### Definitions of "Replica" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “replica” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An exact copy or model of something, especially one on a smaller scale.*
- *A duplicate of an original artistic work.*
- *Copy that is not the original; something that has been copied.*



## Synonyms of "Replica" as a noun (14 Words)

<b>clone</b>	An organism or cell, or group of organisms or cells, produced asexually from one ancestor or stock, to which they are genetically identical. <i>Guitarists who are labelled Hendrix <b>clones</b>.</i>
<b>copy</b>	A thing made to be similar or identical to another thing. <i><b>Copy</b> for the next issue must be submitted by the beginning of the month.</i>
<b>double</b>	A double measure of spirits. <i>She had seen her husband s <b>double</b>.</i>
<b><u>duplicate</u></b>	A copy of an original. <i>He made a <b>duplicate</b> for the files.</i>
<b><u>image</u></b>	A standard or typical example. <i>Her work juxtaposed <b>images</b> from serious and popular art.</i>
<b>living image</b>	The experience of being alive; the course of human events and activities.

<b>lookalike</b>	A person or thing that closely resembles another, especially someone who looks very similar to a famous person. <i>An Elvis Presley <b>lookalike</b>.</i>
<b>mirror image</b>	Polished surface that forms images by reflecting light.
<b>model</b>	Representation of something (sometimes on a smaller scale). <i>The computer program was based on a <b>model</b> of the circulatory and respiratory systems.</i>
<b>perfect likeness</b>	A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed (sometimes regarded as perfective aspect).
<b>picture</b>	Illustrations used to decorate or explain a text. <i>He described his mental <b>picture</b> of his assailant.</i>
<b>replication</b>	A pleading made by a plaintiff in reply to the defendant's plea or answer. <i>On its own <b>replication</b> does not validate a theory derived from experimental results.</i>
<b><u>reproduction</u></b>	The production of offspring by a sexual or asexual process. <i>Gutenberg's <b>reproduction</b> of holy texts was far more efficient.</i>
<b><u>twin</u></b>	A twin engined aircraft. <i>The <b>twins</b> were approaching their third birthday.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Replica" as a noun

- *It is a replica of an antique plaque.*
- *A replica of the Empire State Building.*



## Associations of "Replica" (30 Words)

<b>copy</b>	Reproduce or make an exact copy of. <i>The problem is telling which is the original document and which the <b>copy</b>.</i>
<b><u>duplicate</u></b>	Make a duplicate or duplicates of. <i>Books may be disposed of if they are <b>duplicates</b>.</i>
<b><u>emulate</u></b>	Imitate the function of (another system), as by modifying the hardware or the software. <i>Hers is not a hairstyle I wish to <b>emulate</b>.</i>
<b>emulation</b>	Ambition to equal or excel. <i>Software <b>emulation</b> of complete systems.</i>
<b>facsimile</b>	Send something via a facsimile machine. <i>A <b>facsimile</b> of the manuscript.</i>
<b>fax</b>	Contact someone by fax. <i>The equipment consists of four word processors a <b>fax</b> and a photocopier.</i>
<b>imitate</b>	Appear like, as in behavior or appearance. <i>Life <b>imitate</b> art.</i>

<b><u>imitation</u></b>	The doctrine that representations of nature or human behavior should be accurate imitations. <i>A child learns to speak by <b>imitation</b>.</i>
<b>imitator</b>	Someone who (fraudulently) assumes the appearance of another. <i>The show's success has sparked off many <b>imitators</b>.</i>
<b>likeness</b>	Picture consisting of a graphic image of a person or thing. <i>Her <b>likeness</b> to him was astonishing.</i>
<b><u>microcosm</u></b>	A miniature model of something. <i>The city is a <b>microcosm</b> of modern Malaysia.</i>
<b>mimesis</b>	Imitative representation of the real world in art and literature. <i>Barth has always detached his use of plot from <b>mimesis</b>.</i>
<b>mimetic</b>	Exhibiting mimicry. <i>The <b>mimetic</b> tendency of infancy.</i>
<b><u>mimic</u></b>	An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>Tiger beetles are <b>mimicked</b> by grasshoppers.</i>
<b>pastiche</b>	An artistic work consisting of a medley of pieces imitating various sources. <i>Gauguin took himself to a Pacific island and <b>pastiched</b> the primitive art he found there.</i>
<b>photocopy</b>	Make a photocopy of. <i>You can <b>photocopy</b> the entry form.</i>
<b>plagiarism</b>	The act of plagiarizing; taking someone's words or ideas as if they were your own. <i>There were accusations of <b>plagiarism</b>.</i>
<b>plagiarize</b>	Take without referencing from someone else's writing or speech; of intellectual property. <i>The author claims she was <b>plagiarized</b>.</i>
<b>pretender</b>	A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives. <i>The <b>pretender</b> to the throne.</i>
<b>pseudo</b>	Not genuine; spurious or sham. <i>We are talking about real journalists and not the <b>pseudo</b> kind.</i>
<b><u>replicate</u></b>	(of genetic material or a living organism) reproduce or give rise to a copy of itself. <i>In order to <b>replicate</b> cells must make copies of their DNA.</i>
<b>replication</b>	(genetics) the process whereby DNA makes a copy of itself before cell division. <i>On its own <b>replication</b> does not validate a theory derived from experimental results.</i>

<b>reproduce</b>	Produce a copy of. <i>An individual needs to avoid being eaten until it has <b>reproduced</b>.</i>
<b>reproducible</b>	Able to be reproduced or copied. <i>The logo should be easily <b>reproducible</b>.</i>
<b>resemble</b>	Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like. <i>This paper <b>resembles</b> my own work.</i>
<b>sample</b>	Take a sample or samples of something for analysis. <i>A urine <b>sample</b>.</i>
<b>simulate</b>	Create a representation or model of. <i>Future population changes were <b>simulated</b> by computer.</i>
<b>sized</b>	Having the surface treated or coated with sizing. <i>A grapefruit <b>sized</b> lump.</i>
<b>triplicate</b>	Existing in three copies or examples. <i><b>Triplicate</b> the letter for the committee.</i>
<b>visualization</b>	The formation of a mental image of something. <i>The story uses descriptive language to aid <b>visualization</b>.</i>
