evince	Reveal the presence of (a quality or feeling); indicate. <i>The news stories evinced the usual mixture of sympathy and satisfaction.</i>
<u>expose</u>	Expose to light of photographic film. <i>He has been exposed as a liar and a traitor.</i>
exposure	The act of exposing film to light. <i>Exposure to the weather.</i>
giveaway	A gift of public land or resources for the private gain of a limited group. <i>The Patriots have 16 takeaways and two giveaways during their five game winning streak.</i>
overexposure	Exposure of a film or a part of an image to light for too long a time. <i>Louis feared media overexposure might damage his career.</i>
photometer	Photographic equipment that measures the intensity of light.
prenatal	Before birth; during or relating to pregnancy. <i>The prenatal period.</i>
<u>prophetic</u>	Accurately predicting what will happen in the future. <i>Prophetic writings.</i>
reveal	Cause or allow (something) to be seen. <i>The clouds were breaking up to reveal a clear blue sky.</i>
revealing	Showing or making known. <i>A revealing radio interview.</i>
secret	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>The secret compartment in the desk.</i>
<u>shocking</u>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation. <i>The most shocking book of its time.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>The staggering bills for maintenance and repair.</i>
<u>startling</u>	Very surprising, astonishing, or remarkable. <i>He bore a startling likeness to their father.</i>
<u>surprising</u>	Causing surprise; unexpected. <i>Leaped up with surprising agility.</i>
ultraviolet	Radiation lying in the ultraviolet range wave lengths shorter than light but longer than X rays. <i>An ultraviolet lamp.</i>

uncover Discover (something previously secret or unknown).
*The newspaper **uncovered** the President's illegal dealings.*

unexpected Not expected or anticipated.
*His death was totally **unexpected**.*

unveil Remove a veil or covering from, in particular uncover (a new monument or work of art) as part of a public ceremony.
*The Princess **unveiled** a plaque.*

unwrap Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret.
***Unwrap** the evidence in the murder case.*
