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## Associations of "Restructuring" (30 Words)

<a href="#">architect</a>	A person who designs hardware, software, or networking applications and services of a specified type for a business or other organization. <i>The great Norman <b>architect</b> of Durham Cathedral.</i>
<a href="#">architecture</a>	The profession of designing buildings and environments with consideration for their esthetic effect. <i>The <b>architecture</b> of a computer s system software.</i>
<b>building</b>	The occupants of a building. <i>Workers in the <b>building</b> trades.</i>
<a href="#">cabinet</a>	A piece of furniture resembling a cupboard with doors and shelves and drawers; for storage or display. <i>A cocktail <b>cabinet</b>.</i>
<b>construction</b>	A thing constructed; a complex entity constructed of many parts. <i>During the <b>construction</b> we had to take a detour.</i>
<b>deregulate</b>	Remove regulations or restrictions from. <i>The trucking industry was <b>deregulated</b> in the early 1980s.</i>
<b>downsize</b>	(of a company) eliminate staff positions. <i>A TV news producer told what happened after her network <b>downsized</b> the newsroom.</i>
<b>effort</b>	A force exerted by a machine or in a process. <i>He was a keen gardener winning many prizes for his <b>efforts</b>.</i>
<b>enterprise</b>	A purposeful or industrious undertaking (especially one that requires effort or boldness). <i>He had doubts about the whole <b>enterprise</b>.</i>
<a href="#">forge</a>	Create by hammering. <i>She <b>forged</b> a Green Card.</i>
<b>liberalize</b>	Remove or loosen restrictions on (something, typically an economic or political system). <i>Several agreements to <b>liberalize</b> trade were signed.</i>

<b>owned</b>	Having an owner; often used in combination. <i>State <b>owned</b> railways.</i>
<b>privatization</b>	Changing something from state to private ownership or control. <i>The government launched a new round of <b>privatizations</b>.</i>
<b>privatize</b>	Change from governmental to private control or ownership. <i>The oil industry was <b>privatized</b>.</i>
<b><u>rebuild</u></b>	An instance of rebuilding. <i>The <b>rebuilt</b>s include a number of Delage cars.</i>
<b>recast</b>	Cast again, in a different role. <i>He was <b>recast</b> as Iago.</i>
<b>reconstitute</b>	Change the form and organization of (an institution). <i>He <b>reconstituted</b> his cabinet.</i>
<b><u>reconstruct</u></b>	Cause somebody to adapt or reform socially or politically. <i>Later emperors <b>reconstructed</b> the army.</i>
<b><u>reconstruction</u></b>	An impression, model, or re-enactment of a past event formed from the available evidence. <i>A <b>reconstruction</b> of the accident would be staged to try to discover the cause of the tragedy.</i>
<b>reestablish</b>	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i><b>Reestablish</b> peace in the region.</i>
<b>reforestation</b>	The process of replanting an area with trees. <i>The need for post fire <b>reforestation</b>.</i>
<b><u>refurbish</u></b>	Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building). <i>The premises have been completely <b>refurbished</b> in our corporate style.</i>
<b><u>reinstate</u></b>	Restore (someone or something) to their former position or state. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not <b>reinstated</b>.</i>
<b>remodel</b>	Cast or model anew. <i>The station was <b>remodelled</b> and enlarged in 1927.</i>
<b>remold</b>	Give new treads to (a tire).
<b>reorganization</b>	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>The <b>reorganization</b> was prescribed by federal bankruptcy laws.</i>
<b>reshape</b>	Shape anew or differently. <i>The new foreign minister <b>reshaped</b> the foreign policy of his country.</i>
<b>reshuffle</b>	Shuffle (playing cards) again. <i>So as to prevent cheating he was asked to <b>reshuffle</b> the cards.</i>

**shakeup**

The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes).

*Top officials were forced out in the cabinet **shakeup**.*

workforce

The people engaged in or available for work, either in a country or area or in a particular firm or industry.

*A quarter of Galway's manufacturing **workforce** are being put out of a job.*
