
#### **Definitions of "Repeat" as a noun**

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "repeat" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A mark indicating a passage to be repeated.

replication	A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one. <i>Scientists will not believe an experimental result until they have seen at least one</i> <b>replication</b> .




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# rerun An event or programme which is run again. She likes to watch I love Lucy reruns.

#### Definitions of "Repeat" as a verb


According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "repeat" as a verb can have the following definitions:

reprize	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition.
reproduce	Make a copy or equivalent of. <i>He <b>reproduce</b>d the feeling of sadness in the portrait.</i>
rerun	Rerun a performance of a play for example. <i>Bush wants to <b>rerun</b> in 1996.</i>
reshow	Show for a second or subsequent time. The programme will be <b>reshow</b> n on August 11.
<u>restate</u>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He <b>restate</b>d his opposition to abortion.</i>



# Associations of "Repeat" (30 Words)

again	Returning to a previous position or condition. They rehearsed the scene <b>again</b> .
alliteration	Use of the same consonant at the beginning of each stressed syllable in a line of verse. The <b>alliteration</b> of sweet birds sang.
constantly	Without variation or change, in every case. <i>Constantly kind and gracious.</i>
contents	A list of divisions (chapters or articles) and the pages on which they start. <i>He emptied the contents of his pockets.</i>
continue	Continue a certain state condition or activity. <i>Continue</i> the family tradition.
<u>deny</u>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. Both firms <b>deny</b> any responsibility for the tragedy.
<u>ditto</u>	The same thing again used in lists and accounts and often indicated by a ditto mark under the word or figure to be repeated. <i>The next speaker dittoed her argument.</i>
<u>echo</u>	Ring or echo with sound. The flower arrangement was created as an <b>echo</b> of a client s still life.
habit	Put a habit on. A boy <b>habit</b> ed as a serving lad.
habitually	According to habit or custom. Does he lie <b>habitually</b> .
<u>hobby</u>	An early type of bicycle without pedals, propelled by pushing the feet against the ground. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
iterate	Perform or utter repeatedly. <i>The function <b>iterate</b>s.</i>
<u>once</u>	At some time in the past; formerly. <b>Once</b> I ran into her.
onomatopoeia	The use of onomatopoeia for literary effect.
overexertion	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
<u>paraphrase</u>	Express the meaning of (something written or spoken) using different words, especially to achieve greater clarity. Scattered here and there in the text are frank <b>paraphrase</b> s of lines from Virgil Cicero and Quintilian.



phonetic	Relating to phonetics. A <b>phonetic</b> alphabet.
pummel	Strike repeatedly with the fists. <i>He felt like a boxer who had been <b>pummel</b>led mercilessly against the ropes.</i>
recapitulate	Summarize briefly. Many features of regeneration in the peripheral nervous system <b>recapitulate</b> development.
reiterate	Say something again or a number of times, typically for emphasis or clarity. <i>I just want to forget it all he <b>reiterate</b>d.</i>
repeatedly	Several time. They have been warned <b>repeatedly</b> with no effect.
repeating	The act of doing or performing again.
repetition	A thing repeated. <i>Her comments are worthy of <b>repetition</b>.</i>
<u>reprise</u>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>He <b>reprise</b>s his role as the vigilante architect.</i>
<u>restate</u>	State (something) again or differently, especially more clearly or convincingly. <i>He <b>restate</b>d his opposition to abortion.</i>
review	Hold a review of troops. His case comes up for <b>review</b> in January.
say	Utter aloud. The registrar <b>say</b> s that I owe the school money.
speak	(of a musical instrument or other object) make a sound when functioning. <i>I wish to <b>speak</b> privately with you.</i>
tautology	The saying of the same thing twice over in different words, generally considered to be a fault of style (e.g. they arrived one after the other in succession). The statement he is brave or he is not brave is a <b>tautology</b> .
<u>warn</u>	Ask to go away. They <b>warn</b> ed against false optimism.
