### Definitions of "Reprise" as a noun

- *A repetition or further performance of something.*
- *A repeated passage in music.*

### Synonyms of "Reprise" as a noun (5 Words)

#### **iteration**

The repetition of a process or utterance.  
*The solution took hundreds of **iterations**.*

#### **recapitulation**

(music) the repetition of themes introduced earlier (especially when one is composing the final part of a movement).  
*His **recapitulation** of the argument.*

<b>reiteration</b>	The act of repeating over and again (or an instance thereof). <i>A simple <b>reiteration</b> of the plots of classic episodes.</i>
<b>repeating</b>	The act of doing or performing again.
<b>restatement</b>	A revised statement. <i>The need for <b>restatement</b> and clarification of the principle.</i>

- *A stale reprise of past polemic.*

## Reprise as a Verb

### Definitions of "Reprise" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "reprise" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Repeat an earlier theme of a composition.*
- *Repeat (a piece of music or a performance).*

### Synonyms of "Reprise" as a verb (11 Words)

<b>copy</b>	Send someone a copy of an email that is addressed to a third party. <i>I thought I'd <b>copy</b> to you this letter sent to the PR representative.</i>
<b>imitate</b>	Appear like, as in behavior or appearance. <i>She <b>imitated</b> my Scots accent.</i>
<b>mimic</b>	(of a disease) exhibit symptoms that bear a deceptive resemblance to those of (another disease). <i>Tiger beetles are <b>mimicked</b> by grasshoppers.</i>
<b>parody</b>	Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was <b>parodying</b> schoolgirl fiction.</i>
<b>parrot</b>	Repeat mindlessly. <i>The students <b>parroted</b> the teacher's words.</i>
<b>recapitulate</b>	Repeat (an evolutionary or other process) during development and growth. <i>He began to <b>recapitulate</b> his argument with care.</i>
<b>reiterate</b>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He <b>reiterated</b> the points made in his earlier speech.</i>

<b>repeat</b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>A watch <b>repeater</b> that <b>repeats</b> hours and quarters.</i>
<b>reprise</b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition.
<b>restate</b>	State (something) again or differently, especially more clearly or convincingly. <i>He <b>restated</b> his opposition to abortion.</i>
<b>say again</b>	Express a supposition.

### Usage Examples of "Reprise" as a verb

- *He reprises his role as the vigilante architect.*

### Associations of "Reprise" (30 Words)

<b>again</b>	Another time; once more. <i>The wages were low but they made half as much <b>again</b> in tips.</i>
<b>ceaseless</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The <b>ceaseless</b> thunder of surf.</i>
<b>constant</b>	A quantity or parameter that does not change its value whatever the value of the variables, under a given set of conditions. <i>The condition of struggle remained a <b>constant</b>.</i>
<b>constantly</b>	Without variation or change, in every case. <i><b>Constantly</b> kind and gracious.</i>
<b>continual</b>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>His plane went down after <b>continual</b> attacks.</i>
<b>continuation</b>	A part that is attached to and is an extension of something else. <i>The government's <b>continuation</b> in office.</i>
<b>echo</b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>The flower arrangement was created as an <b>echo</b> of a client's still life.</i>
<b>habit</b>	Put a habit on. <i>It was their <b>habit</b> to dine at 7 every evening.</i>
<b>habitually</b>	By way of habit; customarily. <i>He <b>habitually</b> carried a pocket knife.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The <b>incessant</b> beat of the music.</i>

<b>iterate</b>	A quantity arrived at by iteration. <i>The function <b>iterates</b>.</i>
<b>paraphrase</b>	A rewording of something written or spoken. <i>Scattered here and there in the text are frank <b>paraphrases</b> of lines from Virgil Cicero and Quintilian.</i>
<b>pummel</b>	Strike repeatedly with the fists. <i>The pedestrians <b>pummeled</b> the demonstrators.</i>
<b>recapitulate</b>	Repeat stages of evolutionary development during the embryonic phase of life. <i>Many features of regeneration in the peripheral nervous system <b>recapitulate</b> development.</i>
<b>recurring</b>	(of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind. <i>They are haunted by a <b>recurring</b> image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
<b>reiterate</b>	Say something again or a number of times, typically for emphasis or clarity. <i>I just want to forget it all he <b>reiterated</b>.</i>
<b>relentless</b>	Unceasingly intense. <i>A patient but <b>relentless</b> taskmaster.</i>
<b>repeat</b>	A passage intended to be repeated. <i>She goes home alone to TV dinners and <b>repeats</b> of I Love Lucy.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>Despite <b>repeated</b> requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i>
<b>repeatedly</b>	Over and over again; constantly. <i>They have been warned <b>repeatedly</b> with no effect.</i>
<b>repeating</b>	(of a pattern) recurring uniformly over a surface.
<b>repetition</b>	The act of doing or performing again. <i>Lie on your back and bench press a light weight very quickly over ten <b>repetitions</b>.</i>
<b>repetitive</b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i><b>Repetitive</b> movement.</i>
<b>restate</b>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He <b>restated</b> his opposition to abortion.</i>
<b>sequel</b>	Something that follows something else. <i>The Prisoner of Zenda and its <b>sequel</b>.</i>
<b>sequence</b>	Arrange in a sequence. <i>The doctor saw a <b>sequence</b> of patients.</i>

- subsequence** The state of following something, especially as a result or effect.  
*An affair which appeared in due **subsequence** in the newspapers.*
- succession** The process by which a plant or animal community successively gives way to another until a stable climax is reached.  
*A **succession** of failures.*
- trilogy** A group of three related things.  
*J R R Tolkien s epic fantasy **trilogy** *The Lord of the Rings*.*
- warn** Notify, usually in advance.  
*They **warned** against false optimism.*
