Definitions of "Resemble" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “resemble” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like.*
- *Appear like; be similar or bear a likeness to.*



Synonyms of "Resemble" as a verb (10 Words)

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| be like | Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun. |
| be similar to | Be priced at. |
| bear a resemblance to | Support or hold in a certain manner. |
| favour | Treat gently or carefully. <i>She s pretty and she favours you.</i> |
| have a look of | Have sex with; archaic use. |
| look like | Be oriented in a certain direction, often with respect to another reference point; be opposite to. |
| make one think of | Calculate as being. |
| put one in mind of | Cause (someone) to undergo something. |
| remind one of | Assist (somebody acting or reciting) by suggesting the next words of something forgotten or imperfectly learned. |

take after

Get into one's hands, take physically.



Usage Examples of "Resemble" as a verb

- *They resembled each other closely.*
- *This paper resembles my own work.*
- *Some people resemble their dogs.*
- *She resembles her mother very much.*



Associations of "Resemble" (30 Words)

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| <u>camouflage</u> | Clothing or materials used as camouflage. <i>On the trenches were pieces of turf which served for camouflage.</i> |
| <u>conceal</u> | Prevent from being seen or discovered. <i>A line of sand dunes concealed the distant sea.</i> |
| <u>copy</u> | Send a copy of a letter or an email to a third party. <i>Copy the genetic information.</i> |
| <u>dainty</u> | Affectedly dainty or refined. <i>A dainty dish to set before a kind.</i> |
| <u>disguise</u> | The concealing of one's true intentions or feelings. <i>We disguised our faces before robbing the bank.</i> |
| <u>ditto</u> | The same thing again used in lists and accounts and often indicated by a ditto mark under the word or figure to be repeated. <i>The next speaker dittoed her argument.</i> |

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| <u>duplicate</u> | Duplicate or match. <i>He made a duplicate for the files.</i> |
| <u>echo</u> | Ring or echo with sound. <i>Napoleon III was an echo of the mighty Emperor but an infinitely better man.</i> |
| <u>emulate</u> | Imitate. <i>Most rulers wished to emulate Alexander the Great.</i> |
| <u>equalize</u> | Compensate; make the score equal. <i>Britain is required to equalize pension rights between men and women.</i> |
| evenhanded | Without partiality. <i>Evenhanded justice.</i> |
| facsimile | Send something via a facsimile machine. <i>A facsimile of the manuscript.</i> |
| fax | A machine for transmitting and receiving faxes. <i>The equipment consists of four word processors a fax and a photocopier.</i> |
| imitate | Reproduce someone's behavior or looks. <i>Synthetic fabrics can now imitate everything from silk to rubber.</i> |
| imitator | Someone who copies the behaviour or actions of another. <i>The show's success has sparked off many imitators.</i> |
| likeness | Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things. <i>The only known likeness of Dorothy as a young woman.</i> |
| <u>mask</u> | Cover the face with a mask. <i>Mask off doors and cupboards with sheets of plastic.</i> |
| mimesis | The deliberate imitation of the behaviour of one group of people by another group as a factor in social change. <i>Culture is organized in terms of mimesis and desire.</i> |
| mimetic | Relating to, constituting, or habitually practising mimesis. <i>The mimetic presentation of images.</i> |
| <u>mimic</u> | An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>Tiger beetles are mimicked by grasshoppers.</i> |
| mimicry | The act of mimicking; imitative behavior. <i>The word was spoken with gently teasing mimicry.</i> |
| <u>replica</u> | A duplicate of an original artistic work. <i>A replica of the Empire State Building.</i> |
| <u>replicate</u> | Make an exact copy of; reproduce. <i>He could never replicate his brilliant performance of the magic trick.</i> |

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| replication | A plaintiff's reply to the defendant's plea. <i>DNA replication.</i> |
| reproduce | (of an organism) produce offspring by a sexual or asexual process. <i>His works are reproduced on postcards and posters.</i> |
| same | Same in identity. <i>The village stayed the same.</i> |
| similar | Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>He was one of those whose similar you never meet.</i> |
| somewhat | To a moderate extent or by a moderate amount; rather. <i>Matters have improved somewhat since then.</i> |
| symmetrical | Having similarity in size, shape, and relative position of corresponding parts. <i>The shape of a hill smooth and symmetrical.</i> |
| triplicate | Make three copies of; multiply by three. <i>The triplicate of a letter to the Governor.</i> |
