Definitions of "Restructure" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “restructure” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Convert (the debt of a business in difficulty) into another kind of debt, typically one that is repayable at a later time.*
- *Organize differently.*
- *Construct or form anew or provide with a new structure.*



Synonyms of "Restructure" as a verb (15 Words)

change	Change from one vehicle or transportation line to another. <i>There s an ATM in the reception area which will change your English money.</i>
change around	Become deeper in tone.
change the line-up of	Become different in some particular way, without permanently losing one's or its former characteristics or essence.
complete shift	Write all the required information onto a form.
interchange	(of two or more people) exchange (things) with each other. <i>Synonyms can be interchanged without a changing the context s meaning.</i>
realign	Align anew or better. <i>The surgeon realigned my jaw after the accident.</i>
rearrange	Change (the position, time, or order of something). <i>Rearrange the furniture in my room.</i>
reconstitute	Build up again from parts; reconstruct. <i>His skeleton was reconstituted and exhibited in University College.</i>

redistribute	Distribute (something) differently or again, typically to achieve greater social equality. <i>Redistribute the troops more strategically.</i>
regroup	Reassemble or cause to reassemble into organized groups, typically after being attacked or defeated. <i>He regrouped his fighters in the hills.</i>
rejig	Organize (something) differently; rearrange. <i>Britain will send experts to help rejig French factories.</i>
reorganize	Organize anew. <i>We must reorganize the company if we don't want to go under.</i>
<u>restructuring</u>	Construct or form anew or provide with a new structure.
shake up	Shake (a body part) to communicate a greeting, feeling, or cognitive state.
<u>shuffle</u>	Walk by dragging one's feet along or without lifting them fully from the ground. <i>He shuffled out of the room.</i>



Usage Examples of "Restructure" as a verb

- *Shareholders and creditors agreed to restructure debts and payment schedules.*
- *After his accident, he had to restructure his life.*
- *The troubled property company is negotiating the restructuring of its debts.*
- *A plan to strengthen and restructure the EC.*

<u>cabinet</u>	A small private room. A cabinet meeting.
construction	A building or other structure. <i>I concluded from his awkward constructions that he was a foreigner.</i>
deregulate	Lift the regulations on. <i>The trucking industry was deregulated in the early 1980s.</i>
downsize	Make (a company or organization) smaller by eliminating staff positions. <i>The company downsized its research staff.</i>
effort	Use of physical or mental energy; hard work. <i>He was a keen gardener winning many prizes for his efforts.</i>
enterprise	Initiative and resourcefulness. <i>A state owned enterprise.</i>
<u>forge</u>	A blacksmith's workshop; a smithy. <i>He forged a great suit of black armour.</i>
liberalize	Become more liberal. <i>Several agreements to liberalize trade were signed.</i>
owned	Having an owner; often used in combination. <i>State owned railways.</i>
privatization	Changing something from state to private ownership or control. <i>The government's privatization plans.</i>
privatize	Transfer (a business, industry, or service) from public to private ownership and control. <i>They were opposed to plans to privatize electricity and water.</i>
<u>rebuild</u>	An instance of rebuilding. <i>The Trust have recognized the hard work of all who were involved in this daunting rebuild.</i>
recast	Cast again, in a different role. <i>She had to recast her image to please the electorate in her home state.</i>
reconstitute	Restore (dried food or drink) to its original state by adding water. <i>The governing board was reconstituted.</i>
<u>reconstruct</u>	Build or form (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed. Reconstruct the events of 20 years ago.
<u>reconstruction</u>	An interpretation formed by piecing together bits of evidence. <i>A reconstruction of the accident would be staged to try to discover the cause of the tragedy.</i>
reestablish	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. Reestablish peace in the region.

reforestation	The process of replanting an area with trees. <i>The need for post fire reforestation.</i>
<u>refurbish</u>	Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building). <i>We refurbished the guest wing.</i>
<u>reinstate</u>	Restore (someone or something) to their former position or state. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not reinstated.</i>
remodel	Shape (a figure or object) again or differently. <i>The station was remodelled and enlarged in 1927.</i>
remold	Cast again.
reorganization	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>The fundamental reorganization of society along socialist lines.</i>
reshape	Shape or form (something) differently or again. <i>The decrees will thoroughly reshape Poland s economy.</i>
reshuffle	A redistribution of something. <i>The gambler demanded a reshuffle.</i>
shakeup	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>Top officials were forced out in the cabinet shakeup.</i>
<u>workforce</u>	The force of workers available. <i>A quarter of Galway s manufacturing workforce are being put out of a job.</i>
