## **Repertoire as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Repertoire" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “repertoire” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A stock of skills or types of behaviour that a person habitually uses.*
- *The whole body of items which are regularly performed.*
- *The entire range of skills or aptitudes or devices used in a particular field or occupation.*
- *A stock of plays, dances, or items that a company or a performer knows or is prepared to perform.*
- *A collection of works (plays, songs, operas, ballets) that an artist or company can perform and do perform for short intervals on a regular schedule.*



### **Synonyms of "Repertoire" as a noun (4 Words)**

**collection** A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection.  
A record *collection*.

<b>range</b>	A place for shooting (firing or driving) projectiles of various kinds. <i>No one would know if he had survived to live out his life in the <b>ranges</b> back from the river country.</i>
<b>repertory</b>	Repertory theatres regarded collectively. <i>His long apprenticeship in <b>repertory</b> was as satisfying as what he is doing now.</i>
<u><b>stock</b></u>	Farm animals such as cattle pigs and sheep bred and kept for their meat or milk livestock. <i>He owns a controlling share of the company s <b>stock</b>.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Repertoire" as a noun

- *His repertoire of denigratory gestures.*

## Associations of "Repertoire" (30 Words)

<b>aria</b>	A long accompanied song for a solo voice, typically one in an opera or oratorio.
<b>cantata</b>	A musical composition for voices and orchestra based on a religious text.
<b>canto</b>	The highest part (usually the melody) in a piece of choral music. <i>Dante s Divine Comedy has 100 <b>cantos</b>.</i>
<b>choral</b>	Engaged in or concerned with singing. <i>A <b>choral</b> work.</i>
<u><b>chorus</b></u>	A section of text spoken by the chorus in drama. <i>Yes the children <b>chorused</b>.</i>
<b>classical</b>	(of art or architecture) influenced by ancient Greek or Roman forms or principles. <i><b>Classical</b> mythology.</i>
<u><b>concert</b></u>	A performance of music by players or singers not involving theatrical staging. <i><b>Concert</b> one s differences.</i>
<b>concerto</b>	A musical composition for a solo instrument or instruments accompanied by an orchestra, especially one conceived on a relatively large scale.
<u><b>ensemble</b></u>	The coordination between performers executing an ensemble passage. <i>A string <b>ensemble</b>.</i>
<b>guitar</b>	A stringed instrument usually having six strings; played by strumming or plucking.

<b>lied</b>	A German art song of the 19th century for voice and piano.
<b>music</b>	Music the sounds produced by singers or musical instruments or reproductions of such sounds. <i>The <b>music</b> was open on a stand.</i>
<b>opera</b>	A building for the performance of opera. <i>A very grand programme of <b>opera</b> and ballet.</i>
<b>oratorio</b>	A musical composition for voices and orchestra based on a religious text.
<b>orchestra</b>	The part of a theatre where the orchestra plays typically in front of the stage and on a lower level.
<b>orchestration</b>	The arrangement or scoring of music for orchestral performance. <i>Prokofiev s mastery of <b>orchestration</b>.</i>
<b>overture</b>	An independent orchestral composition in one movement. <i>He began making <b>overtures</b> to British merchant banks.</i>
<b>performance</b>	The extent to which an investment is profitable, especially in relation to other investments. <i>Pay increases are now being linked more closely to <b>performance</b>.</i>
<b>pianist</b>	A person who plays the piano, especially professionally.
<b>piano</b>	Used as a direction in music; to be played relatively softly. <i>The <b>piano</b> passages in the composition.</i>
<b>playing</b>	The act of playing a musical instrument.
<b>rehearsal</b>	The action or process of rehearsing. <i>I ve had a fortnight in <b>rehearsal</b>.</i>
<b>rondo</b>	A musical form with a recurring leading theme, often found in the final movement of a sonata or concerto.
<b>sing</b>	A meeting for amateur singing. <i>The kettle was beginning to <b>sing</b>.</i>
<b>soloist</b>	A musician or singer who performs a solo. <i>He appears as a concerto <b>soloist</b> with all the great British orchestras.</i>
<b>sonata</b>	A composition for an instrumental soloist often with a piano accompaniment typically in several movements with one or more in sonata form.
<b>soprano</b>	A part written for a soprano voice. <i><b>Soprano</b> voice.</i>
<b>symphony</b>	A long and complex sonata for symphony orchestra. <i>We heard the Vienna <b>symphony</b>.</i>
<b>viola</b>	Any of the numerous plants of the genus Viola.

**violin**

Bowed stringed instrument that is the highest member of the violin family this instrument has four strings and a hollow body and an unfretted fingerboard and is played with a bow.
