According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "renegade" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A person who behaves in a rebelliously unconventional manner.
- A person who abandons religion; an apostate.
- A person who deserts and betrays an organization, country, or set of principles.
- Someone who rebels and becomes an outlaw.
- A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc.





## Synonyms of "Renegade" as a noun (11 Words)

<u>apostate</u>	A person who renounces a religious or political belief or principle. After fifty years as an <b>apostate</b> he returned to the faith.
betrayer	A person who says one thing and does another.
<u>critic</u>	A person who judges the merits of literary or artistic works, especially one who does so professionally. <i>Critics of the new legislation say it is too broad.</i>
defector	A person who has abandoned their country or cause in favour of an opposing one. Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defector</b> s to the West.
deserter	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post. <b>Deserter</b> s from the army.
<u>questioner</u>	A person who feels or expresses doubt about something. They respond to their <b>questioner</b> s simply and directly.
ratter	Any of several breeds of terrier developed to catch rats.



recreantA coward.<br/>The recreant acted with outward boldness.scepticA person inclined to question or doubt accepted opinions.traitorA person who says one thing and does another.<br/>He was a traitor to his own class.he was a traitor to his own class.A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one.

turncoat They denounced him as a turncoat.

- Break with established customs.



#### Synonyms of "Renegade" as a verb (1 Word)

**rebel** Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. As I came over the hill my legs **rebel**led I could walk no further.

#### Definitions of "Renegade" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "renegade" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Having deserted a cause or principle.
- Having treacherously changed allegiance.
- Having abandoned one's religious beliefs.

#### Synonyms of "Renegade" as an adjective (8 Words)

<u>disloyal</u>	(of a remark or thought) demonstrating a lack of loyalty. She was accused of being <b>disloyal</b> to the government.
mutinous	Wilful or disobedient. The men became <b>mutinous</b> and insubordinate.
perfidious	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>The <b>perfidious</b> Judas.</i>
<u>rebellious</u>	Participating in organized resistance to a constituted government. A <b>rebellious</b> crew.
recreant	Lacking even the rudiments of courage; abjectly fearful- Spenser. What a <b>recreant</b> figure must he make.
<u>traitorous</u>	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. When his <b>traitorous</b> actions were discovered he was imprisoned.
treacherous	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. The fiercest and most <b>treacherous</b> of foes.



## **treasonous** Involving or guilty of the betrayal of someone or something. *Dropping out of school was considered downright treasonous.*

#### Usage Examples of "Renegade" as an adjective

- A renegade bodyguard.
- A renegade monk.
- Renegade supporters of the usurper.

## Associations of "Renegade" (30 Words)

<u>apostate</u>	A person who renounces a religious or political belief or principle. An <b>apostate</b> Roman Catholic.
betray	Be sexually unfaithful to one's partner in marriage. The spy <b>betray</b> ed his country.
<u>betrayal</u>	An act of deliberate betrayal. The <b>betrayal</b> by the king by his daughter.
betrayer	A person who says one thing and does another.
cheat	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. She <b>cheat</b> s on her husband.
cheating	A deception for profit to yourself.
deceive	Fail to admit to oneself that something is true. The area may seem to offer nothing of interest but don t be <b>deceive</b> d.
defector	A person who has abandoned their country or cause in favour of an opposing one. Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defector</b> s to the West.
<u>disloyal</u>	Deserting your allegiance or duty to leader or cause or principle. <b>Disloyal</b> aides revealed his indiscretions to the papers.
faithless	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>Her <b>faithless</b> lover.</i>
fraud	Something intended to deceive; deliberate trickery intended to gain an advantage. Prosecutions for social security <b>fraud</b> s.
fraudulence	The quality of being fraudulent.
infidelity	The quality of being unfaithful. <i>Her <b>infidelity</b> continued after her marriage.</i>



insurgent	Rising in active revolt. An attack by armed <b>insurgent</b> s.
perfidious	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>The perfidious Judas.</i>
perfidy	An act of deliberate betrayal. It was an example of his <b>perfidy</b> .
quisling	A traitor who collaborates with an enemy force occupying their country. <i>He had the</i> <b>Quisling</b> <i>owner of the factory arrested</i> .
<u>rebel</u>	Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. <i>Respect did not prevent children from</i> <b>rebel</b> <i>ling against their parents.</i>
restive	(of a horse) stubbornly standing still or moving backwards or sideways; refusing to advance. Both their horses became <b>restive</b> at once.
<u>revolt</u>	Take violent action against an established government or ruler; rebel. Voters may <b>revolt</b> when they realize the cost of the measures.
seditious	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>The letter was declared <b>seditious</b></i> .
<u>traitor</u>	A person who says one thing and does another. <i>He was a <b>traitor</b> to his own class.</i>
<u>traitorous</u>	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. A lying <b>traitorous</b> insurrectionist.
treacherous	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Treacherous intrigues.</i>
<u>treachery</u>	An act of deliberate betrayal. Many died because of his <b>treachery</b> .
<u>treason</u>	Disloyalty by virtue of subversive behavior. <i>They were convicted of <b>treason</b></i> .
treasonable	(of an offence or offender) punishable as treason or as committing treason. There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.
trick	Liable to fail; defective. <i>He s a double dealer capable of any mean</i> <b>trick</b> .
<u>turncoat</u>	A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc. <i>They denounced him as a turncoat</i> .
