<b>house</b>	<p>The people living in a house a household.</p> <p><i>A debate on the motion This <b>house</b> would legalize cannabis.</i></p>
<b>inhabitation</b>	<p>The act of dwelling in or living permanently in a place (said of both animals and men).</p> <p><i>He studied the creation and <b>inhabitation</b> and demise of the colony.</i></p>
<b>manse</b>	<p>A person's house or home.</p> <p><i>She has just returned to her mother and the family <b>manse</b> after being expelled from convent school.</i></p>
<a href="#"><u>mansion</u></a>	<p>A terrace or mansion block.</p> <p><i>Carlyle <b>Mansions</b>.</i></p>
<b>mansion house</b>	<p>One of 12 equal areas into which the zodiac is divided.</p>
<b>occupancy</b>	<p>The proportion of hotel or office accommodation occupied or used.</p> <p><i>70 per cent <b>occupancy</b> is needed to give a profit.</i></p>
<b>place</b>	<p>Proper or designated social situation.</p> <p><i>The monastery was a peaceful <b>place</b>.</i></p>
<b>place of residence</b>	<p>Any area set aside for a particular purpose.</p>
<b>residency</b>	<p>The official residence of the Governor General's representative or other government agent, especially at the court of an Indian state.</p> <p><i>A government ruling confirmed the returning refugees right to <b>residency</b>.</i></p>
<b>stay</b>	<p>A period of staying somewhere in particular of living somewhere temporarily as a visitor or guest.</p> <p><i>They had a nice <b>stay</b> in Paris.</i></p>
<b>tenancy</b>	<p>Possession of land or property as a tenant.</p> <p><i>Holding took over the <b>tenancy</b> of the farm.</i></p>

<b><u>abode</u></b>	Housing that someone is living in. <i>My humble <b>abode</b>.</i>
<b>address</b>	Address or apply oneself to something direct one's efforts towards something such as a question. <i>An <b>address</b> to the European Parliament.</i>
<b>addressee</b>	The person to whom something is addressed. <i>The need to state clearly the <b>addressees</b> of reports.</i>
<b><u>apartment</u></b>	A block of apartments. <i>Self catering holiday <b>apartments</b>.</i>
<b><u>cottage</u></b>	Perform homosexual acts in a public toilet. <i>They said that at some point in their lives they've <b>cottaged</b> or cruised in parks.</i>

<b>domicile</b>	Law the residence where you have your permanent home or principal establishment and to where whenever you are absent you intend to return every person is compelled to have one and only one domicile at a time. <i>The tenant is <b>domiciled</b> in the United Kingdom.</i>
<b><u>doorway</u></b>	The entrance (the space in a wall) through which you enter or leave a room or building; the space that a door can close. <i>Beth stood there in the <b>doorway</b>.</i>
<b>duplex</b>	Having two parts used technically of a device or process duplex adj allowing communication in opposite directions simultaneously. <i><b>Duplex</b> system.</i>
<b><u>dwelling</u></b>	Housing that someone is living in. <i>He built a modest <b>dwelling</b> near the pond.</i>
<b>edifice</b>	A complex system of beliefs. <i>It was an imposing <b>edifice</b>.</i>
<b>gambit</b>	An act or remark that is calculated to gain an advantage, especially at the outset of a situation. <i>His resignation was a tactical <b>gambit</b>.</i>
<b>habitation</b>	The fact of living in a particular place. <i>He studied the creation and in<b>habitation</b> and demise of the colony.</i>
<b><u>hall</u></b>	A large entrance or reception room or area. <i>The village <b>hall</b>.</i>
<b><u>headed</u></b>	Having a heading or course in a certain direction. <i>She was always cool <b>headed</b>.</i>
<b>home</b>	Made done or intended for use in the home. <i>A <b>home</b> computer.</i>
<b>homestead</b>	Settle land given by the government and occupy it as a homestead.
<b><u>hut</u></b>	Provide with huts. <i>A beach <b>hut</b>.</i>
<b>mailing</b>	The action or process of sending something by mail. <i>The postmark indicates the time of <b>mailing</b>.</i>
<b>manor</b>	(in North America) an estate or district leased to tenants, especially one granted by royal charter in a British colony or by the Dutch governors of what is now New York State. <i>The right to mine ores within the <b>manor</b> of Little Langdale.</i>
<b><u>mansion</u></b>	A terrace or mansion block. <i>Carlyle <b>Mansions</b>.</i>



<b>mews</b>	Street lined with buildings that were originally private stables but have been remodeled as dwellings. <i>A <b>mews</b> house.</i>
<b><u>neighborhood</u></b>	The approximate amount of something (usually used prepositionally as in ` in the region of. <i>An ethnic <b>neighborhood</b>.</i>
<b>patio</b>	Usually paved outdoor area adjoining a residence. <i>The dining room looks out to a small <b>patio</b>.</i>
<b>postage</b>	A small adhesive token stuck on a letter or package to indicate that that postal fees have been paid. <i>Proof of <b>postage</b> is required.</i>
<b>postal</b>	Done by post. <i><b>Postal</b> services.</i>
<b>rhetorician</b>	A person who delivers a speech or oration. <i>They re ready to listen to any smooth tongued <b>rhetorician</b>.</i>
<b>sender</b>	A person who sends or transmits a message, letter, email, etc. <i>Evidence submitted late will be returned to the <b>sender</b>.</i>
<b><u>tenement</u></b>	Any kind of permanent property, e.g. lands or rents, held from a superior.
<b>tepee</b>	A portable conical tent made of skins, cloth, or canvas on a frame of poles, used by North American Indians of the Plains and Great Lakes regions.
