## Reunite as a Verb

### Definitions of "Reunite" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “reunite” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Unify again, as of a country.*
- *Come together or cause to come together again after a period of separation or disunity.*
- *Have a reunion; unite again.*



### Synonyms of "Reunite" as a verb (3 Words)

**bringing (back) together (again)** Induce or persuade.

**reunify**

Unify again, as of a country.  
*Will Korea **reunify**.*

**reuniting**

Have a reunion; unite again.



## Usage Examples of "Reunite" as a verb

- *Stephanie was reunited with her parents.*
- *The three friends reunited in 1959.*

## Associations of "Reunite" (30 Words)

<b>alliance</b>	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>Divisions within the <b>alliance</b>.</i>
<b><u>ally</u></b>	A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose. <i>He was forced to dismiss his closest political <b>ally</b>.</i>
<b>amalgamate</b>	Joined together into a whole. <i>Numerous small British railway companies <b>amalgamated</b>.</i>
<b><u>annex</u></b>	Take (territory) as if by conquest. <i>The school s one storey wooden <b>annex</b>.</i>
<b>associate</b>	A person who joins with others in some activity or endeavor. <i><b>Associates</b> in the law firm bill at a lower rate than do partners.</i>
<b>association</b>	The process of bringing ideas or events together in memory or imagination. <i>A bog <b>association</b> containing ericaceous plants.</i>
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>These four factors work together in <b>combination</b>.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>High tides and winds <b>combined</b> to bring chaos to the east coast.</i>
<b>confederacy</b>	A league or alliance, especially of confederate states. <i>The Yakuza is a secret <b>confederacy</b> of criminal fraternities.</i>
<b>conjoin</b>	Make contact or come together. <i>An approach which <b>conjoins</b> theory and method.</i>
<b>connect</b>	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>Employees are rewarded with bonuses <b>connected</b> to their firm s performance.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Combine (separate pieces of legislation) into a single legislative act. <i><b>Consolidate</b> one s gains.</i>
<b>converge</b>	Come together so as to form a single product. <i>The aims of the two developments can and should <b>converge</b>.</i>

<b>correlation</b>	<p>A statistic representing how closely two variables co vary it can vary from 1 perfect negative correlation through 0 no correlation to 1 perfect positive correlation.</p> <p>Research showed a clear <b>correlation</b> between recession and levels of property crime.</p>
<b>federate</b>	<p>Relating to a federated state or organization.</p> <p>In 1901 the six colonies <b>federated</b> to form the Commonwealth of Australia.</p>
<b><u>fusion</u></b>	<p>The process of causing a material or object to melt with intense heat so as to join with another.</p> <p>A <b>fusion</b> reactor.</p>
<b>integrate</b>	<p>Become one become integrated.</p> <p>The protest forced the bus companies to <b>integrate</b> the buses.</p>
<b>integrated</b>	<p>Formed into a whole or introduced into another entity- Dwight D.Eisenhower.</p> <p>An <b>integrated</b> public transport system.</p>
<b>join</b>	<p>Cause to become joined or linked.</p> <p>Our paths <b>joined</b>.</p>
<b>meet</b>	<p>A meeting at which a number of athletic contests are held.</p> <p><b>Meet</b> a violent death.</p>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	<p>Mix together different elements.</p> <p>He agreed to <b>merge</b> his broadcasting company with a multinational concern.</p>
<b><u>mingle</u></b>	<p>Get involved or mixed-up with.</p> <p>The sound of voices <b>mingled</b> with a scraping of chairs.</p>
<b>return</b>	<p>A mechanism or key on a typewriter that returns the carriage to a fixed position at the start of a new line.</p> <p>I ll be glad when things <b>return</b> to normal.</p>
<b>reunify</b>	<p>Unify again, as of a country.</p> <p>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</p>
<b><u>reunion</u></b>	<p>A party of former associates who have come together again.</p> <p>She had a tearful <b>reunion</b> with her parents.</p>
<b>synthesis</b>	<p>The combination of components or elements to form a connected whole.</p> <p>The <b>synthesis</b> of methanol from carbon monoxide and hydrogen.</p>
<b><u>unify</u></b>	<p>Make or become united, uniform, or whole.</p> <p>The government hoped to centralize and <b>unify</b> the nation.</p>
<b><u>union</u></b>	<p>A trade union.</p> <p>Lightning produced an unusual <b>union</b> of the metals.</p>

Be or become joined or united or linked.
