#### **recapitulation**

(music) the repetition of themes introduced earlier (especially when one is composing the final part of a movement).  
*His **recapitulation** of the argument.*

| <b>pummel</b>       | Strike repeatedly with the fists.<br><i>The pedestrians <b>pummeled</b> the demonstrators.</i>  |
| <b>recapitulate</b> | Repeat stages of evolutionary development during the embryonic phase of life.<br><i>Many features of regeneration in the peripheral nervous system <b>recapitulate</b> development.</i> |
| <b>recurring</b>    | (of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind.<br><i>They are haunted by a <b>recurring</b> image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>             |
| <b>reiterate</b>    | Say something again or a number of times, typically for emphasis or clarity.<br><i>I just want to forget it all he <b>reiterated</b>.</i>   |
