Replicate as a Verb

Definitions of "Replicate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “replicate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make an exact copy of; reproduce.*
- *Bend or turn backward.*
- *(of genetic material or a living organism) reproduce or give rise to a copy of itself.*
- *Repeat (a scientific experiment or trial) to obtain a consistent result.*
- *Reproduce or make an exact copy of.*
- *Make or do or perform again.*



Synonyms of "Replicate" as a verb (9 Words)

- copy** Reproduce or make an exact copy of.
*I began to **copy** out the addresses.*
- double** Do double duty serve two purposes or have two functions.
*We struck out seaward to **double** the headland of the cape.*
- duplicate** Duplicate or match.
*Information sheets had to be typed and **duplicate**.*
- make a copy of** Add up to.
- make a replica of** Amount to.
- reduplicate** Repeat (a syllable or other linguistic element) exactly or with a slight change (e.g. hurly-burly, see-saw).
*The consonant **reduplicate** after a short vowel.*
- repeat** Repeat an earlier theme of a composition.
*Are you hurt he **repeated**.*

reproduce

Produce something very similar to (something else) in a different medium or context.

*Bacteria normally divide and **reproduce** themselves every twenty minutes.*

retroflex

Articulate (a consonant) with the tongue curled back against the palate.
*Indian accents can be characterized by the fact that speakers **retroflex** their consonants.*

- *In order to replicate, cells must make copies of their DNA.*
- *These findings have been replicated by Metzger and Antes.*
- *Replicate the cell.*
- *It might be impractical to replicate Eastern culture in the west.*
- *He could never replicate his brilliant performance of the magic trick.*

- *Interleukin-16 prevents the virus from replicating itself.*

<u>imitation</u>	The doctrine that representations of nature or human behavior should be accurate imitations. <i>He attempted an atrocious imitation of my English accent.</i>
imitator	Someone who (fraudulently) assumes the appearance of another. <i>The show's success has sparked off many imitators.</i>
likeness	The fact or quality of being alike; resemblance. <i>Her likeness to him was astonishing.</i>
<u>microcosm</u>	A miniature model of something. <i>The belief in correspondences between the Universe and Man between microcosm and macrocosm.</i>
mime	A practitioner of mime or a performer in a mime. <i>Mime is part of our cultural heritage.</i>
mimesis	Any disease that shows symptoms characteristic of another disease. <i>Culture is organized in terms of mimesis and desire.</i>
mimetic	Exhibiting mimicry. <i>Mimetic coloring of a butterfly.</i>
<u>mimic</u>	An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>The actor mimicked the President very accurately.</i>
pantomime	Express or represent by exaggerated mime. <i>They pantomimed picking up dropped food.</i>
pastiche	A musical composition consisting of a series of songs or other musical pieces from various sources. <i>A pastiche of literary models and sources.</i>
photocopy	Make a photocopy of. <i>You can photocopy the entry form.</i>

plagiarize	Take (the work or an idea of someone else) and pass it off as one's own. <i>He was fined 6 000 for having plagiarized the song.</i>
replica	An exact copy or model of something, especially one on a smaller scale. <i>A replica of the Empire State Building.</i>
replication	The act of making copies. <i>DNA replication.</i>
reproduce	Produce something very similar to (something else) in a different medium or context. <i>You ll be amazed to see how well half tones reproduce.</i>
reproducible	Able to be reproduced or copied. <i>Astonishingly reproducible results can be obtained.</i>
resemble	Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like. <i>This paper resembles my own work.</i>
sample	Take a sample or samples of something for analysis. <i>Piano samples.</i>
scribe	Write. <i>Mark the position of the lock body on the door edge then scribe a centre mark.</i>
simulate	Pretend to have or feel (an emotion). <i>It was impossible to force a smile to simulate pleasure.</i>
triplicate	A thing which is part of a set of three copies or corresponding parts. <i>Triplicate the letter for the committee.</i>
verbatim	In precisely the same words used by a writer or speaker. <i>He repeated her remarks verbatim.</i>
