- change** Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units.  
*He attributed the **change** to their marriage.*
- makeover** An overall beauty treatment (involving a person's hair style and cosmetics and clothing) intended to change or improve a person's appearance.  
*The blighted neighborhood underwent a total **makeover**.*
- overhaul** Periodic maintenance on a car or machine.  
*A major **overhaul** of environmental policies.*
- rearrangement** A thing that has been changed in position, time, or order.  
***Rearrangement** of the furniture.*
- redistribution** The distribution of something in a different way, typically to achieve greater social equality.  
*The revolution resulted in a **redistribution** of wealth.*

- reorganization** The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes.  
*The **reorganization** was prescribed by federal bankruptcy laws.*
- reshuffle** A redistribution of something.  
*He was brought into the government in the last **reshuffle**.*

- *The brand was given a \$1 million revamp.*

## Revamp as a Verb

### Definitions of "Revamp" as a verb

- *Provide (a shoe) with a new vamp.*
- *To patch up or renovate; repair or restore.*
- *Give new and improved form, structure, or appearance to.*

### Synonyms of "Revamp" as a verb (10 Words)

- make over** Reach a destination, either real or abstract.
- overhaul** Overtake (someone), especially in a sporting event.  
*Moves to **overhaul** the income tax system.*
- rebuild** Build (something) again after it has been damaged or destroyed.  
*We try to help them **rebuild** their lives.*
- recondition** Overhaul or repair (a vehicle engine or piece of equipment).  
*A ship was being **reconditioned**.*
- reconstruct** Reorganize (something).  
***Reconstruct** the events of 20 years ago.*
- redecorate** Redo the decoration of an apartment or house.  
*You will have to **redecorate** the room afterwards.*
- refurbish** Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building).  
*We **refurbished** the guest wing.*

<b>rehabilitate</b>	Help to readapt, as to a former state of health or good repute. <i>The campaign aims to <b>rehabilitate</b> the river's flood plain.</i>
<b>renovate</b>	Make brighter and prettier. <i>A little warm nourishment <b>renovated</b> him for a short time.</i>
<b>vamp</b>	Provide a shoe with a new vamp. <i>The production values have been <b>vamped</b> up.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Revamp" as a verb

- *Revamp my old boots.*
- *They revamped their old house before selling it.*
- *An attempt to revamp the museum's image.*

## Associations of "Revamp" (30 Words)

<b>adjustment</b>	Making or becoming suitable; adjusting to circumstances. <i>I've made a few <b>adjustments</b> to my diet.</i>
<b>amend</b>	Make amendments to. <i><b>Amend</b> the document.</i>
<b>constitution</b>	The constitution written at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 and subsequently ratified by the original thirteen states. <i>The genetic <b>constitution</b> of a species.</i>
<b>correct</b>	Correct in opinion or judgment. <i>Cut the top and bottom tracks to the <b>correct</b> length with a hacksaw.</i>
<b>disabuse</b>	Persuade (someone) that an idea or belief is mistaken. <i>He quickly <b>disabused</b> me of my fanciful notions.</i>
<b>emend</b>	Make corrections and revisions to (a text). <i>The text was <b>emended</b> in the second edition.</i>
<b>emendation</b>	The process of making a revision or correction to a text. <i>Here are some suggested <b>emendations</b>.</i>
<b>factually</b>	With regard to what is actually the case; in relation to fact. <i>His assertion is <b>factually</b> incorrect.</i>
<b>fix</b>	Make fixed stable or stationary. <i>We were trying to <b>fix</b> up the house so that it became vaguely comfortable.</i>
<b>fixture</b>	Articles attached to a house or land and considered legally part of it so that they normally remain in place when an owner moves. <i>Plumbing <b>fixtures</b>.</i>

<b>heal</b>	Cause a wound injury or person to become sound or healthy again. <i>The rift between them was never really <b>healed</b>.</i>
<b>hunch</b>	Sit or stand with one's shoulders raised and the top of one's body bent forward. <i>He <b>hunched</b> over his glass.</i>
<b>justness</b>	Conformity with some esthetic standard of correctness or propriety. <i>It was performed with <b>justness</b> and beauty.</i>
<b>mend</b>	Repair (something that is broken or damaged). <i>Foot injuries can take months to <b>mend</b>.</i>
<b>mistaken</b>	Wrong in e.g. opinion or judgment. <i>A <b>mistaken</b> view of the situation.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Cause to change; make different; cause a transformation. <i>She may be prepared to <b>modify</b> her views.</i>
<b>overhaul</b>	A thorough examination of machinery or a system, with repairs or changes made if necessary. <i>Moves to <b>overhaul</b> the income tax system.</i>
<b>ratify</b>	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>rectify</b>	Convert into direct current. <i>His methods of <b>rectifying</b> the cycloid.</i>
<b>redress</b>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>Some ambitious Architect being called to <b>redress</b> a leaning Wall.</i>
<b>refit</b>	Outfitting a ship again (by repairing or replacing parts). <i>The <b>refit</b> of ships damaged by enemy action.</i>
<b>reform</b>	The action or process of reforming an institution or practice. <i>The family rejoiced in the drunkard's <b>reform</b>.</i>
<b>relevant</b>	Appropriate to the current time, period, or circumstances; of contemporary interest. <i>Critics may find themselves unable to stay <b>relevant</b> in a changing world.</i>
<b>remedy</b>	Set right (an undesirable situation). <i>Shopping became a <b>remedy</b> for personal problems.</i>
<b>repair</b>	A result of repairing something. <i>The hospital is in a bad state of <b>repair</b>.</i>
<b>reschedule</b>	Change the time of (a planned event). <i>The concert has been <b>rescheduled</b> for September.</i>
<b>revisal</b>	The act of rewriting something.

- righteous** Correctly so called; genuine.  
*The prayer of a **righteous** man availeth much.*
