**soul-destroying** Destructive to the spirit or soul.

- tediousUsing or containing too many words.Tediousdays on the train.Causing one to feel bored or annoyed.
- tiresome The tiresome chirping of a cricket.

**uninteresting** Characteristic or suggestive of an institution especially in being uniform or dull or unimaginative.

A very **uninteresting** account of her trip.

wearisome Causing one to feel tired or bored.

Other people s dreams are dreadfully wearisome.

| habit             | Put a habit on.<br>She had a <b>habit</b> twirling the ends of her hair.  |
| habituate         | Make or become accustomed or used to something.<br>Bears can become <b>habituate</b> d to people very easily.   |
| homologous        | (of a series of chemical compounds) having the same functional group but<br>differing in composition by a fixed group of atoms.<br><i>The wing of a bat and the arm of a man are <b>homologous</b>.</i> |
| incessant         | Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.<br><i>The <b>incessant</b> beat of the music.</i>   |
| <u>nonstop</u>    | At all times.<br>How many <b>nonstop</b> s are there to Dallas.   |
| <u>perennial</u>  | A perennial plant.<br>He s a <b>perennial</b> student.  |
| perpetuation      | The act of prolonging something.<br><b>Perpetuation</b> of the species is our purpose.  |
| recurrence        | The fact of occurring again.<br>A drug used to prevent the <b>recurrence</b> of breast cancer.  |
