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Associations of "Restructuring" (30 Words)

architect	A person who designs hardware, software, or networking applications and services of a specified type for a business or other organization. <i>The great Norman architect of Durham Cathedral.</i>
architecture	The profession of designing buildings and environments with consideration for their esthetic effect. <i>The architecture of a computer s system software.</i>
building	The occupants of a building. <i>Workers in the building trades.</i>
cabinet	A piece of furniture resembling a cupboard with doors and shelves and drawers; for storage or display. <i>A cocktail cabinet.</i>
construction	A thing constructed; a complex entity constructed of many parts. <i>During the construction we had to take a detour.</i>
deregulate	Remove regulations or restrictions from. <i>The trucking industry was deregulated in the early 1980s.</i>
downsize	(of a company) eliminate staff positions. <i>A TV news producer told what happened after her network downsized the newsroom.</i>
effort	A force exerted by a machine or in a process. <i>He was a keen gardener winning many prizes for his efforts.</i>
enterprise	A purposeful or industrious undertaking (especially one that requires effort or boldness). <i>He had doubts about the whole enterprise.</i>
forge	Create by hammering. <i>She forged a Green Card.</i>
liberalize	Remove or loosen restrictions on (something, typically an economic or political system). <i>Several agreements to liberalize trade were signed.</i>

owned	Having an owner; often used in combination. <i>State owned railways.</i>
privatization	Changing something from state to private ownership or control. <i>The government launched a new round of privatizations.</i>
privatize	Change from governmental to private control or ownership. <i>The oil industry was privatized.</i>
<u>rebuild</u>	An instance of rebuilding. <i>The rebuilts include a number of Delage cars.</i>
recast	Cast again, in a different role. <i>He was recast as Iago.</i>
reconstitute	Change the form and organization of (an institution). <i>He reconstituted his cabinet.</i>
<u>reconstruct</u>	Cause somebody to adapt or reform socially or politically. <i>Later emperors reconstructed the army.</i>
<u>reconstruction</u>	An impression, model, or re-enactment of a past event formed from the available evidence. <i>A reconstruction of the accident would be staged to try to discover the cause of the tragedy.</i>
reestablish	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i>Reestablish peace in the region.</i>
reforestation	The process of replanting an area with trees. <i>The need for post fire reforestation.</i>
<u>refurbish</u>	Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building). <i>The premises have been completely refurbished in our corporate style.</i>
<u>reinstate</u>	Restore (someone or something) to their former position or state. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not reinstated.</i>
remodel	Cast or model anew. <i>The station was remodelled and enlarged in 1927.</i>
remold	Give new treads to (a tire).
reorganization	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>The reorganization was prescribed by federal bankruptcy laws.</i>
reshape	Shape anew or differently. <i>The new foreign minister reshaped the foreign policy of his country.</i>
reshuffle	Shuffle (playing cards) again. <i>So as to prevent cheating he was asked to reshuffle the cards.</i>

shakeup

The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes).

*Top officials were forced out in the cabinet **shakeup**.*

workforce

The people engaged in or available for work, either in a country or area or in a particular firm or industry.

*A quarter of Galway's manufacturing **workforce** are being put out of a job.*
