<u>corrective</u>	A device for treating injury or disease. <i>The move might be a corrective to some inefficient practices within hospitals.</i>
curative	A curative medicine or agent.
medicament	Something that treats or prevents or alleviates the symptoms of disease.
medication	A drug or other form of medicine that is used to treat or prevent disease. <i>Certain medications can cause dizziness.</i>
medicine	Medicine something that treats or prevents or alleviates the symptoms of disease. <i>The remarkable achievements of modern medicine.</i>

tonic

Music the first note of a diatonic scale.
*In New England they call sodas **tonics**.*

salubrious	(of a place) pleasant; not run-down. <i>The salubrious mountain air and water.</i>
salutary	Tending to promote physical well-being; beneficial to health. <i>The salutary influence of pure air.</i>
stimulating	Making lively and cheerful. <i>A rich and stimulating working environment.</i>
tonic	Giving a feeling of vigour or well-being; invigorating. <i>A tonic body shampoo.</i>
vitalizing	Giving or having the power to give life and spirit- Louis Bromfield. <i>The vitalizing rays of the warming sun.</i>

<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>The scenery is not very inspiring.</i>
<u>invigorating</u>	Making one feel strong, healthy, and full of energy. <i>The invigorating mountain air.</i>
medicinal	A medicinal substance. <i>Medicinal herbs.</i>
organic	A food produced by organic farming. <i>Hydrocarbons are organic compounds.</i>
pertinence	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
<u>pop</u>	Heat popcorn or another foodstuff until it bursts open. <i>The man charged with murder popped a valium to calm his nerves.</i>
proper	(of a psalm, lesson, prayer, etc.) appointed for a particular day, occasion, or season. <i>A proper little do gooders aren't I.</i>
recuperative	Promoting recuperation. <i>Strongly recuperative remedies.</i>
<u>refreshing</u>	Imparting vitality and energy. <i>Common sense of a most refreshing sort.</i>
<u>relevant</u>	Appropriate to the current time, period, or circumstances; of contemporary interest. <i>The scientist corresponds with colleagues in order to learn about matters relevant to her own research.</i>

salubrious	Promoting health; healthful. <i>The salubrious mountain air and water.</i>
salutary	(especially with reference to something unwelcome or unpleasant) producing good effects; beneficial. <i>The salutary influence of pure air.</i>
stimulating	Encouraging or arousing interest or enthusiasm. <i>A rich and stimulating working environment.</i>
strength	The amount of energy transmitted (as by acoustic or electromagnetic radiation). <i>The strength of the drinks.</i>
sturdy	Showing confidence and determination. <i>The bike is sturdy enough to cope with bumpy tracks.</i>
tonic	Music the first note of a diatonic scale. <i>A tonic reflex.</i>
veg	Relax to the point of complete inertia. <i>They were vegging out in front of the TV.</i>
wellness	The state of being in good health, especially as an actively pursued goal. <i>Measures of a patient's progress toward wellness.</i>
