- revelry** Unrestrained merrymaking.
*Sounds of **revelry** issued into the night.*
- spree** A spell of unrestrained drinking.
*Crews were seldom going ashore and therefore seldom going on the **spree**.*

- *Get great pleasure from (a situation or experience).*



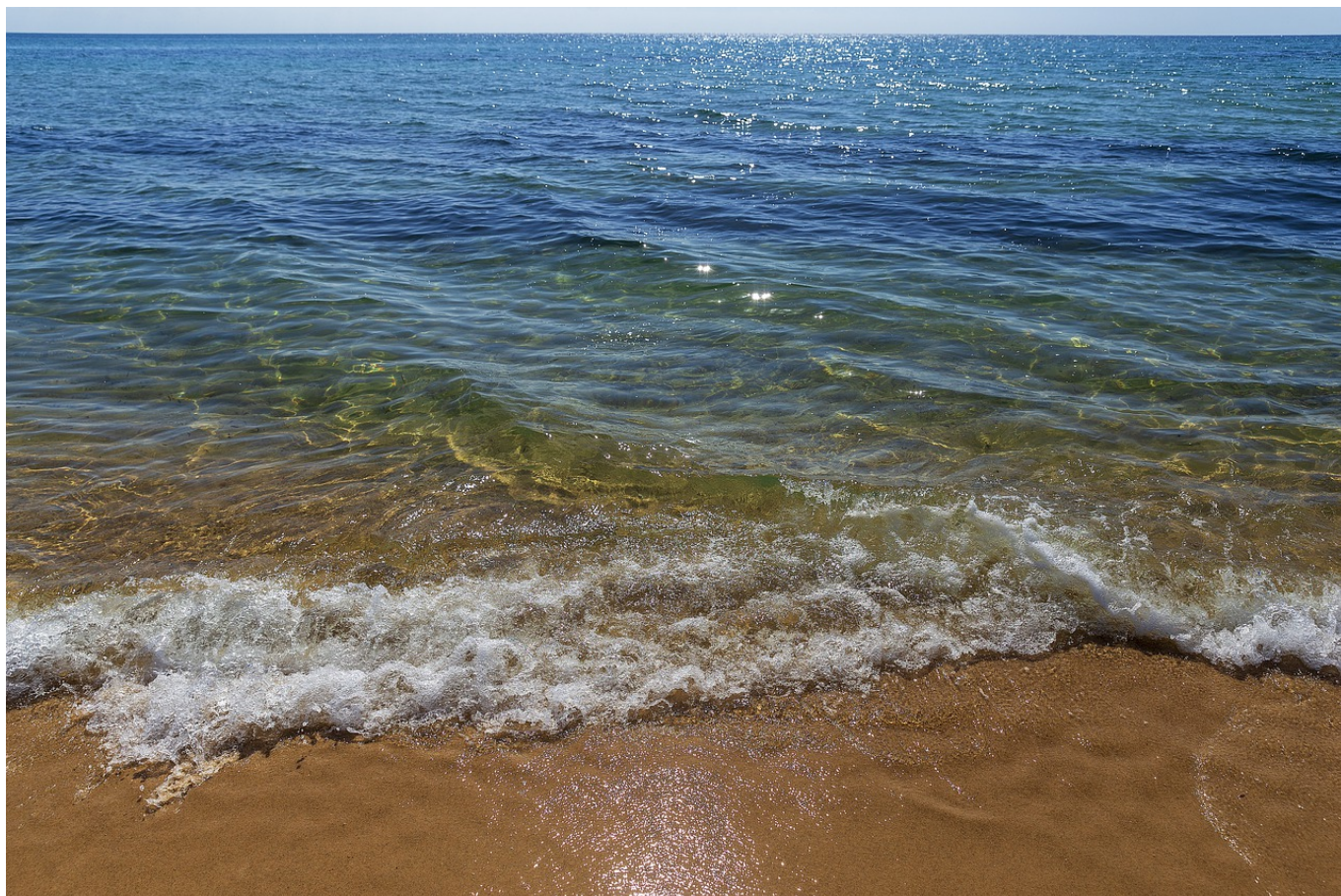

*Crews were seldom going ashore and therefore seldom going on the **spree**.*

tipple

Drink alcohol, especially habitually.

*She drank several glasses of sherry her favourite **tipple**.*

tipsy

Unstable and prone to tip as if intoxicated.

*A **tipsy** boat.*
