Reparation as a Noun

Definitions of "Reparation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “reparation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Compensation (given or received) for an insult or injury.*
- *The compensation for war damage paid by a defeated state.*
- *(usually plural) compensation exacted from a defeated nation by the victors.*
- *Compensation exacted from a defeated nation by the victors.*
- *The action of making amends for a wrong one has done, by providing payment or other assistance to those who have been wronged.*
- *Something done or paid in expiation of a wrong.*
- *The act of putting something in working order again.*
- *The action of repairing something.*



Synonyms of "Reparation" as a noun (18 Words)

amends	Something done or paid in expiation of a wrong. <i>How can I make amends.</i>
atonement	The reconciliation of God and mankind through Jesus Christ. <i>An annual ceremony of confession and atonement for sin.</i>
compensation	The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>A compensation claim.</i>
fix	Something craved, especially an intravenous injection of a narcotic drug. <i>Obviously his appointment was a fix.</i>
fixing	The action of mending or repairing something. <i>The fixing of additional strengthening steelwork.</i>
fixing up	Restraint that attaches to something or holds something in place.

fixture	A sporting event arranged to take place on a particular date. <i>Plumbing fixtures.</i>
mend	The act of putting something in working order again. <i>The mend was barely visible.</i>
mending	Garments that must be repaired. <i>A muddle of books and mending.</i>
rebuilding	Building again.
recompense	Payment or reward (as for service rendered). <i>Substantial damages were paid in recompense.</i>
<u>reconstruction</u>	A thing that has been rebuilt after being damaged or destroyed. <i>The economic reconstruction of Russia.</i>
redress	Remedy or compensation for a wrong or grievance. <i>Those seeking redress for an infringement of public law rights.</i>
renovation	The act of improving by renewing and restoring. <i>This property is in need of complete renovation.</i>
repair	The action of repairing something. <i>The truck was beyond repair.</i>
repayment	An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly repayments.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	The act of restoring something to its original state. <i>Upon the restitution of the book to its rightful owner the child was given a tongue lashing.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration of capital punishment.</i>



Usage Examples of "Reparation" as a noun

- *An act for which there is no reparation.*
- *The old hall was pulled down to avoid the cost of reparation.*
- *The courts required a convicted offender to make financial reparation to his victim.*
- *Germany was unable to pay the reparations demanded after World War I.*
- *The Treaty of Versailles imposed heavy reparations and restrictions on Germany.*

Associations of "Reparation" (30 Words)

bonus

A sum of money added to a person's wages as a reward for good performance.

*Good weather is an added **bonus** but the real appeal is the landscape.*

compensation

The action or process of awarding compensation.

*A **compensation** claim.*

cost	Cause the loss or unpleasant consequence of. <i>Costs may be awarded to a successful private prosecutor out of central funds.</i>
disarmament	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>The disarmament of the aggressor nations must be complete.</i>
disbursement	The payment of money from a fund. <i>They established a committee to supervise the disbursement of aid.</i>
expense	Offset an item of expenditure as an expense against taxable income. <i>He kept a careful record of his expenses at the meeting.</i>
indemnify	Secure against future loss, damage, or liability; give security for. <i>Each of the parties shall indemnify me for all reasonable costs of defending such actions and proceedings.</i>
meed	A fitting reward. <i>He must extract from her some meed of approbation.</i>
mortgage	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>A 60 000 mortgage.</i>
overpayment	Payment in excess of what is due. <i>A refund for overpayment of tax.</i>
pay	Render. <i>I ll pay you for that he snarled.</i>
payment	A sum of money paid or a claim discharged. <i>Ask for a discount for payment by cash.</i>
payoff	The income or profit arising from such transactions as the sale of land or other property.
rates	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
rebate	Pay back a sum of money as a rebate. <i>The scheme eases the move to the council tax by giving rebates in the first year.</i>
recompense	Restitution made or punishment inflicted for a wrong or injury. <i>Offenders should recompense their victims.</i>
refund	A repayment of a sum of money. <i>I ll refund you for the apples and any other damage.</i>
reimburse	Reimburse or compensate someone as for a loss. <i>Can the company reimburse me for my professional travel.</i>
reimbursement	Compensation paid (to someone) for damages or losses or money already spent etc. <i>He received reimbursement for his travel expenses.</i>

remunerate	Make payment to; compensate. <i>They should be remunerated fairly for their work.</i>
remuneration	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional remuneration.</i>
<u>repay</u>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>Most of his fortune had been spent repaying creditors.</i>
repayment	Payment of a debt or obligation. <i>Minimum monthly repayments.</i>
requite	Return a favour to (someone). <i>She did not requite his love.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>He was ordered to pay 6 000 in restitution.</i>
<u>revert</u>	Turn (one's eyes or steps) back. <i>We texted both Farah and Shirish but neither of them reverted.</i>
reward	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>Reaping the rewards of generosity.</i>
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. <i>The Chinese system salary the doctor and stop his pay when you get ill.</i>
unpaid	(of a person) not receiving payment for work done. <i>Unpaid extras in the documentary.</i>
<u>wages</u>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The wages of sin is death.</i>
