- *A large natural or artificial lake used as a source of water supply.*
- *A supply or source of something.*
- *A receptacle or part of a machine designed to hold fluid.*
- *Anything (a person or animal or plant or substance) in which an infectious agent normally lives and multiplies.*
- *Tank used for collecting and storing a liquid (as water or oil).*
- *A place where fluid collects, especially in rock strata or in the body.*
- *A large or extra supply of something.*

<b>pool</b>	A swimming pool. <i>A <b>pool</b> of blood.</i>
<b>receptacle</b>	An electrical socket. <i>Fast food <b>receptacles</b>.</i>
<b>repository</b>	A burial vault (usually for some famous person). <i>A deep <b>repository</b> for nuclear waste.</i>
<b>reserve</b>	A district that is reserved for particular purpose. <i>She smiled and some of her natural <b>reserve</b> melted.</i>
<b>reserves</b>	Civilians trained as soldiers but not part of the regular army.
<b>source</b>	Anything that provides inspiration for later work. <i>The reporter had two <b>sources</b> for the story.</i>
<b>stock</b>	Farm animals such as cattle pigs and sheep bred and kept for their meat or milk livestock. <i>The vineyards were ploughed up and replanted using different vine <b>stock</b>.</i>
<b>stockpile</b>	A storage pile accumulated for future use. <i>A <b>stockpile</b> of nuclear weapons.</i>
<b>store</b>	A mercantile establishment for the retail sale of goods or services. <i>He keeps the ship s <b>stores</b>.</i>
<b>supply</b>	The activity of supplying or providing something. <i>A <b>supply</b> ship.</i>
<b>tank</b>	As much as a tank will hold. <i>A large class of 0 6 0 <b>tanks</b>.</i>

<b>conduit</b>	A tube or trough for protecting electric wiring. <i>The gas pipe should not be close to any electrical <b>conduit</b>.</i>
<b>construction</b>	A group of words that form a constituent of a sentence and are considered as a single unit. <i>Their main business is home <b>construction</b>.</i>
<b>culvert</b>	Channel a stream or drain through a culvert. <i>A <b>culverted</b> drain.</i>

<b>electricity</b>	Keen and shared excitement. <i>The <b>electricity</b> was back on.</i>
<b>embankment</b>	A bank of earth or stone built to carry a road or railway over an area of low ground. <i>A railway <b>embankment</b>.</i>
<u><b>engine</b></u>	A fire engine. <i>The roar of a car <b>engine</b>.</i>
<u><b>exhaust</b></u>	The system through which exhaust gases are expelled. <i>The country has <b>exhausted</b> its treasury reserves.</i>
<b>floodgate</b>	Something that restrains a flood or outpouring. <i>His lawsuit could open the <b>floodgates</b> for thousands of similar claims.</i>
<u><b>gate</b></u>	Supply with a gate. <i>The house was <b>gated</b>.</i>
<u><b>generator</b></u>	A person or thing that generates something. <i>He was the <b>generator</b> of several complaints.</i>
<u><b>heat</b></u>	The amount of heat that is needed to cause a specific process or is evolved in such a process. <i>Winners of the regional <b>heats</b>.</i>
<b>hydroelectric</b>	Of or relating to or used in the production of electricity by waterpower. <i>Economic and environmental aspect of the <b>hydroelectric</b> scheme.</i>
<b>levee</b>	A ridge of sediment deposited naturally alongside a river by overflowing water.
<b>magnetism</b>	The branch of science that studies magnetism. <i>His personal <b>magnetism</b> attracted men to the brotherhood.</i>
<b>motor</b>	Driven by a motor. <i><b>Motor</b> energy.</i>
<b>pipe</b>	Play a tune on a pipe or pipes. <i>Outside at the back a curlew <b>pip</b>ed.</i>
<u><b>powerhouse</b></u>	A person or thing of great energy, strength, or power. <i>She appears to be an intellectual <b>powerhouse</b>.</i>
<b>production</b>	The creation of something as part of a physical, biological, or chemical process. <i>The <b>production</b> of white blood cells.</i>

- substation** A set of equipment reducing the high voltage of electrical power transmission to that suitable for supply to consumers.
- thermoelectric** Involving or resulting from thermoelectricity.
- transpiration** The emission of water vapor from the leaves of plants.  
*Plants lose more than 90 per cent of their water through **transpiration**.*
- turbine** A machine for producing continuous power in which a wheel or rotor, typically fitted with vanes, is made to revolve by a fast-moving flow of water, steam, gas, air, or other fluid.
