Definitions of "Restricted" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “restricted” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Subject to restriction or subjected to restriction.*
- *(of DNA) subject to degradation by a restriction enzyme.*
- *The lowest level of official classification for documents.*
- *Restricted in meaning; (as e.g. `man' in `a tall man.*
- *(of a virus) unable to reproduce at its normal rate in certain hosts.*
- *(of a document or information) not to be disclosed to the public for reasons of national security.*
- *Limited in extent, number, scope, or action.*

- compact** Closely and neatly packed together; dense.
*A wrestler of **compact** build.*
- confined** (of a space) restricted in area or volume; cramped.
*Her fear of **confined** spaces.*
- constricted** Inhibited; restricted.
*People seek an environment where they don't feel **constricted**.*
- controlled** (of an explosion) produced deliberately under conditions that are determined beforehand.
*She is a very **controlled** player and is mentally tough.*
- cramped** Constricted in size.
*He felt **cramped** in a large organization.*

<u>inadequate</u>	Of insufficient quantity to meet a need. <i>The staff was inadequate.</i>
intimate	(of knowledge) detailed or thorough. <i>He touched her intimate parts.</i>
limited	Denoting a limited company used after a company name. Limited war.
<u>minimal</u>	Characterized by the use of simple forms or structures, especially geometric or massive ones. <i>Needed to enforce minimal standards.</i>
narrow	Denoting a vowel pronounced with the root of the tongue drawn back so as to narrow the pharynx. <i>They ate a narrow range of foods.</i>
personal	Existing as a self aware entity not as an abstraction or an impersonal force. <i>I have something personal to tell you.</i>
poky	Annoyingly slow. <i>Five of us shared the poky little room.</i>
<u>private</u>	Concerning things deeply private and personal. Private lessons.
privileged	(of information) legally protected from being made public. <i>He accused me of giving away privileged information.</i>
<u>qualified</u>	Holding appropriate documentation and officially on record as qualified to perform a specified function or practice a specified skill. <i>Newly qualified nurses.</i>
quiet	Free of noise or uproar; or making little if any sound. <i>The car has a quiet economical engine.</i>
small	Made to seem smaller or less especially in worth. <i>A still small voice.</i>
<u>sparse</u>	Scanty; in short supply. <i>Information on earnings is sparse.</i>
tight	Pulled or drawn tight. <i>Presidential advisers keep a tight grip on domestic policy.</i>

<u>captive</u>	A person who has been taken prisoner or an animal that has been confined. <i>The farm was used to hold prisoners of war captive.</i>
circumscribed	Subject to limits or subjected to limits.
classified	(of information or documents) designated as officially secret and accessible only to authorized people. <i>Classified information on nuclear experiments.</i>
conditional	A sentence containing a conditional clause. <i>Lent conditional support.</i>
confined	Not free to move about. <i>Her fear of confined spaces.</i>
confinement	The action of confining or state of being confined. <i>The pros and cons of home versus hospital confinement.</i>
constraint	The state of being physically constrained. <i>They would be able to talk without constraint.</i>
<u>cramped</u>	Uncomfortably small or restricted. <i>Trying to bring children up in cramped high rise apartments.</i>

<u>exclusive</u>	An item or story published or broadcast by only one source. <i>The list is not exclusive.</i>
exhaustible	Capable of being used up. <i>Our exhaustible reserves of fossil fuel.</i>
expendable	Of relatively little significance, and therefore able to be abandoned or destroyed. <i>Unmanned and expendable launch vehicles.</i>
<u>few</u>	The RAF pilots who took part in the Battle of Britain. <i>Few women have led troops in battle.</i>
finite	Limited in size or extent. <i>Every computer has a finite amount of memory.</i>
incompleteness	The state of being crude and incomplete and imperfect. <i>The study was criticized for incompleteness of data but it stimulated further research.</i>
insofar	To the degree or extent that. <i>Insofar as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
limitation	A limiting rule or circumstance; a restriction. <i>The limitation of local authorities powers.</i>
limited	Not unlimited. <i>The legislation has had a limited effect.</i>
limiting	Strictly limiting the reference of a modified word or phrase. <i>A limiting factor.</i>
localized	Confined or restricted to a particular location. <i>There d now be a more localized news service.</i>
modified	Mediocre. <i>The performance of the modified aircraft was much improved.</i>
narrow	Make or become more narrow or restricted. <i>The road narrowed.</i>
<u>only</u>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>She was still only in her mid thirties.</i>
provisional	A provisional stamp. <i>Norman as yet had only a provisional licence.</i>
provisory	Subject to a proviso; conditional. <i>A provisory clause.</i>
regulation	In accordance with regulations of the correct type. <i>Fiscal regulations are in the hands of politicians.</i>

restraint	A rule or condition that limits freedom. <i>The unlawful restraint of trade.</i>
scanty	Lacking in amplitude or quantity. <i>They paid whatever they could out of their scanty wages to their families.</i>
selectively	By selection; in a selective manner. <i>The book needs to be read selectively.</i>
tentative	Under terms not final or fully worked out or agreed upon. <i>He eventually tried a few tentative steps round his hospital room.</i>
transitory	Lasting a very short time. <i>Love is transitory but it is eternal.</i>
