<b>bad</b>	Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. A <b>bad</b> earthquake.
<b>blameworthy</b>	Deserving blame or censure as being wrong or evil or injurious. <b>Blameworthy</b> if not criminal behavior.
<b>condemnable</b>	Bringing or deserving severe rebuke or censure.
<b>criminal</b>	Guilty of crime or serious offense. A <b>criminal</b> offence.

<b>culpable</b>	Deserving blame or censure as being wrong or evil or injurious. <i>Mercy killings are less <b>culpable</b> than ordinary murders.</i>
<b>deplorable</b>	Bringing or deserving severe rebuke or censure. <i>A <b>deplorable</b> act of violence.</i>
<b>despicable</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>Would do something as <b>despicable</b> as murder.</i>
<b>discreditable</b>	Tending to bring harm to a reputation. <i>His marks were not at all <b>discreditable</b>.</i>
<b>disgraceful</b>	Shockingly unacceptable. <i>A <b>disgraceful</b> waste of money.</i>
<b>dishonourable</b>	Lacking honor or integrity; deserving dishonor. <i>His crimes are petty and <b>dishonourable</b>.</i>
<b>disreputable</b>	Not considered to be respectable in character or appearance. <i>He was heavy grubby and vaguely <b>disreputable</b>.</i>
<b>errant</b>	Straying from the right course or from accepted standards. <i>An <b>errant</b> breeze.</i>
<b>erring</b>	Having failed to adhere to the proper or accepted standards; having done wrong. <i>The strictest possible action should be taken against the <b>erring</b> officials.</i>
<b>ignoble</b>	Completely lacking nobility in character or quality or purpose. <i><b>Ignoble</b> feelings of intense jealousy.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	Not able to be protected against attack. <i>The towns were tactically <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>inexcusable</b>	Without excuse or justification. <i>Matt s behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>
<b>insufferable</b>	Too extreme to bear. <i>The heat would be <b>insufferable</b> by July.</i>
<b>objectionable</b>	Arousing distaste or opposition; unpleasant or offensive. <i>Found the politician s views <b>objectionable</b>.</i>
<b>odious</b>	Unequivocally detestable. <i><b>Odious</b> hypocrisy.</i>
<b>opprobrious</b>	Deserving or bringing disgrace or shame- Rachel Carson. <i>An <b>opprobrious</b> monument to human greed.</i>
<b>regrettable</b>	(of conduct or an event) giving rise to regret; undesirable; unwelcome. <i><b>Regrettable</b> remarks.</i>
<b>remiss</b>	Failing in what duty requires. <i><b>Remiss</b> of you not to pay your bills.</i>

<b>repugnant</b>	In conflict or incompatible with. <i>Cannibalism seems <b>repugnant</b> to us.</i>
<b>shameful</b>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation- Thackeray. <i>A <b>shameful</b> accusation.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>An <b>unacceptable</b> violation of personal freedom.</i>
<b>unforgivable</b>	Not excusable. <i>Losing your temper with him was <b>unforgivable</b>.</i>
<b>unjustifiable</b>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b>unpardonable</b>	Not admitting of pardon. <i>An <b>unpardonable</b> sin.</i>
<b>unworthy</b>	Not deserving respect or attention. <i>Many pieces are <b>unworthy</b> and ungrammatical.</i>
<b>vicious</b>	(of language or a line of reasoning) imperfect; defective. <i>A <b>vicious</b> assault.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Used of the side of cloth or clothing intended to face inward. <i>The <b>wrong</b> way to shuck clams.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Reprehensible" as an adjective

- *Adultery is as reprehensible for a husband as for a wife.*
- *His complacency and reprehensible laxity.*

## Associations of "Reprehensible" (30 Words)

<b>abject</b>	Showing utter resignation or hopelessness. <i><b>Abject</b> surrender.</i>
<b>absentminded</b>	Lost in thought; showing preoccupation. <i>An <b>absentminded</b> professor.</i>
<b>contemptible</b>	Deserving of contempt or scorn. <i>A display of <b>contemptible</b> cowardice.</i>
<b>culpable</b>	Deserving blame. <i>Mercy killings are less <b>culpable</b> than ordinary murders.</i>
<b>degraded</b>	Lowered in value. <i>Deplorably dissipated and <b>degraded</b>.</i>

<b><u>degrading</u></b>	Causing a loss of self-respect; humiliating. <i>The vicious and <b>degrading</b> cult of violence.</i>
<b>deplorable</b>	Deserving strong condemnation; completely unacceptable. <i>My finances were in a <b>deplorable</b> state.</i>
<b>despicable</b>	Deserving hatred and contempt. <i>Would do something as <b>despicable</b> as murder.</i>
<b>disgraced</b>	Having fallen from favour or a position of power or honour; discredited. <i>The <b>disgraced</b> city financier.</i>
<b><u>disgraceful</u></b>	Shockingly unacceptable. <i>It is <b>disgraceful</b> that they should be denied unemployment benefits.</i>
<b>dishonorable</b>	Lacking honor or integrity; deserving dishonor. <i><b>Dishonorable</b> in thought and deed.</i>
<b>distract</b>	Having the attention diverted especially because of anxiety. <i>He seemed oddly <b>distract</b>.</i>
<b>forgetful</b>	Apt or likely not to remember. <i>I m a bit <b>forgetful</b> these days.</i>
<b><u>humiliating</u></b>	Causing awareness of your shortcomings. <i>A <b>humiliating</b> defeat.</i>
<b>ignoble</b>	Of humble origin or social status. <i>Something cowardly and <b>ignoble</b> in his attitude.</i>
<b>ignominy</b>	Public shame or disgrace. <i>Suffered the <b>ignominy</b> of being sent to prison.</i>
<b>inattentive</b>	Showing a lack of attention or care. <i>An <b>inattentive</b> babysitter.</i>
<b>inglorious</b>	Deserving or bringing disgrace or shame- Rachel Carson. <i><b>Inglorious</b> though the peasants may have been this is not synonymous with mute.</i>
<b><u>lax</u></b>	Of a speech sound especially a vowel pronounced with the vocal muscles relaxed. <i><b>Lax</b> in attending classes.</i>
<b><u>miserable</u></b>	Contemptible (used as a term of abuse or for emphasis). <i>Horribly wet and <b>miserable</b> conditions.</i>
<b>neglectful</b>	Failing in what duty requires. <i><b>Neglectful</b> of his duties.</i>
<b><u>oblivious</u></b>	Not aware of or concerned about what is happening around one. <i>She became absorbed <b>oblivious</b> to the passage of time.</i>

<b>opprobrious</b>	(of language) expressing scorn or criticism. <i>An <b>opprobrious</b> monument to human greed.</i>
<b><u>regardless</u></b>	Without due thought or consideration. <i>He carried on <b>regardless</b> of the difficulties.</i>
<b><u>remiss</u></b>	Failing in what duty requires. <i><b>Remiss</b> of you not to pay your bills.</i>
<b><u>shameful</u></b>	Worthy of or causing shame or disgrace. <i>A <b>shameful</b> display of cowardice.</i>
<b><u>shoddy</u></b>	Cheap and shoddy Judith Crist. <i><b>Shoddy</b> business practices.</i>
<b>unmindful</b>	Not mindful or attentive. <i>While thus <b>unmindful</b> of his steps he stumbled.</i>
<b>unsung</b>	Not famous or acclaimed. <i>Harvey is one of the <b>unsung</b> heroes of the industrial revolution.</i>
<b>wretched</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>The <b>wretched</b> conditions of the slums.</i>
