| <b>lookalike</b>           | A person or thing that closely resembles another, especially someone who looks very similar to a famous person.<br><i>An Elvis Presley <b>lookalike</b>.</i>                     |
| <b>mirror image</b>        | Polished surface that forms images by reflecting light.  |
| <b>model</b>               | Representation of something (sometimes on a smaller scale).<br><i>The computer program was based on a <b>model</b> of the circulatory and respiratory systems.</i>               |
| <b>perfect likeness</b>    | A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed (sometimes regarded as perfective aspect).  |
| <b>picture</b>             | Illustrations used to decorate or explain a text.<br><i>He described his mental <b>picture</b> of his assailant.</i>   |
| <b>replication</b>         | A pleading made by a plaintiff in reply to the defendant's plea or answer.<br><i>On its own <b>replication</b> does not validate a theory derived from experimental results.</i> |
| <b><u>reproduction</u></b> | The production of offspring by a sexual or asexual process.<br><i>Gutenberg's <b>reproduction</b> of holy texts was far more efficient.</i>                                      |
| <b><u>twin</u></b>         | A twin engined aircraft.<br><i>The <b>twins</b> were approaching their third birthday.</i>   |

| <b>imitator</b>         | Someone who (fraudulently) assumes the appearance of another.<br><i>The show's success has sparked off many <b>imitators</b>.</i>  |
| <b>likeness</b>         | Picture consisting of a graphic image of a person or thing.<br><i>Her <b>likeness</b> to him was astonishing.</i>  |
| <b><u>microcosm</u></b> | A miniature model of something.<br><i>The city is a <b>microcosm</b> of modern Malaysia.</i>   |
| <b>mimesis</b>          | Imitative representation of the real world in art and literature.<br><i>Barth has always detached his use of plot from <b>mimesis</b>.</i>   |
| <b>mimetic</b>          | Exhibiting mimicry.<br><i>The <b>mimetic</b> tendency of infancy.</i>  |
| <b><u>mimic</u></b>     | An animal or plant that mimics another.<br><i>Tiger beetles are <b>mimicked</b> by grasshoppers.</i>   |
| <b>pastiche</b>         | An artistic work consisting of a medley of pieces imitating various sources.<br><i>Gauguin took himself to a Pacific island and <b>pastiched</b> the primitive art he found there.</i> |
| <b>photocopy</b>        | Make a photocopy of.<br><i>You can <b>photocopy</b> the entry form.</i>  |
| <b>plagiarism</b>       | The act of plagiarizing; taking someone's words or ideas as if they were your own.<br><i>There were accusations of <b>plagiarism</b>.</i>  |
| <b>plagiarize</b>       | Take without referencing from someone else's writing or speech; of intellectual property.<br><i>The author claims she was <b>plagiarized</b>.</i>                                      |
| <b>pretender</b>        | A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives.<br><i>The <b>pretender</b> to the throne.</i>        |
| <b>pseudo</b>           | Not genuine; spurious or sham.<br><i>We are talking about real journalists and not the <b>pseudo</b> kind.</i>   |
| <b><u>replicate</u></b> | (of genetic material or a living organism) reproduce or give rise to a copy of itself.<br><i>In order to <b>replicate</b> cells must make copies of their DNA.</i>                     |
| <b>replication</b>      | (genetics) the process whereby DNA makes a copy of itself before cell division.<br><i>On its own <b>replication</b> does not validate a theory derived from experimental results.</i>  |

| <b>resemble</b>      | Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like.<br><i>This paper <b>resembles</b> my own work.</i> |
| <b>sample</b>        | Take a sample or samples of something for analysis.<br><i>A urine <b>sample</b>.</i>   |
| <b>simulate</b>      | Create a representation or model of.<br><i>Future population changes were <b>simulated</b> by computer.</i>  |
