## **Resemblance as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Resemblance" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “resemblance” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The state of resembling or being alike.*
- *Similarity in appearance or external or superficial details.*
- *A way in which two or more things are alike.*



## Synonyms of "Resemblance" as a noun (4 Words)

**alikeness** The quality or fact of being alike; resemblance, similarity.

**likeness** Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things.  
*A family **likeness** can be seen in all the boys.*

**similarity** A Gestalt principle of organization holding that (other things being equal) parts of a stimulus field that are similar to each other tend to be perceived as belonging together as a unit.

*The **similarity** of symptoms makes them hard to diagnose.*

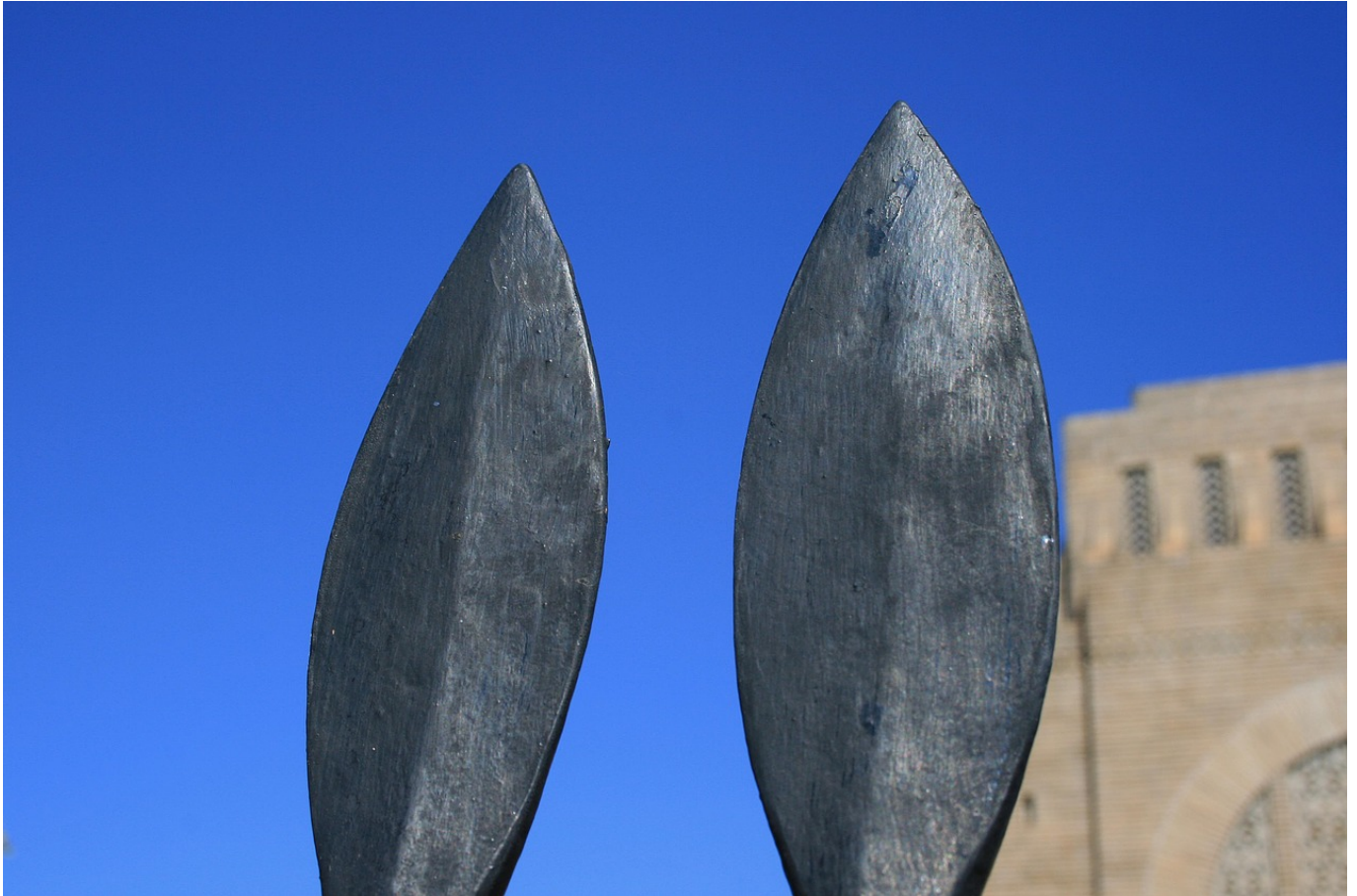
**similitude** A comparison between two things.

*There is a striking **similitude** between the brother and sister.*



### **Usage Examples of "Resemblance" as a noun**

- *There was a close resemblance between herself and Anne.*
- *They bear some resemblance to Italian figurines.*
- *The physical resemblances between humans and apes.*



## Associations of "Resemblance" (30 Words)

### **akin**

Related by blood.

*Something **akin** to gratitude overwhelmed her.*

### **alike**

(of two or more people or things) similar to each other.

*They dressed **alike** in black trousers and jackets.*

### **analogous**

(of organs) performing a similar function but having a different evolutionary origin, such as the wings of insects and birds.

*Salmon roe is marketed as **analogous** to caviar.*

### **analogy**

The religious belief that between creature and creator no similarity can be found so great but that the dissimilarity is always greater any analogy between God and humans will always be inadequate.

*The syndrome is called deep dysgraphia because of its **analogy** to deep dyslexia.*

<b>as</b>	A very poisonous metallic element that has three allotropic forms arsenic and arsenic compounds are used as herbicides and insecticides and various alloys found in arsenopyrite and orpiment and realgar. <i>Go <b>as fast as</b> you can.</i>
<b>assonance</b>	Resemblance of sound between syllables of nearby words, arising particularly from the rhyming of two or more stressed vowels, but not consonants (e.g. sonnet, porridge), but also from the use of identical consonants with different vowels (e.g. killed, cold, culled). <i>Alliterative <b>assonances</b> such as fail and fall are very common in Old English poetry.</i>
<b>comparable</b>	Able to be likened to another; similar. <i>Nobody is <b>comparable</b> with this athlete.</i>
<b>compare</b>	Draw an analogy between one thing and (another) for the purposes of explanation or clarification. <i>This car does not <b>compare</b> with our line of Mercedes.</i>
<b>comparison</b>	The act of examining resemblances. <i>Perhaps the best <b>comparison</b> is that of seasickness.</i>
<b>conformable</b>	In keeping. <i>Plans <b>conformable</b> with your wishes.</i>
<b>equal</b>	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group. <i>All men are <b>equal</b> before the law.</i>
<b>equate</b>	Make equal, uniform, corresponding, or matching. <i>That sum <b>equates</b> to half a million pounds today.</i>
<b>equivalent</b>	Belonging to the same equivalence class. <i>Some regulations are <b>equivalent</b> to censorship.</i>
<b>figurative</b>	(used of the meanings of words or text) not literal; using figures of speech. <i>The <b>figurative</b> art of the humanistic tradition.</i>
<b>homogeneous</b>	Containing terms all of the same degree. <i>A close knit <b>homogeneous</b> group.</i>
<b>identical</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other. <i>Four girls in <b>identical</b> green outfits.</i>
<b>like</b>	(of a person or thing) having similar qualities or characteristics to another person or thing. <i>Members of the cat family have <b>like</b> dispositions.</i>
<b>liken</b>	Consider or describe as similar, equal, or analogous. <i>Racism is <b>likened</b> to a contagious disease.</i>
<b>likeness</b>	Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things. <i>Man created God in his own <b>likeness</b>.</i>

<b>parallelism</b>	The state of being parallel or of corresponding in some way. <i><b>Parallelism</b> suggests a connection of meaning through an echo of form.</i>
<b>quasi</b>	Having some resemblance. <i>A <b>quasi</b> success.</i>
<b>remarkably</b>	Used to express surprise at an event or situation. <i>You have performed <b>remarkably</b>.</i>
<b><u>resemble</u></b>	Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like. <i>They <b>resembled</b> each other closely.</i>
<b>same</b>	Similarly in the same way. <i>Animals of the <b>same</b> species.</i>
<b><u>semblance</u></b>	Resemblance similarity. <i>It bears some <b>semblance</b> to the thing I have in mind.</i>
<b>similar</b>	Resembling or similar having the same or some of the same characteristics often used in combination. <i>The principle of treatment by <b>similar</b>s.</i>
<b>similarity</b>	The state or fact of being similar. <i>The <b>similarity</b> of symptoms makes them hard to diagnose.</i>
<b>similitude</b>	A person or thing resembling someone or something else. <i>Conrad uses a range of constructions which express or imply <b>similitude</b>.</i>
<b>symmetrical</b>	Having similarity in size, shape, and relative position of corresponding parts. <i>The shape of a hill smooth and <b>symmetrical</b>.</i>
<b><u>twin</u></b>	Grow as twins. <i>There was a bruise on his cheek a <b>twin</b> to the one on mine.</i>
