<b>redress</b>	Remedy or compensation for a wrong or grievance. <i>Those seeking <b>redress</b> for an infringement of public law rights.</i>
<b>regaining</b>	Getting something back again.
<b>reimbursement</b>	A sum paid to cover money that has been spent or lost. <i>The family received insurance <b>reimbursements</b>.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	Money paid for work or a service. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional <b>remuneration</b>.</i>
<b><u>reparation</u></b>	The act of putting something in working order again. <i>The Treaty of Versailles imposed heavy <b>reparations</b> and restrictions on Germany.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	The act of returning money received previously. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b>replacement</b>	A person or thing that takes or can take the place of another. <i>Please stay until we find a <b>replacement</b> for you.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> looked exactly like the original.</i>
<b>return</b>	The action of returning something. <i>It might be worth checking with the box office for <b>returns</b>.</i>

<b>reward</b>	Benefit resulting from some event or action. <i>The police are offering a <b>reward</b> of up to one thousand pounds for information leading to an arrest and conviction.</i>
<b>satisfaction</b>	Fulfilment of one's wishes, expectations, or needs, or the pleasure derived from this. <i>I demand the <b>satisfaction</b> of a gentleman.</i>
<a href="#"><u>surrender</u></a>	The action of surrendering a lease or life insurance policy. <i>The colonel was anxious to negotiate a <b>surrender</b>.</i>
<b>yielding</b>	The act of conceding or yielding.

<u><b>paid</b></u>	(of work or leave) for or during which one receives pay. <i>A <b>paid</b> check.</i>
<b>pay</b>	Render. <i><b>Pay</b> up please.</i>
<b>payment</b>	An amount paid or payable. <i>Three interest free monthly <b>payments</b>.</i>
<u><b>payoff</b></u>	The final payment of a debt.
<b>perquisite</b>	A thing which has served its primary use and to which a subordinate or employee has a customary right. <i>The <b>perquisites</b> of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>

<b>recompense</b>	Make payment to; compensate. <i>Offenders should <b>recompense</b> their victims.</i>
<b>refund</b>	Money returned to a payer. <i>I ll <b>refund</b> you for the apples and any other damage.</i>
<b>reimburse</b>	Reimburse or compensate someone as for a loss. <i>The investors should be <b>reimbursed</b> for their losses.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	The action of repaying a person who has spent or lost money. <i><b>Reimbursement</b> of everyday medical costs.</i>
<b>remunerate</b>	Make payment to; compensate. <i>My efforts were not <b>remunerated</b>.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	Money paid for work or a service. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<u><b>reparation</b></u>	The action of making amends for a wrong one has done, by providing payment or other assistance to those who have been wronged. <i>The Treaty of Versailles imposed heavy <b>reparations</b> and restrictions on Germany.</i>
<u><b>repay</b></u>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>The manager has given me another chance and I m desperate to <b>repay</b> that faith.</i>
<b>requite</b>	Respond to (love or affection). <i>To win enough to <b>requite</b> my friends.</i>
