- *Feel bitterness or indignation at (a circumstance, action, or person).*
- *Feel bitter or indignant about.*



Synonyms of "Resent" as a verb (19 Words)

be angry about	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be angry at	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be annoyed about	Form or compose.
be annoyed at	Represent, as of a character on stage.
be displeased about	Happen, occur, take place.
be displeased at	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
be offended by	Happen, occur, take place.
be resentful of	Occupy a certain position or area.
<u>begrudge</u>	Give reluctantly or resentfully. <i>She begrudged Martin his affluence.</i>
dislike	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>She disliked any kind of unnecessary rudeness.</i>

feel aggrieved about	Have a feeling or perception about oneself in reaction to someone's behavior or attitude.
feel aggrieved at	Examine by touch.
feel bitter about	Examine by touch.
grudge	Bear a grudge harbor ill feelings. <i>He grudged the work and time that the meeting involved.</i>
object to	Express or raise an objection or protest or criticism or express dissent.
take amiss	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly.
take exception to	Head into a specified direction.
take offence at	Accept or undergo, often unwillingly.
take umbrage at	Experience or feel or submit to.



Usage Examples of "Resent" as a verb

- *She resents being paid less than her co-workers.*
- *She resented the fact that I had children.*



Associations of "Resent" (30 Words)

- aggression** Feelings of anger or antipathy resulting in hostile or violent behaviour; readiness to attack or confront.
*He called for an end to foreign **aggression** against his country.*
- angrily** Stormily or threateningly.
*The sky was black and thundered **angrily**.*
- begrudge** Envy (someone) the possession or enjoyment of (something).
*She **begrudged** Martin his affluence.*
- berate** Censure severely or angrily.
*She **berated** herself for being fickle.*
- bitterly** Extremely and sharply.
*Passengers complained **bitterly** about grand promises made by the company.*

creak	Show weakness or frailty under strain. <i>The garden gate creaked open.</i>
disappoint	Fail to meet the hopes or expectations of. <i>The governing coalition had bitterly disappointed the hopes of its voters.</i>
disillusion	Freeing from false belief or illusions. <i>The old enthusiasm for the government evaporated into a more cynical disillusion.</i>
disillusioned	Freed from illusion. <i>The minority groups were completely disillusioned with the party.</i>
embitter	Make (someone) feel bitter or resentful. <i>These injustices embittered her even more.</i>
envy	A person or thing that inspires envy. <i>A lifestyle which most of us would envy.</i>
fiercely	In a powerful and destructive manner. <i>The fire was already burning fiercely.</i>
gripe	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>I have a gripe about the service here.</i>
interference	Any obstruction that impedes or is burdensome. <i>He ran interference for the quarterback.</i>
jealousy	A feeling of jealous envy (especially of a rival). <i>A sharp pang of jealousy.</i>
pout	A pouting expression. <i>The girl pouted.</i>
rage	The violent action of a natural agency. <i>The sea hurled itself in thundering rage against the rocks.</i>
rebuke	Express sharp disapproval or criticism of (someone) because of their behaviour or actions. <i>She had rebuked him for drinking too much.</i>
retort	Answer back. <i>He was resolute to retort the charge of treason on his foes.</i>
sniffle	The act of breathing heavily through the nose (as when the nose is congested). <i>She had a slight cough and a sniffle.</i>
snivel	An act or sound of snivelling. <i>Stop snivelling you got yourself into this mess.</i>
squawk	The noise of squawking. <i>She awoke to the squawk of chickens.</i>

squeal	Make a squeal. <i>She feared they would victimize her for squealing on their pals.</i>
strife	Angry or bitter disagreement over fundamental issues; conflict. <i>Strife within the community.</i>
sulk	A period of sulking. <i>He was sulking over the break up of his band.</i>
sulky	A light two-wheeled vehicle for one person; drawn by one horse. <i>Disappointment was making her sulky.</i>
tantrum	An uncontrolled outburst of anger and frustration, typically in a young child. <i>She threw a tantrum.</i>
weep	A fit or period of weeping. <i>A young widow weeping her lost lord.</i>
whine	Move with a whining sound. <i>The whine of the engine.</i>
wrath	Extreme anger. <i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's wrath.</i>
