## Restructure as a Verb

### Definitions of "Restructure" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “restructure” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Convert (the debt of a business in difficulty) into another kind of debt, typically one that is repayable at a later time.*
- *Organize differently.*
- *Construct or form anew or provide with a new structure.*



## Synonyms of "Restructure" as a verb (15 Words)

<b>change</b>	Change from one vehicle or transportation line to another. <i>There s an ATM in the reception area which will <b>change</b> your English money.</i>
<b>change around</b>	Become deeper in tone.
<b>change the line-up of</b>	Become different in some particular way, without permanently losing one's or its former characteristics or essence.
<b>complete shift</b>	Write all the required information onto a form.
<b>interchange</b>	(of two or more people) exchange (things) with each other. <i>Synonyms can be <b>interchanged</b> without a changing the context s meaning.</i>
<b>realign</b>	Align anew or better. <i>The surgeon <b>realigned</b> my jaw after the accident.</i>
<b>rearrange</b>	Change (the position, time, or order of something). <i><b>Rearrange</b> the furniture in my room.</i>
<b>reconstitute</b>	Build up again from parts; reconstruct. <i>His skeleton was <b>reconstituted</b> and exhibited in University College.</i>

<b>redistribute</b>	Distribute (something) differently or again, typically to achieve greater social equality. <i><b>Redistribute</b> the troops more strategically.</i>
<b>regroup</b>	Reassemble or cause to reassemble into organized groups, typically after being attacked or defeated. <i>He <b>regrouped</b> his fighters in the hills.</i>
<b>rejig</b>	Organize (something) differently; rearrange. <i>Britain will send experts to help <b>rejig</b> French factories.</i>
<b>reorganize</b>	Organize anew. <i>We must <b>reorganize</b> the company if we don't want to go under.</i>
<b><u>restructuring</u></b>	Construct or form anew or provide with a new structure.
<b>shake up</b>	Shake (a body part) to communicate a greeting, feeling, or cognitive state.
<b><u>shuffle</u></b>	Walk by dragging one's feet along or without lifting them fully from the ground. <i>He <b>shuffled</b> out of the room.</i>







## Usage Examples of "Restructure" as a verb

- *Shareholders and creditors agreed to restructure debts and payment schedules.*
- *After his accident, he had to restructure his life.*
- *The troubled property company is negotiating the restructuring of its debts.*
- *A plan to strengthen and restructure the EC.*

### architect

A person who is qualified to design buildings and to plan and supervise their construction.

### architecture

The style in which a building is designed and constructed, especially with regard to a specific period, place, or culture.

<b><u>cabinet</u></b>	A small private room. A <b>cabinet</b> meeting.
<b>construction</b>	A building or other structure. <i>I concluded from his awkward <b>constructions</b> that he was a foreigner.</i>
<b>deregulate</b>	Lift the regulations on. <i>The trucking industry was <b>deregulated</b> in the early 1980s.</i>
<b>downsize</b>	Make (a company or organization) smaller by eliminating staff positions. <i>The company <b>downsized</b> its research staff.</i>
<b>effort</b>	Use of physical or mental energy; hard work. <i>He was a keen gardener winning many prizes for his <b>efforts</b>.</i>
<b>enterprise</b>	Initiative and resourcefulness. <i>A state owned <b>enterprise</b>.</i>
<b><u>forge</u></b>	A blacksmith's workshop; a smithy. <i>He <b>forged</b> a great suit of black armour.</i>
<b>liberalize</b>	Become more liberal. <i>Several agreements to <b>liberalize</b> trade were signed.</i>
<b>owned</b>	Having an owner; often used in combination. <i>State <b>owned</b> railways.</i>
<b>privatization</b>	Changing something from state to private ownership or control. <i>The government's <b>privatization</b> plans.</i>
<b>privatize</b>	Transfer (a business, industry, or service) from public to private ownership and control. <i>They were opposed to plans to <b>privatize</b> electricity and water.</i>
<b><u>rebuild</u></b>	An instance of rebuilding. <i>The Trust have recognized the hard work of all who were involved in this daunting <b>rebuild</b>.</i>
<b>recast</b>	Cast again, in a different role. <i>She had to <b>recast</b> her image to please the electorate in her home state.</i>
<b>reconstitute</b>	Restore (dried food or drink) to its original state by adding water. <i>The governing board was <b>reconstituted</b>.</i>
<b><u>reconstruct</u></b>	Build or form (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed. <i><b>Reconstruct</b> the events of 20 years ago.</i>
<b><u>reconstruction</u></b>	An interpretation formed by piecing together bits of evidence. <i>A <b>reconstruction</b> of the accident would be staged to try to discover the cause of the tragedy.</i>
<b>reestablish</b>	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i><b>Reestablish</b> peace in the region.</i>

<b>reforestation</b>	The process of replanting an area with trees. <i>The need for post fire <b>reforestation</b>.</i>
<b><u>refurbish</u></b>	Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building). <i>We <b>refurbished</b> the guest wing.</i>
<b><u>reinstate</u></b>	Restore (someone or something) to their former position or state. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not <b>reinstated</b>.</i>
<b>remodel</b>	Shape (a figure or object) again or differently. <i>The station was <b>remodelled</b> and enlarged in 1927.</i>
<b>remold</b>	Cast again.
<b>reorganization</b>	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>The fundamental <b>reorganization</b> of society along socialist lines.</i>
<b>reshape</b>	Shape or form (something) differently or again. <i>The decrees will thoroughly <b>reshape</b> Poland s economy.</i>
<b>reshuffle</b>	A redistribution of something. <i>The gambler demanded a <b>reshuffle</b>.</i>
<b>shakeup</b>	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>Top officials were forced out in the cabinet <b>shakeup</b>.</i>
<b><u>workforce</u></b>	The force of workers available. <i>A quarter of Galway s manufacturing <b>workforce</b> are being put out of a job.</i>
