## Reunite as a Verb

### Definitions of "Reunite" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “reunite” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Unify again, as of a country.*
- *Come together or cause to come together again after a period of separation or disunity.*
- *Have a reunion; unite again.*



### Synonyms of "Reunite" as a verb (3 Words)

**bringing (back) together (again)** Induce or persuade.

**reunify**

Unify again, as of a country.  
*Will Korea **reunify**.*

**reuniting**

Have a reunion; unite again.



## Usage Examples of "Reunite" as a verb

- *Stephanie was reunited with her parents.*
- *The three friends reunited in 1959.*
