<b>delineate</b>	Indicate the exact position of (a border or boundary). <i>The law should <b>delineate</b> and prohibit behaviour which is socially abhorrent.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Move in a way which follows the outline of (an imaginary geometrical figure). <i>He <b>described</b> his experiences in a letter to his parents.</i>
<b>detail</b>	Provide details for. <i>The report <b>details</b> proposals to improve public transport.</i>
<b>enumerate</b>	Determine the number or amount of. <i>There is not space to <b>enumerate</b> all his works.</i>

<b>give</b>	Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i>Give a yelp.</i>
<b>ingeminate</b>	Repeat or reiterate (a word or statement), typically for emphasis. <i>We must ask and <b>ingeminate</b> the inquiry where is Burns.</i>
<b>itemize</b>	Specify individually. <i>I have <b>itemized</b> the morning s tasks.</i>
<b>iterate</b>	Run or be performed again. <i>The function <b>iterates</b>.</i>
<b>list</b>	Include in a list. <i>I <b>listed</b> myself for a soldier.</i>
<b>name</b>	Assign a specified usually proper proper name to. <i>Many senators were <b>named</b> in connection with the scandal.</i>
<b>present</b>	Formally present a debutante a representative of a country etc. <i>We <b>presented</b> the arguments to him.</i>
<b>rattle off</b>	Shake and cause to make a rattling noise.
<b>recite</b>	Recite in elocution. <i>The pupil <b>recited</b> his lesson for the day.</i>
<b>reiterate</b>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He <b>reiterated</b> the points made in his earlier speech.</i>
<b>repeat</b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>That cucumber <b>repeated</b> on me for hours.</i>
<b>retell</b>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>Walker <b>retells</b> the history of the world from the black perspective.</i>
<b>set out</b>	Fix in a border.
<b>specify</b>	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i><b>Specify</b> the parameters.</i>
<b>spell out</b>	Write or name the letters that comprise the conventionally accepted form of (a word or part of a word).

## Associations of "Restate" (30 Words)

<b>again</b>	Returning to a previous position or condition. <i>What was your name <b>again</b>.</i>
<b>alliteration</b>	Use of the same consonant at the beginning of each stressed syllable in a line of verse. <i><b>Alliterations</b> are clustered in the last few lines.</i>
<b>constantly</b>	Continuously over a period of time; always. <i><b>Constantly</b> kind and gracious.</i>
<b>deny</b>	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>The servants are ordered to <b>deny</b> him.</i>
<b>echo</b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>His contention contains more than an <b>echo</b> of Rousseau.</i>
<b>habit</b>	Put a habit on. <i>In the vile <b>habit</b> of a village slave.</i>
<b>habitually</b>	By way of habit; customarily. <i>He <b>habitually</b> carried a pocket knife.</i>
<b>hobby</b>	An activity done regularly in one's leisure time for pleasure. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
<b>iterate</b>	A quantity arrived at by iteration. <i>The bird s call is a monotonously <b>iterated</b> single note.</i>
<b>once</b>	At a previous time. <i>If she <b>once</b> got an idea in her head you d never move it.</i>
<b>overexertion</b>	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
<b>paraphrase</b>	Express the meaning of (something written or spoken) using different words, especially to achieve greater clarity. <i>It is characteristic of poetic metaphors that they are not susceptible to <b>paraphrase</b>.</i>
<b>phrase</b>	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>To improve standards is the key <b>phrase</b> here.</i>
<b>pummel</b>	Strike, usually with the fist. <i>He has been <b>pummelled</b> by the reviewers.</i>
<b>quotation</b>	A registration granted to a company enabling their shares to be officially listed and traded. <i>Ensure you receive a written <b>quotation</b> covering all aspects of the job.</i>
<b>recapitulate</b>	Repeat (an evolutionary or other process) during development and growth. <i>Let s <b>recapitulate</b> the main ideas.</i>
<b>reiterate</b>	To say, state, or perform again. <i>I just want to forget it all he <b>reiterated</b>.</i>

<b>repeat</b>	A passage intended to be repeated. <i>That cucumber <b>repeated</b> on me for hours.</i>
<b>repeatedly</b>	Several time. <i>They have been warned <b>repeatedly</b> with no effect.</i>
<b>repeating</b>	The act of doing or performing again.
<b>repetition</b>	The act of doing or performing again. <i>Lie on your back and bench press a light weight very quickly over ten <b>repetitions</b>.</i>
<b>reprise</b>	A repeated passage in music. <i>He <b>reprises</b> his role as the vigilante architect.</i>
<b>review</b>	Hold a review of troops. <i>In the next chapter we <b>review</b> a number of recent empirical studies.</i>
<b>rhetorical</b>	Relating to or concerned with the art of rhetoric. <i>The general intended his question to be purely <b>rhetorical</b>.</i>
<b>say</b>	An opportunity for stating one's opinion or feelings. <i>What does this painting <b>say</b>.</i>
<b>sequel</b>	Something that takes place after or as a result of an earlier event. <i>The Prisoner of Zenda and its <b>sequel</b>.</i>
<b>tautology</b>	A statement that is true by necessity or by virtue of its logical form. <i>To say that something is adequate enough is a <b>tautology</b>.</i>
<b>translation</b>	(genetics) the process whereby genetic information coded in messenger RNA directs the formation of a specific protein at a ribosome in the cytoplasm. <i>The <b>translation</b> of the relics of St Thomas of Canterbury.</i>
<b>warn</b>	Give (someone) cautionary advice about their actions or conduct. <i>Police <b>warned</b> people not to keep large amounts of cash in their homes.</i>
<b>word</b>	A command password or signal. <i>A <b>word</b> of warning.</i>
