*Eight months of commemorative **jollification** for the Eiffel Tower began in March.*

**merrymaking** A boisterous celebration; a merry festivity.  
*I'd had my fill of **merrymaking** and decided to stay put till my headache eased.*

**revelry** Unrestrained merrymaking.  
*Sounds of **revelry** issued into the night.*

**spree** A spell of unrestrained drinking.  
*Crews were seldom going ashore and therefore seldom going on the **spree**.*

<b>enjoy</b>	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The industry <b>enjoyed</b> a boom.</i>
<b>enjoy oneself</b>	Have benefit from.
<b>feast</b>	Partake in a feast or banquet. <i>The men would congregate and <b>feast</b> after hunting.</i>
<b>glory in</b>	Rejoice proudly.
<b>go on a spree</b>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.
<b>have a good time</b>	Receive willingly something given or offered.
<b>have a party</b>	Have a personal or business relationship with someone.
<b>have fun</b>	Organize or be responsible for.
<b>jollify</b>	Celebrate noisily, often indulging in drinking; engage in uproarious festivities.
<b>lap up</b>	Take up with the tongue.
<b>like</b>	Feel about or towards; consider, evaluate, or regard. <i>I d <b>like</b> a beer now.</i>
<b>love</b>	Be enamored or in love with. <i>She really <b>loved</b> him.</i>

<b>luxuriate in</b>	Thrive profusely or flourish extensively.
<b>make happy</b>	Create or design, often in a certain way.
<b>make merry</b>	Change from one form into another.
<b>make whoopie</b>	Carry out or commit.
<b>party</b>	Enjoy oneself at a party or other lively gathering typically with drinking and music. <i>The students were <b>partying</b> all night before the exam.</i>
<b>racket</b>	Hit a ball with a racket.
<b>relish</b>	Make pleasant to the taste add relish to. <i>He was <b>relishing</b> his moment of glory.</i>
<b>roister</b>	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>Workers from the refinery <b>roistered</b> in the bars.</i>
<b>savour</b>	Have flavor; taste of something. <i>Their genuflections <b>savoured</b> of superstition and popery.</i>
<b>take pleasure in</b>	Ascertain or determine by measuring, computing or take a reading from a dial.
<b>wallow in</b>	Roll around.
<b>wassail</b>	Propose a toast to. <i>It is the custom in the cider districts of Sussex to <b>wassail</b> the apple trees.</i>
<b>whoop it up</b>	Raise.

<b>alcoholic</b>	A person suffering from alcoholism. <i><b>Alcoholic</b> liquor.</i>
<b>bacchanal</b>	A wild and drunken celebration. <i>The debauched and alcoholic president was said to be organizing unceasing <b>bacchanals</b>.</i>
<b>bacchanalian</b>	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking. <i>A <b>bacchanalian</b> orgy.</i>

<b>bibulous</b>	Given to or marked by the consumption of alcohol. <i>A <b>bibulous</b> evening.</i>
<b>binge</b>	Watch multiple episodes of a television programme over a short period of time. <i>A drinking <b>binge</b>.</i>
<b>carousal</b>	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
<b>carouse</b>	Drink alcohol and enjoy oneself with others in a noisy, lively way. <i>Corporate <b>carouses</b>.</i>
<b>drunken</b>	Given to or marked by the consumption of alcohol. <i>Two <b>drunken</b> gentlemen holding each other up.</i>
<b>enjoy</b>	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i><b>Enjoy</b> privileges.</i>
<b>festal</b>	Offering fun and gaiety. <i>A festive or <b>festal</b> occasion.</i>
<b>inebriate</b>	Become drunk or drink excessively. <i>He was <b>inebriated</b> by his phenomenal success.</i>
<b><u>inebriated</u></b>	Drunk; intoxicated. <i>I got mildly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b>inebriety</b>	Drunkenness, especially habitual; intoxication. <i>The ravages of <b>inebriety</b>.</i>
<b><u>intoxicated</u></b>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>He was so <b>intoxicated</b> that he could barely walk.</i>
<b>liquor</b>	The liquid from which a substance has been crystallized or extracted. <i>Waste <b>liquors</b>.</i>
<b>oaf</b>	An awkward stupid person. <i>They are just big clumsy <b>oafs</b>.</i>
<b>overuse</b>	Make use of too often or too extensively. <i><b>Overuse</b> of natural resources.</i>
<b>plastered</b>	(of hair) made smooth by applying a sticky or glossy substance. <i>I went out and got totally <b>plastered</b>.</i>
<b><u>relish</u></b>	Make pleasant to the taste add relish to. <i>She swigged a mouthful of wine with <b>relish</b>.</i>
<b>reveler</b>	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract <b>revelers</b> as young as thirteen.</i>
<b><u>revelry</u></b>	Lively and noisy festivities, especially when these involve drinking a large amount of alcohol. <i>Sounds of <b>revelry</b> issued into the night.</i>

**sober**

Make or become sober after drinking alcohol.  
*Keep him in bed until he **sobers** up.*

**spree**

Take part in a spree.  
*Crews were seldom going ashore and therefore seldom going on the **spree**.*

**tipple**

Drink alcohol, especially habitually.  
*She drank several glasses of sherry her favourite **tipple**.*

**tipsy**

Unstable and prone to tip as if intoxicated.  
*A **tipsy** boat.*
