Definitions of "Reserved" as an adjective

- *Kept specially for a particular person.*
- *Set aside for the use of a particular person or party.*
- *Marked by self-restraint and reticence.*
- *Slow to reveal emotion or opinions.*



Synonyms of "Reserved" as an adjective (9 Words)

booked	Reserved in advance.
prearranged	Arranged or agreed upon in advance. <i>Did she have a prearranged meeting.</i>
private	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i>Secret or private thoughts.</i>
quiet	(of a place, period of time, or situation) without much activity, disturbance, or excitement. <i>All he wanted was a quiet drink.</i>
restrained	(of colour, decoration, etc.) not excessively showy or ornate; understated. <i>The drawings with their restrained colours give a feeling of peace and contemplation.</i>
reticent	Cool and formal in manner. <i>She was extremely reticent about her personal affairs.</i>
self-contained	In full control of your faculties.

spoken for

Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination.

taken

Be affected with an indisposition.
*The child was **taken** ill.*



Usage Examples of "Reserved" as an adjective

- *He is a reserved, almost taciturn man.*
- *Was habitually reserved in speech, withholding her opinion.*
- *A reserved seat.*



Associations of "Reserved" (30 Words)

aloof	In an aloof manner. <i>Stood apart with aloof dignity.</i>
bashful	Disposed to avoid notice blate is a Scottish term for bashful. <i>I never laughed being bashful lowering my head I looked at the wall.</i>
cagey	Characterized by great caution and wariness. <i>A cagey avoidance of a definite answer.</i>
coy	Showing marked and often playful or irritating evasiveness or reluctance to make a definite or committing statement. <i>She treated him to a coy smile of invitation.</i>
demure	Affectedly modest or shy especially in a playful or provocative way. <i>Antonia was pensive and demure.</i>
diffident	Showing modest reserve. <i>A diffident youth.</i>

eschew	Deliberately avoid using; abstain from. <i>He appealed to the crowd to eschew violence.</i>
fainthearted	Lacking conviction or boldness or courage.
<u>introspective</u>	Given to examining own sensory and perceptual experiences. <i>He grew withdrawn and introspective.</i>
introversion	The quality of being shy and reticent. <i>The tongue tied introversion of the self conscious artist.</i>
<u>introvert</u>	A person who tends to shrink from social contacts and to become preoccupied with their own thoughts. <i>He introverted his feelings.</i>
introverted	(of a community, company, or other group) concerned principally with its own affairs; inward-looking or parochial.
modesty	The quality of being relatively moderate, limited, or small in amount, rate, or level. <i>Modesty forbade her to undress in front of so many people.</i>
<u>passive</u>	A passive form of a verb. <i>The ball was thrown by the boy uses the passive voice.</i>
passivity	Acceptance of what happens, without active response or resistance. <i>The perceived passivity of the populace is deceptive.</i>
<u>reclusive</u>	Withdrawn from society; seeking solitude. <i>Lived an unsocial reclusive life.</i>
restrained	Prudent. <i>His restrained gentlemanly voice.</i>
<u>reticent</u>	Cool and formal in manner. <i>She was extremely reticent about her personal affairs.</i>
retiring	Shy and fond of being on one's own. <i>A shy retiring girl.</i>
shy	Having a dislike of or aversion to a specified thing. <i>He gave the ball a shy to the first baseman.</i>
<u>silent</u>	Saying or recording nothing on a particular subject. <i>I m the strong silent type.</i>
<u>taciturn</u>	(of a person) reserved or uncommunicative in speech; saying little. <i>After such gatherings she would be taciturn and morose.</i>
<u>timid</u>	Showing fear and lack of confidence. <i>I was too timid to ask for what I wanted.</i>
timorous	Showing or suffering from nervousness or a lack of confidence. <i>Timorous little mouse.</i>

- unassertive** (of a person) not having or showing a confident and forceful personality.
*His bland and **unassertive** personal style.*
- uncommunicative** Unwilling to talk or impart information.
*He had always been quiet and **uncommunicative** having few friends.*
- unfriendly** Not friendly.
*She shot him an **unfriendly** glance.*
- upstage** Move upstage forcing the other actors to turn away from the audience.
*When the dog entered the stage he **upstaged** the actress.*
- withdrawn** Withdrawn from society seeking solitude.
*When her husband died she became very **withdrawn**.*
- within** Inside; indoors.
*Beauty coming from **within**.*
