- Action taken in return for an injury or offense.

redress Remedy or compensation for a wrong or grievance.

Those seeking **redress** for an infringement of public law rights.

repayment Payment of a debt or obligation.

Minimum monthly **repayments**.

reprisal A retaliatory action against an enemy in wartime.

Three youths died in the **reprisal**s which followed.

requital A justly deserved penalty.

Punishment inflicted on someone as vengeance for a wrong or

retribution criminal act.

Divine **retribution**.

The action of hurting or harming someone in return for an injury

or wrong suffered at their hands.

revenge

It was difficult not to be overwhelmed with feelings of hate and

revenge.

The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something harmful that they have done) especially in the next

life-Romans 12:19.

Voters are ready to wreak **vengeance** on all politicians.

Usage Examples of "Retaliation" as a noun

• The bombings are believed to be in retaliation for the trial of 15 suspects.

• She rejected as preposterous any suggestion that she had acted in retaliation.

Associations of "Retaliation" (30 Words)

Inflict harm in return for (an injury or wrong done to oneself or another.

We must **avenge** our dead.

bullying Noisily domineering; tending to browbeat others.

dishearten Cause (someone) to lose determination or confidence.

The farmer was **dishearten**ed by the damage to his crops.

A personal enemy.

The **enemy** shot down four helicopters.

futilely In a futile and unproductive manner.

gloat An act of gloating.

His enemies **gloat**ed over his death.



grudgeBear a grudge harbor ill feelings.

I ve never been one to hold a **grudge**.

harassment A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented.

So great was his **harassment** that he wanted to destroy his tormentors.

The feeling of discouragement in the face of someone's superior fame or

intimidation wealth or status etc.

The **intimidation** of witnesses and jurors.

killing The act of terminating a life.

A **killing** schedule.

marred Blemished by injury or rough wear.

Walls **marred** by graffiti.

Subdue, restrain, or overcome by affecting with a feeling of awe; frighten

overawe (as with threats.

The eleven year old was **overawe**d by the atmosphere.

punish Impose a penalty on inflict punishment on.

We had to **punish** the dog for soiling the floor again.

rancor A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.

The forcible seizure of a foreign subject or their goods as an act of

reprisal retaliation.

The threat of **reprisal**.

requital A justly deserved penalty.

retaliate

Make an attack in return for a similar attack.

They used their abilities to retaliate the injury.

Described their abilities to **retunate** the injury.

retribution Punishment inflicted on someone as vengeance for a wrong or criminal act.

Employees asked not to be named saying they feared **retribution**.

Take revenge for a perceived wrong.

revenge Zimbabwe snatched the game 18 16 but the Spanish had their **revenge**

later.

Cruel and vicious; aggressively hostile.

savage A savage people.

Malevolence by virtue of being malicious or spiteful or nasty.

He d think I was saying it out of **spite**.

spurn An act of spurning.

It is a **spurn** of God s sovereignty and a slight of his goodness.

An offensive word used especially to express anger a swear word.

They were reluctant to **swear** allegiance.



Having or showing no moral principles; not honest or fair.

unscrupulous *Unscrupulous* politicos who would be happy to sell their country in order

to gain power.

A blood feud in which the family of a murdered person seeks vengeance on

vendetta the murderer or the murderer's family.

He has accused the British media of pursuing a vendetta against him.

The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something

vengeance harmful that they have done) especially in the next life-Romans 12:19.

He swore **vengeance** on the man who betrayed him.

Disposed to seek revenge or intended for revenge- Shakespeare-

vengeful M.R.Cohen.

A **vengeful** ex con.

victimize Make a victim of.

I was **victimize**d by this con man.

vindictive Having or showing a strong or unreasoning desire for revenge.

Punishments essentially **vindictive** in their nature.

wreak Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

They would soon have a chance to **wreak** their revenge on the enemy.
