## Resemble as a Verb

Definitions of "Resemble" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “resemble” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like.*
- *Appear like; be similar or bear a likeness to.*



### Synonyms of "Resemble" as a verb (10 Words)

<b>be like</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<b>be similar to</b>	Be priced at.
<b>bear a resemblance to</b>	Support or hold in a certain manner.
<b>favour</b>	Treat gently or carefully. <i>She s pretty and she <b>favours</b> you.</i>
<b>have a look of</b>	Have sex with; archaic use.
<b>look like</b>	Be oriented in a certain direction, often with respect to another reference point; be opposite to.
<b>make one think of</b>	Calculate as being.

<b>put one in mind of</b>	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
<b>remind one of</b>	Assist (somebody acting or reciting) by suggesting the next words of something forgotten or imperfectly learned.
<b>take after</b>	Get into one's hands, take physically.



### Usage Examples of "Resemble" as a verb

- *They resembled each other closely.*
- *This paper resembles my own work.*
- *Some people resemble their dogs.*
- *She resembles her mother very much.*



## Associations of "Resemble" (30 Words)

<b>camouflage</b>	Clothing or materials used as camouflage. <i>On the trenches were pieces of turf which served for <b>camouflage</b>.</i>
<b>conceal</b>	Prevent from being seen or discovered. <i>A line of sand dunes <b>concealed</b> the distant sea.</i>
<b>copy</b>	Send a copy of a letter or an email to a third party. <i><b>Copy</b> the genetic information.</i>
<b>dainty</b>	Affectedly dainty or refined. <i>A <b>dainty</b> dish to set before a kind.</i>
<b>disguise</b>	The concealing of one's true intentions or feelings. <i>We <b>disguised</b> our faces before robbing the bank.</i>

<b>ditto</b>	The same thing again used in lists and accounts and often indicated by a ditto mark under the word or figure to be repeated. <i>The next speaker <b>dittoed</b> her argument.</i>
<b>duplicate</b>	Duplicate or match. <i>He made a <b>duplicate</b> for the files.</i>
<b>echo</b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>Napoleon III was an <b>echo</b> of the mighty Emperor but an infinitely better man.</i>
<b>emulate</b>	Imitate. <i>Most rulers wished to <b>emulate</b> Alexander the Great.</i>
<b>equalize</b>	Compensate; make the score equal. <i>Britain is required to <b>equalize</b> pension rights between men and women.</i>
<b>evenhanded</b>	Without partiality. <i><b>Evenhanded</b> justice.</i>
<b>facsimile</b>	Send something via a facsimile machine. <i>A <b>facsimile</b> of the manuscript.</i>
<b>fax</b>	A machine for transmitting and receiving faxes. <i>The equipment consists of four word processors a <b>fax</b> and a photocopier.</i>
<b>imitate</b>	Reproduce someone's behavior or looks. <i>Synthetic fabrics can now <b>imitate</b> everything from silk to rubber.</i>
<b>imitator</b>	Someone who copies the behaviour or actions of another. <i>The show's success has sparked off many <b>imitators</b>.</i>
<b>likeness</b>	Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things. <i>The only known <b>likeness</b> of Dorothy as a young woman.</i>
<b>mask</b>	Cover the face with a mask. <i><b>Mask</b> off doors and cupboards with sheets of plastic.</i>
<b>mimesis</b>	The deliberate imitation of the behaviour of one group of people by another group as a factor in social change. <i>Culture is organized in terms of <b>mimesis</b> and desire.</i>

<b>mimetic</b>	Relating to, constituting, or habitually practising mimesis. <i>The <b>mimetic</b> presentation of images.</i>
<b>mimic</b>	An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>Tiger beetles are <b>mimicked</b> by grasshoppers.</i>
<b>mimicry</b>	The act of mimicking; imitative behavior. <i>The word was spoken with gently teasing <b>mimicry</b>.</i>
<b>replica</b>	A duplicate of an original artistic work. <i>A <b>replica</b> of the Empire State Building.</i>
<b>replicate</b>	Make an exact copy of; reproduce. <i>He could never <b>replicate</b> his brilliant performance of the magic trick.</i>
<b>replication</b>	A plaintiff's reply to the defendant's plea. <i>DNA <b>replication</b>.</i>
<b>reproduce</b>	(of an organism) produce offspring by a sexual or asexual process. <i>His works are <b>reproduced</b> on postcards and posters.</i>
<b>same</b>	Same in identity. <i>The village stayed the <b>same</b>.</i>
<b>similar</b>	Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>He was one of those whose <b>similar</b> you never meet.</i>
<b>somewhat</b>	To a moderate extent or by a moderate amount; rather. <i>Matters have improved <b>somewhat</b> since then.</i>
<b>symmetrical</b>	Having similarity in size, shape, and relative position of corresponding parts. <i>The shape of a hill smooth and <b>symmetrical</b>.</i>
<b>triplicate</b>	Make three copies of; multiply by three. <i>The <b>triplicate</b> of a letter to the Governor.</i>
