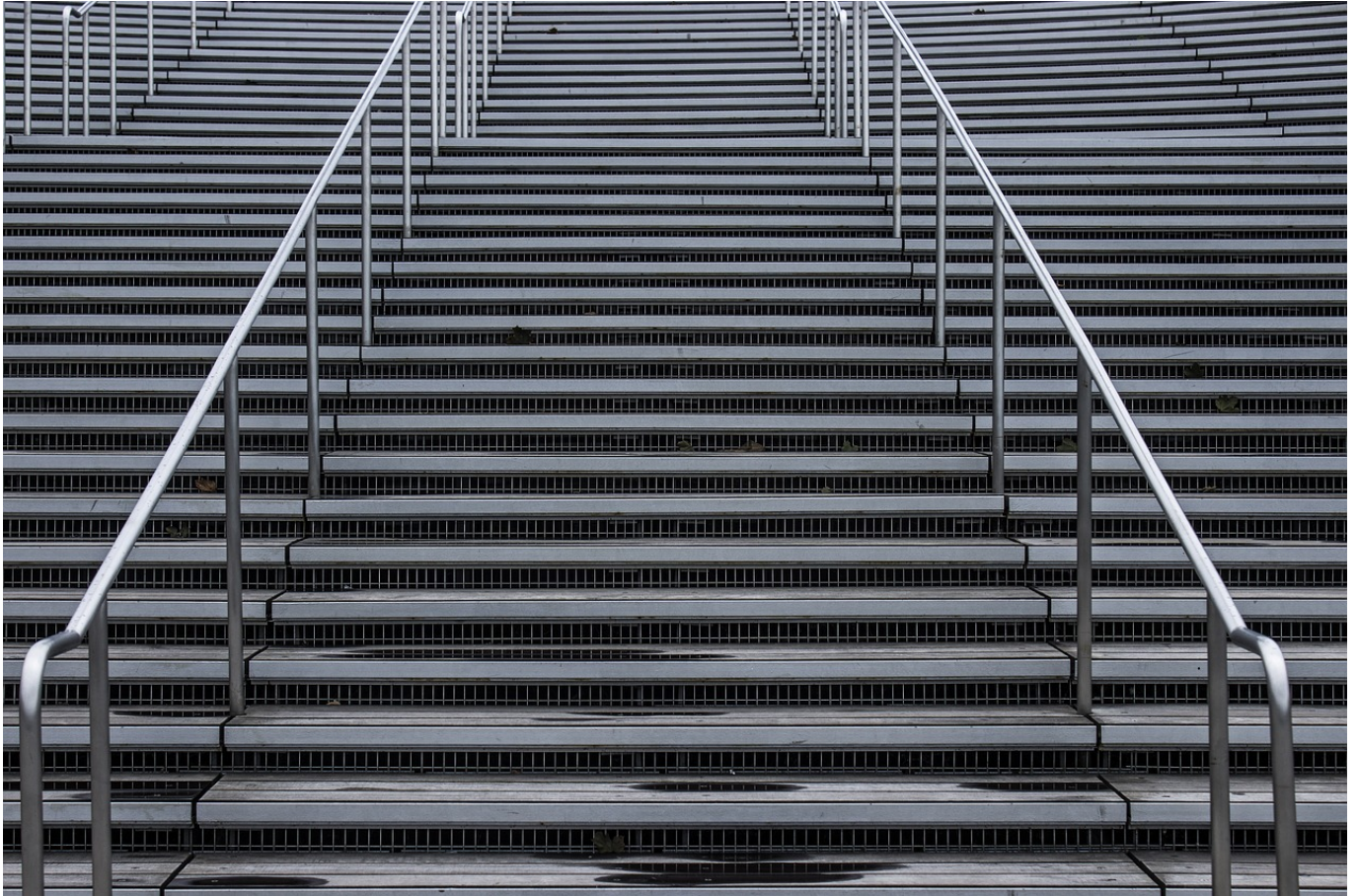

## Repetitive as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Repetitive" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “repetitive” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Characterized by repetition.*
- *Containing or characterized by repetition, especially when unnecessary or tiresome.*
- *Repetitive and persistent.*



## Synonyms of "Repetitive" as an adjective (12 Words)

<b>boring</b>	Not interesting; tedious. <i>I ve got a <b>boring</b> job in an office.</i>
<b>dreary</b>	Lacking in liveliness or charm or surprise. <i>The <b>dreary</b> round of working eating and trying to sleep.</i>
<b>humdrum</b>	Lacking excitement or variety; boringly monotonous. <i><b>Humdrum</b> routine work.</i>
<b><u>insistent</u></b>	Demanding attention. <i>Tony s soft <b>insistent</b> questioning.</i>
<b><u>monotonous</u></b>	Dull, tedious, and repetitious; lacking in variety and interest. <i>The statistics that he quotes with <b>monotonous</b> regularity.</i>
<b><u>mundane</u></b>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>His <b>mundane</b> humdrum existence.</i>
<b>repetitious</b>	Characterized by repetition. <i>Many hours of <b>repetitious</b> labour.</i>

**soul-destroying** Destructive to the spirit or soul.

**tedious** Using or containing too many words.  
*Tedious days on the train.*

**tiresome** Causing one to feel bored or annoyed.  
*The tiresome chirping of a cricket.*

**uninteresting** Characteristic or suggestive of an institution especially in being uniform or dull or unimaginative.  
*A very uninteresting account of her trip.*

**wearisome** Causing one to feel tired or bored.  
*Other people's dreams are dreadfully wearisome.*

## Associations of "Repetitive" (30 Words)

<b><u>acclimate</u></b>	Harden off (a plant). <i>It will take a few days to get <b>acclimated</b> to the altitude.</i>
<b>accustom</b>	Make psychologically or physically used (to something). <i>Sixth form education is supposed to <b>accustom</b> pupils to think for themselves.</i>
<b>behavior</b>	Behavioral attributes the way a person behaves toward other people. <i>The <b>behavior</b> of small particles can be studied in experiments.</i>
<b><u>ceaseless</u></b>	Constant and unending. <i>The fort was subjected to <b>ceaseless</b> bombardment.</i>
<b>cession</b>	The act of ceding. <i>The <b>cession</b> of twenty important towns.</i>
<b><u>cliche</u></b>	A trite or obvious remark.

<b>constant</b>	Remaining the same over a period of time. <i>A <b>constant</b> lover.</i>
<b><u>continual</u></b>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i><b>Continual</b> is often used interchangeably with continuous.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Forming a series with no exceptions or reversals. <i>The whole performance is enacted in one <b>continuous</b> movement.</i>
<b>conventional</b>	(of a person) greatly or overly concerned with what is generally held to be socially acceptable. <i>West made a <b>conventional</b> bid showing a hand with at least 5 spades.</i>
<b>familiarize</b>	Make familiar or conversant with. <i>Exercises which will help to <b>familiarize</b> the terms used.</i>
<b>habit</b>	Put a habit on. <i>She had a <b>habit</b> twirling the ends of her hair.</i>
<b>habituate</b>	Make or become accustomed or used to something. <i>Bears can become <b>habituated</b> to people very easily.</i>
<b>homologous</b>	(of a series of chemical compounds) having the same functional group but differing in composition by a fixed group of atoms. <i>The wing of a bat and the arm of a man are <b>homologous</b>.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The <b>incessant</b> beat of the music.</i>
<b><u>nonstop</u></b>	At all times. <i>How many <b>nonstops</b> are there to Dallas.</i>
<b><u>perennial</u></b>	A perennial plant. <i>He s a <b>perennial</b> student.</i>
<b>perpetuation</b>	The act of prolonging something. <i><b>Perpetuation</b> of the species is our purpose.</i>
<b><u>recurrence</u></b>	The fact of occurring again. <i>A drug used to prevent the <b>recurrence</b> of breast cancer.</i>
<b><u>recurrent</u></b>	Occurring often or repeatedly. <i>She had a <b>recurrent</b> dream about falling.</i>
<b><u>recurring</u></b>	Coming back. <i>They are haunted by a <b>recurring</b> image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
<b><u>relentless</u></b>	Unceasingly intense. <i>The <b>relentless</b> beat of the drums.</i>

<b>repeated</b>	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>There were <b>repeated</b> attempts to negotiate.</i>
<b><u>sequence</u></b>	Arrange in a sequence. <i>They <b>sequenced</b> the human genome.</i>
<b>sequential</b>	In regular succession without gaps. <i>A series of <b>sequential</b> steps.</i>
<b>seriatim</b>	Taking one subject after another in regular order; point by point. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters <b>seriatim</b>.</i>
<b>stereotyped</b>	Viewed or represented as a stereotype. <i><b>Stereotyped</b> phrases of condolence.</i>
<b>strain</b>	Rub through a strainer or process in an electric blender. <i>The usual type of chair puts an enormous <b>strain</b> on the spine.</i>
<b>unceasing</b>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The <b>unceasing</b> efforts of the staff.</i>
<b>uninterrupted</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>An <b>uninterrupted</b> flow of traffic.</i>
