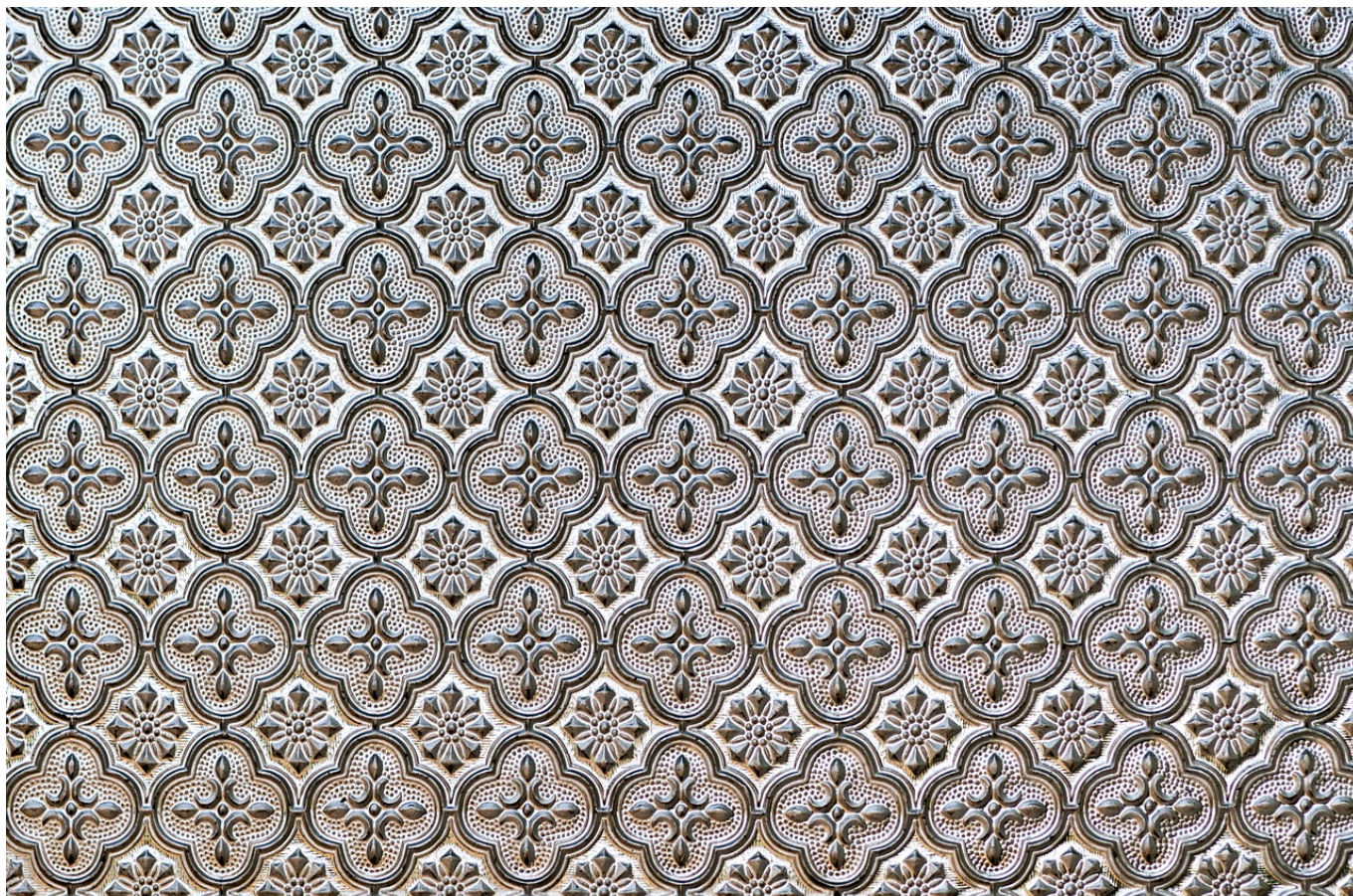
## Repeat as a Noun

### Definitions of "Repeat" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “repeat” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A repeated broadcast of a television or radio programme.*
- *A decorative pattern which is repeated uniformly over a surface.*
- *Something that occurs or is done again.*
- *A mark indicating a passage to be repeated.*
- *A consignment of goods similar to one already received.*
- *An event that repeats.*

- *Occurring, done, or used more than once.*
- *A passage intended to be repeated.*



## Synonyms of "Repeat" as a noun (6 Words)

- duplication** The act of copying or making a duplicate (or duplicates) of something.  
*An attempt to avoid unnecessary **duplication** of effort.*
- rebroadcast** A repeated or relayed broadcast.  
*Unless it is a **rebroadcast** the teacher will only have a very general idea of what the programme is about.*
- repetition** The repeated use of the same word or word pattern as a rhetorical device.  
*The tune is full of melodic **repetition** and sequence.*
- replay** A replayed match.  
*Clouds can be studied in speeded up **replay**.*
- replication** A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one).  
*Scientists will not believe an experimental result until they have seen at least one **replication**.*



**rerun**

An event or programme which is run again.  
*She likes to watch I love Lucy **reruns**.*

<b><u>duplicate</u></b>	Make a duplicate or duplicates of. <i>Could you please <b>duplicate</b> this letter for me.</i>
<b>dwell on the subject</b>	Exist or be situated within.
<b><u>echo</u></b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>Followers <b>echoing</b> the cries of their leaders.</i>
<b>go on</b>	Stop operating or functioning.
<b>go on and on</b>	Pass, fare, or elapse; of a certain state of affairs or action.
<b>go on talking</b>	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
<b>go over again</b>	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
<b>go through again</b>	Be the right size or shape; fit correctly or as desired.
<b>happen again</b>	Come into being; become reality.
<b>ingeminate</b>	Repeat or reiterate (a word or statement), typically for emphasis. <i>We must ask and <b>ingeminate</b> the inquiry where is Burns.</i>
<b>iterate</b>	Make repeated use of a mathematical or computational procedure, applying it each time to the result of the previous application; perform iteration. <i>The bird s call is a monotonously <b>iterated</b> single note.</i>
<b>keep talking</b>	Stick to correctly or closely.
<b>occur again</b>	Come to pass.
<b>perform again</b>	Give a performance (of something).
<b><u>quote</u></b>	Put quote marks around. <i>A military spokesman was <b>quoted</b> as saying that the border was now quiet.</i>
<b>ramble on</b>	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment.
<b>rant on</b>	Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner.
<b>reappear</b>	Appear again. <i>Her husband <b>reappeared</b> after having left her years ago.</i>
<b>rebroadcast</b>	Broadcast or relay (a programme or signal) again. <i>The documentary will be <b>rebroadcast</b> on Saturday.</i>
<b>recapitulate</b>	Summarize and state again the main points of. <i>Let s <b>recapitulate</b> the main ideas.</i>
<b><u>recite</u></b>	Recite in elocution. <i>He <b>recited</b> passages of Dante.</i>
<b>recur</b>	Occur again periodically or repeatedly. <i>Oglethorpe s words kept <b>recurring</b> to him.</i>

<b>redo</b>	Make new. <i>The house is being <b>redone</b> exactly to suit his taste.</i>
<b>reduplicate</b>	Repeat (a syllable or other linguistic element) exactly or with a slight change (e.g. hurly-burly, see-saw). <i>The morpheme can be <b>reduplicated</b> to emphasize the meaning of the word.</i>
<b>refer to repeatedly</b>	Send or direct for treatment, information, or a decision.
<b>rehearse</b>	Supervise (a performer or group) during a rehearsal. <i>Criticisms of factory farming have been <b>rehearsed</b> often enough.</i>
<b>reiterate</b>	Say something again or a number of times, typically for emphasis or clarity. <i>I just want to forget it all he <b>reiterated</b>.</i>
<b>reoccur</b>	Occur again or repeatedly. <i>Ulcers tend to <b>reoccur</b> after treatment has stopped.</i>
<b>repeat oneself</b>	Make or do or perform again.
<b>replay</b>	Play again. <i>She <b>replayed</b> in her mind every detail of the night before.</i>
<b>replicate</b>	Make or do or perform again. <i>These findings have been <b>replicated</b> by Metzger and Antes.</i>
<b>reprise</b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>He <b>reprises</b> his role as the vigilante architect.</i>
<b>reprize</b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition.
<b>reproduce</b>	Make a copy or equivalent of. <i>He <b>reproduced</b> the feeling of sadness in the portrait.</i>
<b>rerun</b>	Rerun a performance of a play for example. <i>Bush wants to <b>rerun</b> in 1996.</i>
<b>reshow</b>	Show for a second or subsequent time. <i>The programme will be <b>reshown</b> on August 11.</i>
<b>restate</b>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He <b>restated</b> his opposition to abortion.</i>
<b>retell</b>	Tell (a story) again or differently. <i>Walker <b>retells</b> the history of the world from the black perspective.</i>
<b>run through again</b>	Reduce or cause to be reduced from a solid to a liquid state, usually by heating.
<b>say again</b>	State as one's opinion or judgement; declare.
<b>take over</b>	Require as useful, just, or proper.
<b>talk constantly</b>	Reveal information.

Divulge confidential information or secrets.

**talk repeatedly**

Use language.

- *Force was not—repeat, not—to be used.*
- *A watch repeater that repeats hours and quarters.*
- *I don't intend to let history repeat itself.*
- *'Are you hurt?' he repeated.*
- *She repeated what I'd said.*
- *That cucumber repeated on me for hours.*
- *Billy repeated his question.*
- *The thirteen episodes from the first two series were constantly repeated.*
- *The first team in nineteen years to repeat as NBA champions.*
- *Mark had to repeat first and second grades.*

## Associations of "Repeat" (30 Words)

<b>again</b>	Returning to a previous position or condition. <i>They rehearsed the scene <b>again</b>.</i>
<b>alliteration</b>	Use of the same consonant at the beginning of each stressed syllable in a line of verse. <i>The <b>alliteration</b> of sweet birds sang.</i>
<b>constantly</b>	Without variation or change, in every case. <i><b>Constantly</b> kind and gracious.</i>
<b>contents</b>	A list of divisions (chapters or articles) and the pages on which they start. <i>He emptied the <b>contents</b> of his pockets.</i>
<b>continue</b>	Continue a certain state condition or activity. <i><b>Continue</b> the family tradition.</i>
<a href="#"><u>deny</u></a>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>Both firms <b>deny</b> any responsibility for the tragedy.</i>
<a href="#"><u>ditto</u></a>	The same thing again used in lists and accounts and often indicated by a ditto mark under the word or figure to be repeated. <i>The next speaker <b>dittoed</b> her argument.</i>
<a href="#"><u>echo</u></a>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>The flower arrangement was created as an <b>echo</b> of a client's still life.</i>
<b>habit</b>	Put a habit on. <i>A boy <b>habited</b> as a serving lad.</i>
<b>habitually</b>	According to habit or custom. <i>Does he lie <b>habitually</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>hobby</u></a>	An early type of bicycle without pedals, propelled by pushing the feet against the ground. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
<b>iterate</b>	Perform or utter repeatedly. <i>The function <b>iterates</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>once</u></a>	At some time in the past; formerly. <i><b>Once</b> I ran into her.</i>
<a href="#"><u>onomatopoeia</u></a>	The use of onomatopoeia for literary effect.
<b>overexertion</b>	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
<a href="#"><u>paraphrase</u></a>	Express the meaning of (something written or spoken) using different words, especially to achieve greater clarity. <i>Scattered here and there in the text are frank <b>paraphrases</b> of lines from Virgil Cicero and Quintilian.</i>

<b>phonetic</b>	Relating to phonetics. <i>A <b>phonetic</b> alphabet.</i>
<b>pummel</b>	Strike repeatedly with the fists. <i>He felt like a boxer who had been <b>pummelled</b> mercilessly against the ropes.</i>
<b>recapitulate</b>	Summarize briefly. <i>Many features of regeneration in the peripheral nervous system <b>recapitulate</b> development.</i>
<b>reiterate</b>	Say something again or a number of times, typically for emphasis or clarity. <i>I just want to forget it all he <b>reiterated</b>.</i>
<b>repeatedly</b>	Several time. <i>They have been warned <b>repeatedly</b> with no effect.</i>
<b>repeating</b>	The act of doing or performing again.
<b>repetition</b>	A thing repeated. <i>Her comments are worthy of <b>repetition</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>reprise</u></a>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>He <b>reprises</b> his role as the vigilante architect.</i>
<a href="#"><u>restate</u></a>	State (something) again or differently, especially more clearly or convincingly. <i>He <b>restated</b> his opposition to abortion.</i>
<b>review</b>	Hold a review of troops. <i>His case comes up for <b>review</b> in January.</i>
<b>say</b>	Utter aloud. <i>The registrar <b>says</b> that I owe the school money.</i>
<b>speak</b>	(of a musical instrument or other object) make a sound when functioning. <i>I wish to <b>speak</b> privately with you.</i>
<b>tautology</b>	The saying of the same thing twice over in different words, generally considered to be a fault of style (e.g. they arrived one after the other in succession). <i>The statement he is brave or he is not brave is a <b>tautology</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>warn</u></a>	Ask to go away. <i>They <b>warned</b> against false optimism.</i>



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
