<u>awakening</u>	An act of waking from sleep. <i>It was an early awakening.</i>
christ's resurrection	The rising of Christ on the third day after the Crucifixion.
<u>comeback</u>	A sheep bred from cross-bred and pure-bred parents for both wool and meat. <i>There s no comeback if he messes up your case.</i>
raising from the dead	The properties acquired as a consequence of the way you were treated as a child.
re-establishment	Restoration to a previous state.
reappearance	The act of someone appearing again. <i>The reappearance of Halley s comet.</i>

<u>rebirth</u>	A second or new birth. <i>The rebirth of a defeated nation.</i>
<u>regeneration</u>	The action or process of regenerating or being regenerated. <i>The regeneration of inner cities.</i>
reintroduction	An act of renewed introduction. <i>The first ferret reintroductions took place in Wyoming.</i>
rejuvenation	The phenomenon of vitality and freshness being restored. <i>They were instrumental in the rejuvenation of the river.</i>
relaunch	An instance of relaunching a product. <i>A relaunch of the first Dior perfume.</i>
<u>renaissance</u>	The revival of learning and culture.
renascence	The revival of something that has been dormant. <i>The renascence of poetry as an oral art.</i>
renewal	The conversion of wasteland into land suitable for use of habitation or cultivation. <i>A renewal of his passport.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration of a democratic government.</i>
restoration to life	The act of restoring something or someone to a satisfactory state.
resurrection of christ	A revival from inactivity and disuse.
resuscitation	The action of making something active or vigorous again. <i>Resuscitation of bygone artistic styles.</i>
revitalization	Bringing again into activity and prominence. <i>The city has seen revitalization of its economy.</i>
<u>revival</u>	An improvement in the condition, strength, or fortunes of someone or something. <i>An economic revival.</i>
stimulation	(physiology) the effect of a stimulus (on nerves or organs etc). <i>Lack of intellectual stimulation.</i>

<u>disbelieve</u>	Be unable to believe. <i>To disbelieve is as much an act of faith as belief.</i>
<u>divine</u>	Resulting from divine providence. <i>The divine Shakespeare.</i>
<u>elixir</u>	A magical or medicinal potion. <i>At one point during the festivities the river is said to turn into the elixir of life.</i>
<u>eternal</u>	Used to emphasize expressions of admiration, gratitude, etc. <i>She is an eternal optimist.</i>

eternity	Time without end. <i>Their love was sealed for eternity.</i>
<u>forever</u>	For a very long or seemingly endless time. <i>She took forever to write the paper.</i>
heaven	A place, state, or experience of supreme bliss. <i>Heaven knows.</i>
idealistic	Characterized by idealism; unrealistically aiming for perfection. <i>Idealistic young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
immortality	The ability to live forever; eternal life. <i>Occasionally a guide book has achieved immortality.</i>
<u>infinite</u>	A space or quantity that is infinite. <i>The infinite mercy of God.</i>
<u>infinity</u>	A point in space or time that is or seems infinitely distant. <i>The transmission approaches 100 as the frequency tends to infinity.</i>
<u>longevity</u>	The property of being long-lived. <i>Her longevity as a star.</i>
magic	An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i>A magical spell.</i>
<u>miracle</u>	An exceptional product or achievement, or an outstanding example of something. <i>A miracle drug.</i>
morbidity	An abnormally gloomy or unhealthy state of mind. <i>The levels of air pollution are associated with increased morbidity from respiratory diseases.</i>
<u>mystic</u>	Relating to or characteristic of mysticism. <i>The poetry of the 16th century Spanish mystic St John of the Cross.</i>
nirvana	The beatitude that transcends the cycle of reincarnation; characterized by the extinction of desire and suffering and individual consciousness. <i>The days of socialist nirvana in Europe are over.</i>
omniscience	The state of being omniscient; having infinite knowledge. <i>The notion of divine omniscience.</i>
panacea	A solution or remedy for all difficulties or diseases. <i>The time honoured panacea cod liver oil.</i>
<u>paradise</u>	The abode of Adam and Eve before the Fall in the biblical account of the Creation; the Garden of Eden. <i>The surrounding countryside is a walker s paradise.</i>

- paregoric** A medicine consisting of opium flavoured with camphor, aniseed, and benzoic acid, formerly used to treat diarrhoea and coughing in children.
- phoenix** A legendary Arabian bird said to periodically burn itself to death and emerge from the ashes as a new phoenix according to most versions only one phoenix lived at a time and it renewed itself every 500 years.

- potion** A medicinal or magical or poisonous beverage.
