remuneration	Money paid for work or a service. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional remuneration.</i>
reparation	The act of putting something in working order again. <i>The Treaty of Versailles imposed heavy reparations and restrictions on Germany.</i>
repayment	The act of returning money received previously. <i>Minimum monthly repayments.</i>
replacement	A person or thing that takes or can take the place of another. <i>Please stay until we find a replacement for you.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration looked exactly like the original.</i>
return	The action of returning something. <i>It might be worth checking with the box office for returns.</i>

reward	Benefit resulting from some event or action. <i>The police are offering a reward of up to one thousand pounds for information leading to an arrest and conviction.</i>
satisfaction	Fulfilment of one's wishes, expectations, or needs, or the pleasure derived from this. <i>I demand the satisfaction of a gentleman.</i>
<u>surrender</u>	The action of surrendering a lease or life insurance policy. <i>The colonel was anxious to negotiate a surrender.</i>
yielding	The act of conceding or yielding.

premium	A sum added to an ordinary price or charge. <i>The shares jumped to a 70 per cent premium on the first day.</i>
recompense	Make payment to; compensate. <i>Offenders should recompense their victims.</i>
refund	Money returned to a payer. <i>I ll refund you for the apples and any other damage.</i>
reimburse	Reimburse or compensate someone as for a loss. <i>The investors should be reimbursed for their losses.</i>
reimbursement	The action of repaying a person who has spent or lost money. <i>Reimbursement of everyday medical costs.</i>
remunerate	Make payment to; compensate. <i>My efforts were not remunerated.</i>
remuneration	Money paid for work or a service. <i>Adequate remuneration for his work.</i>

<u>revert</u>	Turn (one's eyes or steps) back. <i>On reverting our eyes every step presented some new and admirable scene.</i>
reward	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>He s reaping the rewards of his hard work and perseverance.</i>
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. <i>A 15 per cent salary increase.</i>
wage	The result or effect of doing something considered wrong or unwise. <i>It is necessary to destroy their capacity to wage war.</i>
<u>wages</u>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The wages of sin is death.</i>
