### Definitions of "Reparation" as a noun

- *The compensation for war damage paid by a defeated state.*
- *(usually plural) compensation exacted from a defeated nation by the victors.*
- *Compensation exacted from a defeated nation by the victors.*
- *The action of making amends for a wrong one has done, by providing payment or other assistance to those who have been wronged.*
- *Something done or paid in expiation of a wrong.*
- *The act of putting something in working order again.*
- *The action of repairing something.*



## Synonyms of "Reparation" as a noun (18 Words)

<b>amends</b>	Something done or paid in expiation of a wrong. <i>How can I make <b>amends</b>.</i>
<b>atonement</b>	The reconciliation of God and mankind through Jesus Christ. <i>An annual ceremony of confession and <b>atonement</b> for sin.</i>
<b>compensation</b>	The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>A <b>compensation</b> claim.</i>
<b>fix</b>	Something craved, especially an intravenous injection of a narcotic drug. <i>Obviously his appointment was a <b>fix</b>.</i>
<b>fixing</b>	The action of mending or repairing something. <i>The <b>fixing</b> of additional strengthening steelwork.</i>
<b>fixing up</b>	Restraint that attaches to something or holds something in place.

<b>fixture</b>	A sporting event arranged to take place on a particular date. <i>Plumbing <b>fixtures</b>.</i>
<b>mend</b>	The act of putting something in working order again. <i>The <b>mend</b> was barely visible.</i>
<b>mending</b>	Garments that must be repaired. <i>A muddle of books and <b>mending</b>.</i>
<b>rebuilding</b>	Building again.
<b>recompense</b>	Payment or reward (as for service rendered). <i>Substantial damages were paid in <b>recompense</b>.</i>
<b><u>reconstruction</u></b>	A thing that has been rebuilt after being damaged or destroyed. <i>The economic <b>reconstruction</b> of Russia.</i>
<b>redress</b>	Remedy or compensation for a wrong or grievance. <i>Those seeking <b>redress</b> for an infringement of public law rights.</i>
<b>renovation</b>	The act of improving by renewing and restoring. <i>This property is in need of complete <b>renovation</b>.</i>
<b>repair</b>	The action of repairing something. <i>The truck was beyond <b>repair</b>.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b><u>restitution</u></b>	The act of restoring something to its original state. <i>Upon the <b>restitution</b> of the book to its rightful owner the child was given a tongue lashing.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> of capital punishment.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Reparation" as a noun

- *An act for which there is no reparation.*
- *The old hall was pulled down to avoid the cost of reparation.*
- *The courts required a convicted offender to make financial reparation to his victim.*
- *Germany was unable to pay the reparations demanded after World War I.*
- *The Treaty of Versailles imposed heavy reparations and restrictions on Germany.*

## Associations of "Reparation" (30 Words)

### **bonus**

A sum of money added to a person's wages as a reward for good performance.

*Good weather is an added **bonus** but the real appeal is the landscape.*

### **compensation**

The action or process of awarding compensation.

*A **compensation** claim.*

<b>cost</b>	Cause the loss or unpleasant consequence of. <i>Costs may be awarded to a successful private prosecutor out of central funds.</i>
<b>disarmament</b>	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>The <b>disarmament</b> of the aggressor nations must be complete.</i>
<b>disbursement</b>	The payment of money from a fund. <i>They established a committee to supervise the <b>disbursement</b> of aid.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Offset an item of expenditure as an expense against taxable income. <i>He kept a careful record of his <b>expenses</b> at the meeting.</i>
<b>indemnify</b>	Secure against future loss, damage, or liability; give security for. <i>Each of the parties shall <b>indemnify</b> me for all reasonable costs of defending such actions and proceedings.</i>
<b>meed</b>	A fitting reward. <i>He must extract from her some <b>meed</b> of approbation.</i>
<b>mortgage</b>	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>A 60 000 <b>mortgage</b>.</i>
<b>overpayment</b>	Payment in excess of what is due. <i>A refund for <b>overpayment</b> of tax.</i>
<b>pay</b>	Render. <i>I ll <b>pay</b> you for that he snarled.</i>
<b>payment</b>	A sum of money paid or a claim discharged. <i>Ask for a discount for <b>payment</b> by cash.</i>
<b>payoff</b>	The income or profit arising from such transactions as the sale of land or other property.
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<b>rebate</b>	Pay back a sum of money as a rebate. <i>The scheme eases the move to the council tax by giving <b>rebates</b> in the first year.</i>
<b>recompense</b>	Restitution made or punishment inflicted for a wrong or injury. <i>Offenders should <b>recompense</b> their victims.</i>
<b>refund</b>	A repayment of a sum of money. <i>I ll <b>refund</b> you for the apples and any other damage.</i>
<b>reimburse</b>	Reimburse or compensate someone as for a loss. <i>Can the company <b>reimburse</b> me for my professional travel.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	Compensation paid (to someone) for damages or losses or money already spent etc. <i>He received <b>reimbursement</b> for his travel expenses.</i>

<b>remunerate</b>	Make payment to; compensate. <i>They should be <b>remunerated</b> fairly for their work.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional <b>remuneration</b>.</i>
<u>repay</u>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>Most of his fortune had been spent <b>repaying</b> creditors.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	Payment of a debt or obligation. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b>requite</b>	Return a favour to (someone). <i>She did not <b>requite</b> his love.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>He was ordered to pay 6 000 in <b>restitution</b>.</i>
<u>revert</u>	Turn (one's eyes or steps) back. <i>We texted both Farah and Shirish but neither of them <b>reverted</b>.</i>
<b>reward</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>Reaping the <b>rewards</b> of generosity.</i>
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. <i>The Chinese system <b>salary</b> the doctor and stop his pay when you get ill.</i>
<b>unpaid</b>	(of a person) not receiving payment for work done. <i><b>Unpaid</b> extras in the documentary.</i>
<u>wages</u>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The <b>wages</b> of sin is death.</i>
