<b><u>comeback</u></b>	A sheep bred from cross-bred and pure-bred parents for both wool and meat. <i>There s no <b>comeback</b> if he messes up your case.</i>
<b>raising from the dead</b>	The properties acquired as a consequence of the way you were treated as a child.
<b>re-establishment</b>	Restoration to a previous state.
<b>reappearance</b>	The act of someone appearing again. <i>The <b>reappearance</b> of Halley s comet.</i>

<b><u>rebirth</u></b>	A second or new birth. <i>The <b>rebirth</b> of a defeated nation.</i>
<b><u>regeneration</u></b>	The action or process of regenerating or being regenerated. <i>The <b>regeneration</b> of inner cities.</i>
<b>reintroduction</b>	An act of renewed introduction. <i>The first ferret <b>reintroductions</b> took place in Wyoming.</i>
<b>rejuvenation</b>	The phenomenon of vitality and freshness being restored. <i>They were instrumental in the <b>rejuvenation</b> of the river.</i>
<b>relaunch</b>	An instance of relaunching a product. <i>A <b>relaunch</b> of the first Dior perfume.</i>
<b><u>renaissance</u></b>	The revival of learning and culture.
<b>renascence</b>	The revival of something that has been dormant. <i>The <b>renascence</b> of poetry as an oral art.</i>
<b>renewal</b>	The conversion of wasteland into land suitable for use of habitation or cultivation. <i>A <b>renewal</b> of his passport.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> of a democratic government.</i>
<b>restoration to life</b>	The act of restoring something or someone to a satisfactory state.
<b>resurrection of christ</b>	A revival from inactivity and disuse.
<b>resuscitation</b>	The action of making something active or vigorous again. <i><b>Resuscitation</b> of bygone artistic styles.</i>
<b>revitalization</b>	Bringing again into activity and prominence. <i>The city has seen <b>revitalization</b> of its economy.</i>
<b><u>revival</u></b>	An improvement in the condition, strength, or fortunes of someone or something. <i>An economic <b>revival</b>.</i>
<b>stimulation</b>	(physiology) the effect of a stimulus (on nerves or organs etc). <i>Lack of intellectual <b>stimulation</b>.</i>

<b><u>forever</u></b>	For a very long or seemingly endless time. <i>She took <b>forever</b> to write the paper.</i>
<b>heaven</b>	A place, state, or experience of supreme bliss. <i><b>Heaven</b> knows.</i>
<b>idealistic</b>	Characterized by idealism; unrealistically aiming for perfection. <i><b>Idealistic</b> young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
<b>immortality</b>	The ability to live forever; eternal life. <i>Occasionally a guide book has achieved <b>immortality</b>.</i>
<b><u>infinite</u></b>	A space or quantity that is infinite. <i>The <b>infinite</b> mercy of God.</i>
<b><u>infinity</u></b>	A point in space or time that is or seems infinitely distant. <i>The transmission approaches 100 as the frequency tends to <b>infinity</b>.</i>
<b><u>longevity</u></b>	The property of being long-lived. <i>Her <b>longevity</b> as a star.</i>
<b>magic</b>	An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i>A <b>magical</b> spell.</i>
<b><u>miracle</u></b>	An exceptional product or achievement, or an outstanding example of something. <i>A <b>miracle</b> drug.</i>
<b>morbidity</b>	An abnormally gloomy or unhealthy state of mind. <i>The levels of air pollution are associated with increased <b>morbidity</b> from respiratory diseases.</i>
<b><u>mystic</u></b>	Relating to or characteristic of mysticism. <i>The poetry of the 16th century Spanish <b>mystic</b> St John of the Cross.</i>
<b>nirvana</b>	The beatitude that transcends the cycle of reincarnation; characterized by the extinction of desire and suffering and individual consciousness. <i>The days of socialist <b>nirvana</b> in Europe are over.</i>
<b>omniscience</b>	The state of being omniscient; having infinite knowledge. <i>The notion of divine <b>omniscience</b>.</i>
<b>panacea</b>	A solution or remedy for all difficulties or diseases. <i>The time honoured <b>panacea</b> cod liver oil.</i>
<b><u>paradise</u></b>	The abode of Adam and Eve before the Fall in the biblical account of the Creation; the Garden of Eden. <i>The surrounding countryside is a walker s <b>paradise</b>.</i>

**paregoric** A medicine consisting of opium flavoured with camphor, aniseed, and benzoic acid, formerly used to treat diarrhoea and coughing in children.

**phoenix** A legendary Arabian bird said to periodically burn itself to death and emerge from the ashes as a new phoenix according to most versions only one phoenix lived at a time and it renewed itself every 500 years.

**potion** A medicinal or magical or poisonous beverage.  
*A healing **potion**.*

**resuscitated** Restored to life or consciousness.

**sorcery** The use of magic, especially black magic.
