- *Feel bitterness or indignation at (a circumstance, action, or person).*
- *Feel bitter or indignant about.*



## Synonyms of "Resent" as a verb (19 Words)

<b>be angry about</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be angry at</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be annoyed about</b>	Form or compose.
<b>be annoyed at</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be displeased about</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>be displeased at</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<b>be offended by</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>be resentful of</b>	Occupy a certain position or area.
<b><u>begrudge</u></b>	Give reluctantly or resentfully. <i>She <b>begrudged</b> Martin his affluence.</i>
<b>dislike</b>	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>She <b>disliked</b> any kind of unnecessary rudeness.</i>

<b>feel aggrieved about</b>	Have a feeling or perception about oneself in reaction to someone's behavior or attitude.
<b>feel aggrieved at</b>	Examine by touch.
<b>feel bitter about</b>	Examine by touch.
<b>grudge</b>	Bear a grudge harbor ill feelings. <i>He <b>grudged</b> the work and time that the meeting involved.</i>
<b>object to</b>	Express or raise an objection or protest or criticism or express dissent.
<b>take amiss</b>	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly.
<b>take exception to</b>	Head into a specified direction.
<b>take offence at</b>	Accept or undergo, often unwillingly.
<b>take umbrage at</b>	Experience or feel or submit to.



### Usage Examples of "Resent" as a verb

- *She resents being paid less than her co-workers.*
- *She resented the fact that I had children.*



## Associations of "Resent" (30 Words)

- aggression** Feelings of anger or antipathy resulting in hostile or violent behaviour; readiness to attack or confront.  
*He called for an end to foreign **aggression** against his country.*
- angrily** Stormily or threateningly.  
*The sky was black and thundered **angrily**.*
- begrudge** Envy (someone) the possession or enjoyment of (something).  
*She **begrudged** Martin his affluence.*
- berate** Censure severely or angrily.  
*She **berated** herself for being fickle.*
- bitterly** Extremely and sharply.  
*Passengers complained **bitterly** about grand promises made by the company.*

<b>creak</b>	Show weakness or frailty under strain. <i>The garden gate <b>creaked</b> open.</i>
<b>disappoint</b>	Fail to meet the hopes or expectations of. <i>The governing coalition had bitterly <b>disappointed</b> the hopes of its voters.</i>
<b>disillusion</b>	Freed from false belief or illusions. <i>The old enthusiasm for the government evaporated into a more cynical <b>disillusion</b>.</i>
<b>disillusioned</b>	Freed from illusion. <i>The minority groups were completely <b>disillusioned</b> with the party.</i>
<b>embitter</b>	Make (someone) feel bitter or resentful. <i>These injustices <b>embittered</b> her even more.</i>
<b>envy</b>	A person or thing that inspires envy. <i>A lifestyle which most of us would <b>envy</b>.</i>
<b>fiercely</b>	In a powerful and destructive manner. <i>The fire was already burning <b>fiercely</b>.</i>
<b>gripe</b>	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>I have a <b>gripe</b> about the service here.</i>
<b>interference</b>	Any obstruction that impedes or is burdensome. <i>He ran <b>interference</b> for the quarterback.</i>
<b>jealousy</b>	A feeling of jealous envy (especially of a rival). <i>A sharp pang of <b>jealousy</b>.</i>
<b>pout</b>	A pouting expression. <i>The girl <b>pouted</b>.</i>
<b>rage</b>	The violent action of a natural agency. <i>The sea hurled itself in thundering <b>rage</b> against the rocks.</i>
<b>rebuke</b>	Express sharp disapproval or criticism of (someone) because of their behaviour or actions. <i>She had <b>rebuked</b> him for drinking too much.</i>
<b>retort</b>	Answer back. <i>He was resolute to <b>retort</b> the charge of treason on his foes.</i>
<b>sniffle</b>	The act of breathing heavily through the nose (as when the nose is congested). <i>She had a slight cough and a <b>sniffle</b>.</i>
<b>snivel</b>	An act or sound of snivelling. <i>Stop <b>snivelling</b> you got yourself into this mess.</i>
<b>squawk</b>	The noise of squawking. <i>She awoke to the <b>squawk</b> of chickens.</i>

<b>squeal</b>	Make a squeal. <i>She feared they would victimize her for <b>squealing</b> on their pals.</i>
<b>strife</b>	Angry or bitter disagreement over fundamental issues; conflict. <i><b>Strife</b> within the community.</i>
<b>sulk</b>	A period of sulking. <i>He was <b>sulking</b> over the break up of his band.</i>
<b>sulky</b>	A light two-wheeled vehicle for one person; drawn by one horse. <i>Disappointment was making her <b>sulky</b>.</i>
<b>tantrum</b>	An uncontrolled outburst of anger and frustration, typically in a young child. <i>She threw a <b>tantrum</b>.</i>
<b>weep</b>	A fit or period of weeping. <i>A young widow <b>weeping</b> her lost lord.</i>
<b>whine</b>	Move with a whining sound. <i>The <b>whine</b> of the engine.</i>
<b>wrath</b>	Extreme anger. <i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's <b>wrath</b>.</i>
