rebuild An instance of rebuilding.

The **rebuild**s include a number of Delage cars.

recast Cast again, in a different role.

He was **recast** as Iago.

reconstitute Change the form and organization of (an institution.

He reconstituted his cabinet.

reconstruct Cause somebody to adapt or reform socially or politically.

Later emperors **reconstruct**ed the army.

An impression, model, or re-enactment of a past event formed from the

available evidence.

reconstruction A reconstruction of the accident would be staged to try to discover the

cause of the tragedy.

reestablish Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position.

Reestablish peace in the region.

reforestation The process of replanting an area with trees.

The need for post fire **reforestation**.

refurbish Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building.

The premises have been completely **refurbish**ed in our corporate style.

reinstateRestore (someone or something) to their former position or state.

The union threatened strike action if Owen was not **reinstate**d.

Cast or model anew.

remodelThe station was **remodel**led and enlarged in 1927.

remold Give new treads to (a tire.

The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often
