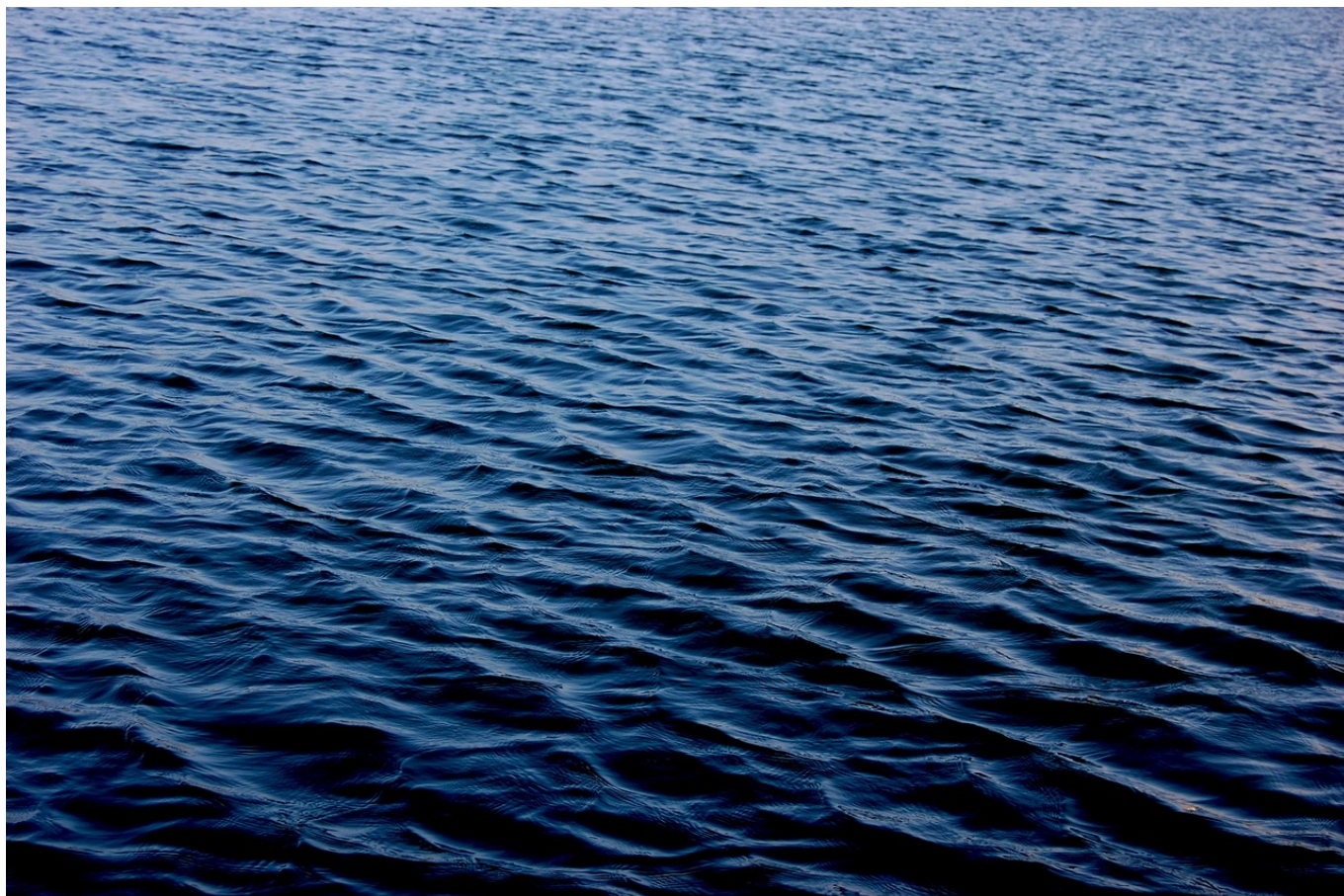

Restless as an Adjective

Definitions of "Restless" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “restless” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Ceaselessly in motion.*
- *Worried and uneasy.*
- *Lacking or not affording physical or mental rest.*
- *Offering no physical or emotional rest; involving constant activity.*
- *Unable to rest or relax as a result of anxiety or boredom.*



Synonyms of "Restless" as an adjective (19 Words)

agitated	Troubled emotionally and usually deeply. <i>The agitated mixture foamed and bubbled.</i>
anxious	(of a situation or period of time) causing or characterized by worry or nervousness. <i>My parents were anxious that I get an education.</i>
<u>apprehensive</u>	In fear or dread of possible evil or harm. <i>He felt apprehensive about going home.</i>
<u>edgy</u>	At the forefront of a trend; experimental or avant-garde. <i>He became edgy and defensive.</i>
fidgety	Nervous and unable to relax. <i>I get nervous and fidgety at the dentist.</i>
ill at ease	Indicating hostility or enmity.
<u>impatient</u>	Restlessly eager. <i>They are impatient for change.</i>

insomniac	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness- Shakespeare. <i>As the host of an all night radio show Shepard would commune with his insomniac listeners.</i>
keyed up	Serving as an essential component.
<u>nervous</u>	Of or relating to the nervous system. <i>He s nervous of speaking in public.</i>
restive	Being in a tense state. <i>He reiterated his determination to hold the restive republics together.</i>
sleepless	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness. <i>Another sleepless night.</i>
<u>tense</u>	Pronounced with relatively tense tongue muscles e g the vowel sound in beat. <i>They waited in tense silence.</i>
<u>uneasy</u>	(of a situation or relationship) not settled; liable to change. <i>An uneasy silence fell on the group.</i>
ungratified	Worried and uneasy.
unquiet	Uneasy; anxious. <i>Spent an unquiet night tossing and turning.</i>
<u>unsatisfied</u>	Worried and uneasy. <i>The compromise left all sides unsatisfied.</i>
wakeful	(of sleep) easily disturbed. <i>A restless wakeful night.</i>
worked up	Getting higher or more vigorous.

- *The audience grew restless and inattentive.*



Associations of "Restless" (30 Words)

adrift	So as to float without being either moored or steered. <i>They were only a point adrift at the break.</i>
<u>afloat</u>	In general circulation; current. <i>The main deck was afloat or awash.</i>
agitated	Troubled emotionally and usually deeply. <i>The agitated mixture foamed and bubbled.</i>
<u>aimless</u>	Aimlessly drifting. <i>An aimless existence.</i>
aimlessly	Without aim; in an aimless manner. <i>We wandered aimlessly round Venice.</i>
balky	Stopping short and refusing to go on. <i>A balky customer.</i>

beggar	Reduce to beggary. <i>Why should I beggar myself for you.</i>
disobedient	Refusing to obey rules or someone in authority. <i>Disobedient children.</i>
dissentient	(of Catholics) refusing to attend services of the Church of England. <i>Dissentient voices were castigated as hopeless bureaucrats.</i>
floating	Not settled permanently; fluctuating or variable. <i>A floating kidney.</i>
froward	(of a person) difficult to deal with; contrary.
impatient	Restless or short-tempered under delay or opposition. <i>Impatient with the slower students.</i>
itinerant	A laborer who moves from place to place as demanded by employment. <i>Itinerant traders.</i>
nervy	Bold or impudent. <i>He was nervy and on edge.</i>
nomadic	Migratory. <i>The nomadic habits of the Bedouins.</i>
nonconformist	Characterized by behaviour or views that do not conform to prevailing ideas or practices. <i>Nonconformist directors like Scorsese.</i>
recalcitrant	Stubbornly resistant to authority or control. <i>A class of recalcitrant fifteen year olds.</i>
recusant	Of or denoting a recusant. <i>Support for the exiled King was greatest among Catholic recusants.</i>
refractory	(of a person or animal) resistant to infection. <i>Healing of previously refractory ulcers.</i>
restive	(of a person) unable to remain still, silent, or submissive, especially because of boredom or dissatisfaction. <i>Both their horses became restive at once.</i>
roam	Use a mobile phone on another operator's network, typically while abroad. <i>Her eyes roamed over the chattering women.</i>
unanimated	Not animated or enlivened; dull. <i>He was very dry and unanimated.</i>
unruly	Unwilling to submit to authority. <i>The little boy's parents think he is spirited but his teacher finds him unruly.</i>

<u>unsatisfied</u>	Not satisfied. <i>The compromise left all sides unsatisfied.</i>
unsettled	Still in doubt. <i>An unsettled lifestyle.</i>
vagabond	Anything that resembles a vagabond in having no fixed place. <i>A vagabond poacher.</i>
<u>vagrant</u>	Relating to or living the life of a vagrant. <i>Vagrant beggars.</i>
wandering	Of a path e.g. <i>A wandering preacher.</i>
wayward	Resistant to guidance or discipline. <i>Wayward behavior.</i>
