fund	A financial institution that sells shares to individuals and invests in securities issued by other companies. <i>He had set up a fund to coordinate economic investment.</i>
limitation	The greatest amount of something that is possible or allowed. <i>The limitation of local authorities powers.</i>
military reserve	The military forces of a nation.
modesty	The quality of being relatively moderate, limited, or small in amount, rate, or level. <i>Modesty forbade her to undress in front of so many people.</i>
national park	A person who owes allegiance to that nation.
<u>pool</u>	A swimming pool. <i>The body lay in a pool of blood.</i>
<u>preserve</u>	Fruit preserved by cooking with sugar. <i>Medicine is no longer a male preserve.</i>
proviso	A stipulated condition. <i>He let his house with the proviso that his own staff should remain to run it.</i>
qualification	The qualification stage of a sporting event. <i>This important qualification needs to be remembered when interpreting the results.</i>
relief	A method of moulding, carving or stamping in which the design stands out from the surface to a greater high relief or lesser low relief extent. <i>The coach had broken down and a relief vehicle had taken an hour to arrive.</i>
replacement	A person or thing that takes the place of another. <i>Please stay until we find a replacement for you.</i>
reservation	A right or interest retained in an estate being conveyed. <i>Some generals voiced reservations about making air strikes.</i>

reserves	Civilians trained as soldiers but not part of the regular army.
<u>reservoir</u>	A large natural or artificial lake used as a source of water supply. <i>Big oil reservoirs are becoming harder to find.</i>
restraint	A rule or condition that limits freedom. <i>With strings and piano all restraint vanished.</i>
reticence	The quality of being reticent; reserve. <i>The traditional emotional reticence of the British.</i>
second-stringer	An athlete who plays only when a starter on the team is replaced.
self-restraint	Exhibiting restraint imposed on the self.
stand-in	Someone who takes the place of another (as when things get dangerous or difficult).
<u>stock</u>	A portion of a company's stock as held by an individual or group as an investment. <i>She owned 3000 worth of stocks and shares.</i>
stockpile	Something kept back or saved for future use or a special purpose. <i>A stockpile of sandbags was being prepared.</i>
<u>store</u>	A large shop selling different types of goods. <i>Crates started arriving at the quartermaster's stores.</i>
<u>substitute</u>	A sports player nominated as eligible to replace another after a match has begun. <i>Soya milk is used as a substitute for dairy milk.</i>
supply	The activity of supplying or providing something. <i>The demand for tickets greatly exceeds the supply.</i>
taciturnity	The trait of being uncommunicative; not volunteering anything more than necessary.

- *Refrain from delivering (a judgement or decision) without due consideration or evidence.*

*The government is concerned to **secure** the economy against too much foreign ownership.*

set aside

Put into a certain place or abstract location.

withhold

Hold back; refuse to hand over or share.
*My employer is **withholding** taxes.*
