- *(of a job or position) involving important duties, independent decision-making, or control over others.*
- *Having an obligation to do something, or having control over or care for someone, as part of one's job or role.*
- *Worthy of or requiring responsibility or trust; or held accountable.*
- *Capable of being trusted.*

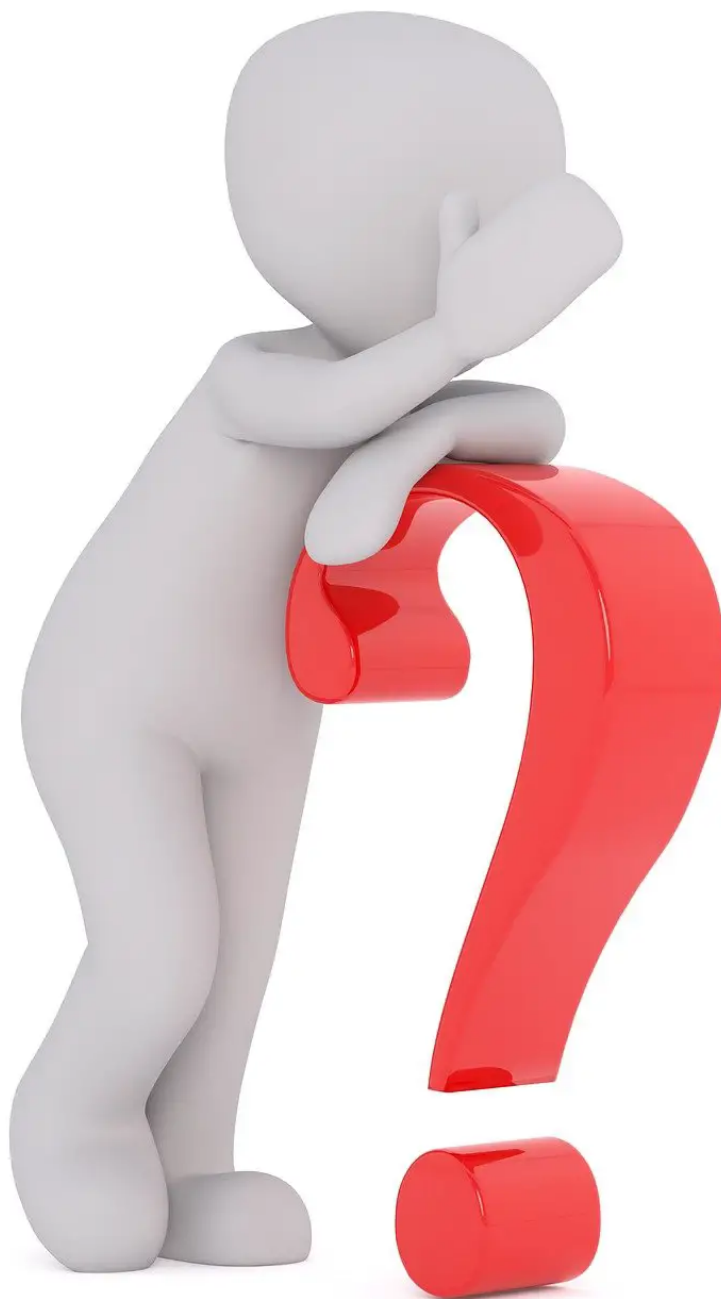

<b><u>executive</u></b>	Relating to or having the power to put plans or actions into effect. <i>The <b>executive</b> branch of government.</i>

<b>high</b>	Being at or having a relatively great or specific elevation or upward extension sometimes used in combinations like knee high. <i>The <b>high</b> priest.</i>
<b>important</b>	Important in effect or meaning. <i>Writers as <b>important</b> as Hopkins.</i>
<b>in charge of</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>in control of</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>level-headed</b>	Exercising or showing good judgment.
<b>liable for</b>	Subject to legal action.
<b>mature</b>	Fully developed or matured and ready to be eaten or used. <i>Miss Walker was a <b>mature</b> lady when she married.</i>
<b>powerful</b>	Possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. <i>A <b>powerful</b> bomb.</i>
<b>rational</b>	(of a number, quantity, or expression) expressible, or containing quantities which are expressible, as a ratio of whole numbers. <i>A process of <b>rational</b> inference.</i>
<b>reasonable</b>	Showing reason or sound judgment. <i>They are lovely shoes and very <b>reasonable</b>.</i>
<b>responsible for</b>	Worthy of or requiring responsibility or trust; or held accountable.
<b>sane</b>	(of a person) of sound mind; not mad or mentally ill. <i>Appears to be completely <b>sane</b>.</i>
<b>sensible</b>	Done or chosen in accordance with wisdom or prudence; likely to be of benefit. <i>Mum always made me have <b>sensible</b> shoes.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Exercising or showing good judgment. <i>A <b>sound</b> timber.</i>
<b><u>stable</u></b>	Sane and sensible; not easily upset or disturbed. <i>A <b>stable</b> peace.</i>
<b>to blame</b>	Expletives used informally as intensifiers.
<b><u>trustworthy</u></b>	Worthy of trust or belief. <i><b>Trustworthy</b> public servants.</i>
<b>trusty</b>	Worthy of trust or belief. <i>My <b>trusty</b> old Morris Minor.</i>

<b>answerable</b>	Required to explain or justify one's actions to; responsible or having to report to. <i>Parents are <b>answerable</b> for their child s acts.</i>
<b>ascribe</b>	Regard a quality as belonging to. <i>Tough mindedness is a quality commonly <b>ascribed</b> to top bosses.</i>
<b>attribute</b>	Attribute or credit to. <i>Ancient peoples <b>attributed</b> magic properties to certain stones.</i>
<b><u>beholden</u></b>	Under a moral obligation to someone. <i>I don t like to be <b>beholden</b> to anybody.</i>
<b>binding</b>	Fabric cut or woven in a strip used for binding the edges of a piece of material. <i>The book had a leather <b>binding</b>.</i>
<b>demonstrably</b>	In a way that is clearly apparent or capable of being logically proved. <i>The policies followed so far have <b>demonstrably</b> failed.</i>
<b><u>directive</u></b>	An official or authoritative instruction. <i>A new EC <b>directive</b>.</i>
<b>duty</b>	The social force that binds you to the courses of action demanded by that force. <i>Goods subject to excise <b>duty</b>.</i>
<b>economically</b>	With respect to economic science. <i>A precis aims to express a passage more <b>economically</b>.</i>
<b>enforceable</b>	(of a law, rule, or obligation) able to be imposed so that it must be complied with. <i>A binding and <b>enforceable</b> contract.</i>
<b>environmentally</b>	In a way that relates to a person's surroundings. <i>Measures designed to promote <b>environmentally</b> friendly farming.</i>
<b>impute</b>	Represent (something, especially something undesirable) as being done or possessed by someone; attribute. <i>Christ s righteousness has been <b>imputed</b> to us.</i>
<b>incorruptible</b>	Not subject to death or decay; everlasting. <i><b>Incorruptible</b> judges are the backbone of the society.</i>
<b><u>indebted</u></b>	Owing gratitude for a service or favour. <i>I am <b>indebted</b> to her for her help in indexing my book.</i>
<b>justified</b>	Having, done for, or marked by a good or legitimate reason. <i>The output is left <b>justified</b>.</i>



<b>legally</b>	By law; conforming to the law. <i>The weapons were purchased <b>legally</b>.</i>
<b>legitimize</b>	Make legitimate. <i>Voters <b>legitimize</b> the government through the election of public officials.</i>
<b>liable</b>	Likely to do or to be something. <i>Non resident trustees are <b>liable</b> to the basic rate of tax.</i>
<b>manumission</b>	Release from slavery. <i><b>Manumission</b> documents from the Slavery Chancellery.</i>
<b>morally</b>	With respect to moral principles. <i>People expected the government to behave <b>morally</b>.</i>
<b>must</b>	Used in ironic questions expressing irritation. <i>A book that is <b>must</b> reading.</i>
<b>obligated</b>	Caused by law or conscience to follow a certain course. <i>Felt <b>obligated</b> to repay the kindness.</i>
<b>partaker</b>	A person who consumes or indulges in something. <i>A <b>partaker</b> of dark chocolate.</i>
<b>recyclable</b>	A substance or object that can be recycled. <i>The containers are <b>recyclable</b>.</i>
<b>required</b>	Required by rule. <i>Eight editions were published each <b>required</b> reading for trainees.</i>
<b>responsibility</b>	The opportunity or ability to act independently and take decisions without authorization. <i>A true leader takes <b>responsibility</b> for their team and helps them achieve goals.</i>
<b>reusable</b>	Able to be used again or more than once. <i><b>Reusable</b> shopping bags.</i>
<b>sustainable</b>	Able to be upheld or defended. <i><b>Sustainable</b> definitions of good educational practice.</i>
