Synonyms of "Repentance" as a noun (16 Words)

compunction	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed). <i>They used their tanks without compunction.</i>
contriteness	An elaborate or deceitful scheme contrived to deceive or evade.
contrition	(in the Roman Catholic Church) the repentance of past sins during or after confession. <i>Prayers of contrition.</i>
guilt	The fact of having committed a specified or implied offence or crime. <i>It is the duty of the prosecution to prove the prisoner s guilt.</i>
pangs of conscience	A sudden sharp feeling.

penance	A religious observance or other duty required of a person by a priest as part of this sacrament to indicate repentance. <i>He had done public penance for those hasty words.</i>
penitence	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of penitence.</i>
prickings of conscience	Motivation deriving logically from ethical or moral principles that govern a person's thoughts and actions.
regret	A feeling of sadness, repentance, or disappointment over an occurrence or something that one has done or failed to do. <i>He wrote a note expressing his regret.</i>
<u>remorse</u>	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed). <i>They were filled with remorse and shame.</i>
ruefulness	Sadness associated with some wrong done or some disappointment.
self-condemnation	An admission that you have failed to do or be something you know you should do or be.
self-reproach	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed).
<u>shame</u>	An unfortunate development. <i>Ignorance of Latin would be a disgrace and a shame to any public man.</i>
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>A bereaved person needs time to work through their sorrow.</i>
sorrowfulness	Sadness associated with some wrong done or some disappointment.



Usage Examples of "Repentance" as a noun

- *Each person who turns to God in genuine repentance and faith will be saved.*



Associations of "Repentance" (30 Words)

<u>apologetic</u>	Constituting a formal defence or justification of a theory or doctrine. <i>An apologetic smile.</i>
<u>atone</u>	Turn away from sin or do penitence. <i>A human sacrifice to atone for the sin.</i>
atonement	(in religious contexts) reparation or expiation for sin. <i>He submitted his resignation as an act of atonement.</i>
compunction	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed). <i>They used their tanks without compunction.</i>
confess	Confess to a punishable or reprehensible deed usually under pressure. <i>She confessed that she had taken the money.</i>
<u>confession</u>	The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>His words are a political confession of faith.</i>

confessor	A person to whom another confides personal problems. <i>She sent for her confessor because she was in mortal sin.</i>
contrite	Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. <i>A contrite tone.</i>
contrition	The state of feeling remorseful and penitent. <i>To show contrition for his crime he offered to do community service.</i>
expiate	Make amends for. <i>Expiate one's sins.</i>
forgive	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I was willing to forgive all her faults for the sake of our friendship.</i>
guilty	Responsible for or chargeable with a reprehensible act. <i>He felt guilty about the way he had treated her.</i>
penance	Impose a penance on. <i>He had done public penance for those hasty words.</i>
penitence	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of penitence.</i>
penitent	(Roman Catholic Church) a person who repents for wrongdoing (a Roman Catholic may be admitted to penance under the direction of a confessor). <i>A penitent expression.</i>
penitential	Showing or constituting penance. <i>Wrote a penitential letter apologizing for her hasty words.</i>
regret	Express with regret. <i>I always regretted that I never trained.</i>
regretful	Feeling or expressing regret or sorrow or a sense of loss over something done or undone. <i>He sounded regretful but pointed out that he had committed himself.</i>
<u>regretfully</u>	It is regrettable that. <i>He sighed regretfully.</i>
<u>remorse</u>	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed). <i>They were filled with remorse and shame.</i>
remorseful	Filled with remorse; sorry. <i>The defendant was remorseful for what he had done.</i>
repent	Feel regret or penitence about. <i>He repented of his action.</i>
repentant	Feeling or expressing remorse for misdeeds. <i>He is truly repentant for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>

rue	A street or road in France. <i>Ferguson will rue the day he turned down that offer.</i>
<u>rueful</u>	Expressing sorrow or regret, especially in a wry or humorous way. <i>She gave a rueful grin.</i>
<u>salvation</u>	Saving someone or something from harm or from an unpleasant situation. <i>They turned to individualism as their salvation.</i>
sceptic	A person who doubts the truth of Christianity and other religions; an atheist.
scruple	Raise scruples. <i>In the choice of a second wife one scruple of prudence is worth a pound of passion.</i>
<u>sin</u>	Commit a sin. <i>I sinned and brought shame down on us.</i>
<u>sinner</u>	A person who sins (without repenting). <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i>
