Synonyms of "Reprise" as a noun (5 Words)

iteration

The repetition of a process or utterance.
*The solution took hundreds of **iterations**.*

recapitulation

(music) the repetition of themes introduced earlier (especially when one is composing the final part of a movement).
*His **recapitulation** of the argument.*

reiteration	The act of repeating over and again (or an instance thereof). <i>A simple reiteration of the plots of classic episodes.</i>
repeating	The act of doing or performing again.
restatement	A revised statement. <i>The need for restatement and clarification of the principle.</i>

Synonyms of "Reprise" as a verb (11 Words)

copy	Send someone a copy of an email that is addressed to a third party. <i>I thought I'd copy to you this letter sent to the PR representative.</i>
imitate	Appear like, as in behavior or appearance. <i>She imitated my Scots accent.</i>
mimic	(of a disease) exhibit symptoms that bear a deceptive resemblance to those of (another disease). <i>Tiger beetles are mimicked by grasshoppers.</i>
parody	Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was parodying schoolgirl fiction.</i>
parrot	Repeat mindlessly. <i>The students parroted the teacher's words.</i>
recapitulate	Repeat (an evolutionary or other process) during development and growth. <i>He began to recapitulate his argument with care.</i>
reiterate	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He reiterated the points made in his earlier speech.</i>

repeat	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>A watch repeater that repeats hours and quarters.</i>
reprise	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition.
restate	State (something) again or differently, especially more clearly or convincingly. <i>He restated his opposition to abortion.</i>
say again	Express a supposition.

Usage Examples of "Reprise" as a verb

- *He reprises his role as the vigilante architect.*

Associations of "Reprise" (30 Words)

again	Another time; once more. <i>The wages were low but they made half as much again in tips.</i>
ceaseless	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The ceaseless thunder of surf.</i>
constant	A quantity or parameter that does not change its value whatever the value of the variables, under a given set of conditions. <i>The condition of struggle remained a constant.</i>
constantly	Without variation or change, in every case. <i>Constantly kind and gracious.</i>
continual	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>His plane went down after continual attacks.</i>
continuation	A part that is attached to and is an extension of something else. <i>The government's continuation in office.</i>
echo	Ring or echo with sound. <i>The flower arrangement was created as an echo of a client's still life.</i>
habit	Put a habit on. <i>It was their habit to dine at 7 every evening.</i>
habitually	By way of habit; customarily. <i>He habitually carried a pocket knife.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>

iterate	A quantity arrived at by iteration. <i>The function iterates.</i>
paraphrase	A rewording of something written or spoken. <i>Scattered here and there in the text are frank paraphrases of lines from Virgil Cicero and Quintilian.</i>
pummel	Strike repeatedly with the fists. <i>The pedestrians pummeled the demonstrators.</i>
recapitulate	Repeat stages of evolutionary development during the embryonic phase of life. <i>Many features of regeneration in the peripheral nervous system recapitulate development.</i>
recurring	(of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
reiterate	Say something again or a number of times, typically for emphasis or clarity. <i>I just want to forget it all he reiterated.</i>
relentless	Unceasingly intense. <i>A patient but relentless taskmaster.</i>
repeat	A passage intended to be repeated. <i>She goes home alone to TV dinners and repeats of I Love Lucy.</i>
repeated	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>Despite repeated requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i>
repeatedly	Over and over again; constantly. <i>They have been warned repeatedly with no effect.</i>
repeating	(of a pattern) recurring uniformly over a surface.
repetition	The act of doing or performing again. <i>Lie on your back and bench press a light weight very quickly over ten repetitions.</i>
repetitive	Repetitive and persistent. <i>Repetitive movement.</i>
restate	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He restated his opposition to abortion.</i>
sequel	Something that follows something else. <i>The Prisoner of Zenda and its sequel.</i>
sequence	Arrange in a sequence. <i>The doctor saw a sequence of patients.</i>

- subsequence** The state of following something, especially as a result or effect.
*An affair which appeared in due **subsequence** in the newspapers.*
- succession** The process by which a plant or animal community successively gives way to another until a stable climax is reached.
*A **succession** of failures.*
- trilogy** A group of three related things.
*J R R Tolkien s epic fantasy **trilogy** *The Lord of the Rings*.*
- warn** Notify, usually in advance.
*They **warned** against false optimism.*
