- *A portion of rocky or high ground remaining after erosion.*
- *Something left after other parts have been taken away.*
- *A payment that is made to a performer or writer or director of a television show or commercial that is paid for every repeat showing.*
- *A difference between a value measured in a scientific experiment and the theoretical or true value.*
- *A royalty paid to a performer, writer, etc. for a repeat of a play, television show, etc.*
- *The resale value of a new car or other item at a specified time after purchase,*

expressed as a percentage of its purchase price.

- *(of a physical state or property) remaining after the removal of or present in the absence of a causative agent.*
- *Remaining after the greater part or quantity has gone.*
- *(of an experimental or arithmetical error) not accounted for or eliminated.*
- *Relating to or indicating a remainder.*
- *(of a quantity) left after other items have been subtracted.*
- *(of a soil or other deposit) formed in situ by weathering.*

(of a feeling or memory) lasting a long time; enduring.
An **abiding** belief.

<u>enduring</u>	Unceasing. <i>He formed a number of enduring relationships with women.</i>
<u>lasting</u>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>They left a lasting impression.</i>
leftover	Not used up. <i>Leftover meatloaf.</i>
lingering	Lasting for a long time or slow to end. <i>There are still some lingering doubts in my mind.</i>
persisting	Relentless and indefatigable in pursuit or as if in pursuit.
<u>remaining</u>	Still to happen; future. <i>They advertised for any remaining creditors to come forward.</i>

vestigial	(of an organ or part of the body) degenerate, rudimentary, or atrophied, having become functionless in the course of evolution. <i>He felt a vestigial flicker of anger from last night.</i>

remaining	Still existing, present, or in use; surviving. <i>The few remaining employees are working part time.</i>
remains	Historical or archaeological relics. <i>He left instructions regarding the disposal of his remains.</i>
remnant	A small part or portion that remains after the main part no longer exists. <i>He sat sewing patchwork cushions with all the remnants.</i>
residue	Matter that remains after something has been removed. <i>The residue of the estate was divided equally among the cousins.</i>
rest	The sign denoting a musical rest. <i>The car accelerates rapidly from rest.</i>
riffraff	Disparaging terms for the common people.
rubble	The remains of something that has been destroyed or broken up. <i>The tower is built of stone rubble faced with ashlar.</i>
scavenge	Clean refuse from. <i>The city dump where the squatters scavenge to survive.</i>
stay	Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>Tactics used to stay in power.</i>
survivor	A person who survives, especially a person remaining alive after an event in which others have died. <i>He left his farm to his survivors.</i>
tainted	Touched by rot or decay. <i>Tainted bacon.</i>

vestigial

Not fully developed in mature animals.

*He felt a **vestigial** flicker of anger from last night.*

waste

Run off as waste.

*Plants produce oxygen as a **waste** product.*

wreckage

The remaining parts of something that has been wrecked.

*They searched the **wreckage** for signs of survivors.*
