<u>adamant</u>	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason- W.Churchill. <i>He is adamant in his refusal to change his mind.</i>
decided	(of a legal case) having been resolved. <i>At a distinct or decided disadvantage.</i>
determined	Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation. <i>A determined effort to reduce inflation.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>No building can stand without firm foundations.</i>
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>With eyes set in a fixed glassy stare.</i>
<u>insistent</u>	Insisting on or demanding something; not allowing refusal. <i>A telephone started ringing loud and insistent.</i>
intent	Determined to do (something). <i>Gill was intent on her gardening magazine.</i>

purposeful	Having meaning through having an aim. <i>Purposeful activities.</i>
purposive	Having or done with a purpose. <i>Teaching is a purposive activity.</i>
resolved	Explained or answered. <i>She was firmly resolved to be a doctor.</i>
set	Set down according to a plan. <i>The moon is set.</i>
single-minded	Determined.
undaunted	Unshaken in purpose. <i>Undaunted in the face of death.</i>
unhesitating	Without doubt or hesitation; immediate. <i>His reply was unhesitating.</i>
unswerving	Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. <i>Unswerving allegiance.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering stare.</i>



Usage Examples of "Resolute" as an adjective

- *Faced with a resolute opposition.*
- *He was resolute in his fight to uphold liberal values.*
- *Stood resolute against the enemy.*

- A resolute and unshakeable faith.

decided

(of a legal case) having been resolved.
*The sunshine is a **decided** improvement.*

determined

Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation.

dogged

Stubbornly unyielding.
*Success required **dogged** determination.*

dour

Relentlessly severe, stern, or gloomy in manner or appearance.
*A **dour** self sacrificing life.*

endurance

The power to withstand hardship or stress.
*The marathon tests a runner's **endurance**.*

firm

Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable.
*Parents should be **firm** with children and not give in to their demands.*

hard	Unfortunate or hard to bear. <i>They work hard at school.</i>
hardheaded	Unreasonably rigid in the face of argument or entreaty or attack. <i>A hardheaded appraisal of our position.</i>
hidebound	Unwilling or unable to change because of tradition or convention. <i>They are working to change hidebound corporate cultures.</i>
inflexible	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>A man of inflexible purpose.</i>
intransigent	An intransigent person. <i>Her father had tried persuasion but she was intransigent.</i>
obduracy	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
obdurate	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i>I argued this point with him but he was obdurate.</i>
obstinate	Resistant to guidance or discipline. <i>Her obstinate determination to pursue a career in radio.</i>
pertinacious	Holding firmly to an opinion or a course of action. <i>He worked with a pertinacious resistance to interruptions.</i>
rigid	Designating an airship or dirigible having a form maintained by a stiff unyielding frame or structure. <i>A rigid disciplinarian.</i>
<u>solid</u>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>A solid mass of flowers.</i>
steadfast	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <i>Steadfast resolve.</i>
<u>stiff</u>	In a stiff manner. <i>A stiff neck.</i>
stubborn	Not responding to treatment. <i>A stubborn infection.</i>
tenacious	Tending to keep a firm hold of something; clinging or adhering closely. <i>Men tenacious of opinion.</i>
unbending	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>An unbending will to dominate.</i>
<u>uncompromising</u>	Harsh or relentless. <i>Uncompromising honesty.</i>
undaunted	Resolutely courageous. <i>They were undaunted by the huge amount of work needed.</i>

undeterred

Not deterred- Osbert Sitwell.

*Pursued his own path **undeterred** by lack of popular appreciation and understanding.*

undismayed

Not dismayed or discouraged by a setback.

***Undismayed** my mother sent me to a first class crammer for two terms.*

unshaken

Unshaken in purpose.

*Their trust in him remained **unshaken**.*

unwavering

Not showing abrupt variations- Louis Auchincloss.

***Unwavering** loyalty.*

unyielding

Stubbornly unyielding T S Eliot.

*His **unyielding** faith.*
