Synonyms of "Restate" as a verb (20 Words)

catalogue	Enter an item in a catalogue. <i>The report catalogues dangerous work practices in the company.</i>
delineate	Indicate the exact position of (a border or boundary). <i>The law should delineate and prohibit behaviour which is socially abhorrent.</i>
describe	Move in a way which follows the outline of (an imaginary geometrical figure). <i>He described his experiences in a letter to his parents.</i>
detail	Provide details for. <i>The report details proposals to improve public transport.</i>
enumerate	Determine the number or amount of. <i>There is not space to enumerate all his works.</i>

give	Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i>Give a yelp.</i>
ingeminate	Repeat or reiterate (a word or statement), typically for emphasis. <i>We must ask and ingeminate the inquiry where is Burns.</i>
itemize	Specify individually. <i>I have itemized the morning s tasks.</i>
iterate	Run or be performed again. <i>The function iterates.</i>
list	Include in a list. <i>I listed myself for a soldier.</i>
name	Assign a specified usually proper proper name to. <i>Many senators were named in connection with the scandal.</i>
present	Formally present a debutante a representative of a country etc. <i>We presented the arguments to him.</i>
rattle off	Shake and cause to make a rattling noise.
recite	Recite in elocution. <i>The pupil recited his lesson for the day.</i>
reiterate	To say, state, or perform again. <i>He reiterated the points made in his earlier speech.</i>
repeat	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>That cucumber repeated on me for hours.</i>
retell	To say, state, or perform again. <i>Walker retells the history of the world from the black perspective.</i>
set out	Fix in a border.
specify	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>Specify the parameters.</i>
spell out	Write or name the letters that comprise the conventionally accepted form of (a word or part of a word).

Usage Examples of "Restate" as a verb

- *He restated his opposition to abortion.*

Associations of "Restate" (30 Words)

again	Returning to a previous position or condition. <i>What was your name again.</i>
alliteration	Use of the same consonant at the beginning of each stressed syllable in a line of verse. <i>Alliterations are clustered in the last few lines.</i>
constantly	Continuously over a period of time; always. <i>Constantly kind and gracious.</i>
deny	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>The servants are ordered to deny him.</i>
echo	Ring or echo with sound. <i>His contention contains more than an echo of Rousseau.</i>
habit	Put a habit on. <i>In the vile habit of a village slave.</i>
habitually	By way of habit; customarily. <i>He habitually carried a pocket knife.</i>
hobby	An activity done regularly in one's leisure time for pleasure. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
iterate	A quantity arrived at by iteration. <i>The bird s call is a monotonously iterated single note.</i>
once	At a previous time. <i>If she once got an idea in her head you d never move it.</i>
overexertion	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
paraphrase	Express the meaning of (something written or spoken) using different words, especially to achieve greater clarity. <i>It is characteristic of poetic metaphors that they are not susceptible to paraphrase.</i>
phrase	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>To improve standards is the key phrase here.</i>
pummel	Strike, usually with the fist. <i>He has been pummelled by the reviewers.</i>
quotation	A registration granted to a company enabling their shares to be officially listed and traded. <i>Ensure you receive a written quotation covering all aspects of the job.</i>
recapitulate	Repeat (an evolutionary or other process) during development and growth. <i>Let s recapitulate the main ideas.</i>
reiterate	To say, state, or perform again. <i>I just want to forget it all he reiterated.</i>

repeat	A passage intended to be repeated. <i>That cucumber repeated on me for hours.</i>
repeatedly	Several time. <i>They have been warned repeatedly with no effect.</i>
repeating	The act of doing or performing again.
repetition	The act of doing or performing again. <i>Lie on your back and bench press a light weight very quickly over ten repetitions.</i>
reprise	A repeated passage in music. <i>He reprises his role as the vigilante architect.</i>
review	Hold a review of troops. <i>In the next chapter we review a number of recent empirical studies.</i>
rhetorical	Relating to or concerned with the art of rhetoric. <i>The general intended his question to be purely rhetorical.</i>
say	An opportunity for stating one's opinion or feelings. <i>What does this painting say.</i>
sequel	Something that takes place after or as a result of an earlier event. <i>The Prisoner of Zenda and its sequel.</i>
tautology	A statement that is true by necessity or by virtue of its logical form. <i>To say that something is adequate enough is a tautology.</i>
translation	(genetics) the process whereby genetic information coded in messenger RNA directs the formation of a specific protein at a ribosome in the cytoplasm. <i>The translation of the relics of St Thomas of Canterbury.</i>
warn	Give (someone) cautionary advice about their actions or conduct. <i>Police warned people not to keep large amounts of cash in their homes.</i>
word	A command password or signal. <i>A word of warning.</i>
