest. <i>Secular drama.</i>
sentimentality	Exaggerated and self-indulgent tenderness, sadness, or nostalgia. <i>There are passages which verge on sentimentality.</i>
<u>tamper</u>	Intrude in other people's affairs or business; interfere unwantedly. <i>Someone tampered with the brakes of my car.</i>
<u>tryst</u>	A secret rendezvous (especially between lovers). <i>A moonlight tryst.</i>
